Editor's note: We were saddened to learn of the passing of Englewood's "Peace Lady," Jean Ranallo. She suffered a serious stroke as she was about to take her daily swim on January 8. She passed on January 11. Services will be held at 10am on April 21 at St. Raphael Catholic Church, Englewood.

As a tribute to Jean, we are reprinting this article, originally published on July 31, 2020.

If you were to stand at a busy intersection in Englewood, waving a large sign in your hands, you'd expect at least some people to notice you. And Jean Ranallo can tell you it works. But she's not competing with cigar store owners or restaurants for business. She just wants to get an important message across: She is "For Peace." And she hopes to see our entire nation work toward that end.

It takes a bold woman to stand alone among passing cars and people and make her plea. These days especially, the nation seems divided, and violence all too often accompanies any public display of opinion. So how did Jean get into this kind of activity, anyway?

She was born in Hamilton, Ontario during World War II, and her family moved to

Schenectady, N.Y. when she was five. Raised a Catholic, she says, "I was always opposed to the folly of war, and to the Washington politicians doing nothing about it." Having read about the dropping of atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki in school, "I was and am antinuclear," she declares.

During her high school years she was fascinated with the plight of the Hungarian refugees who fled to Germany, Austria and Yugoslavia during their revolution, put down savagely by the Soviets in 1956. She always liked history and languages, and she did both at SUNY-Albany,

earning a bachelor of arts degree in German in 1965 and getting her master's degree in German there two years later.

That was just in time to take an interest in demonstrations against the Vietnam War that had begun in 1964 and continued, with increasing intensity, until the war ended in 1975. In 1967 Jean took a job as a teacher of German (and variously, history, English and Russian language as well) at Woonsocket High School in Rhode Island. "The Quakers in Rhode Island had a really good peace movement," she says, "and we'd go to demonstrations in Providence, Boston, Hartford or New York. We'd hear of something, and my brother and sisters and I would pile into the car and go."

Jean was never an organizer or leader, just a participant, a member of the audience. "There was always something," she recalls. "The Kent State shooting in 1970, peace in Central America after the murder of the Archbishop Romero in El

Salvador in 1980, peace in the Middle East." And Vietnam. Make no mistake: Jean was no flower girl. She was a respected teacher, "Miss Jones" to her students at Woonsocket High, where she taught for 23 years.

The Germans would say she's "Sprachbegabt," gifted in languages. She has the fluency of a native in English and German, and can get by in Spanish, Hungarian, and Russian. Chinese? She studied it "a bit" before going there "in this millennium," as she puts it. In fact, after taking early retirement from her teaching position in 1990, travel became one of her chief activities.

First she moved to Florida, where "my parents had discovered Englewood in 1978," she states. Then she was in Hungary in 1990-91, teaching English to local students. In 1992 she married Raymond Ranallo (now deceased), and thereafter they traveled extensively in Europe: Scandinavia, Denmark, Germany, Hungary, and Italy, among others. She also went to Russia and Ukraine in the winter of 1992 with a friend.

Other trips were for other reasons. She went to Guatemala for an anthropology course and to Transylvania on a Fulbright grant. Trips to Mexico, Central America, Chile and Catalonia were with School of the Americas Watch and Code Pink, two peace advocacy groups. In retrospect, Jean says, "I am so glad that I was able to travel and can look back during these boring hours sheltering in place and recalling visits without masks."

After so many years as a peace advocate, the first time she became associated with a local




"There were a few dozen members, and we started out carrying signs on Englewood Beach on Manasota Key." When they moved their operations and their signs to the corner of Dearborn Street and Route 776, their numbers were down to about a dozen, as age had taken its toll. "From then on, the size of the group kept dwindling, and now I am pretty much the sole remaining member of EPIC," Jean muses. But she keeps on.

She puts in about threeand-a-half hours on Saturday and Sunday mornings, moving from one corner of the Dearborn intersection to another to stay in the shade as much as possible. "I try to make eye contact with passersby," she says. "People will wave to me, maybe honk their horn. One family asked to have their young son's picture taken with me." The immediate rewards are modest, although in 2020 the Englewood associates of a national group known as "The Indivisibles" honored her with an award and festivities at her favorite corner and at Elsie Quirk Library.

The real reward comes in getting people to heed Abraham Lincoln's warning: "America will never be destroyed from the outside. If we falter and lose our freedoms, it will be because we destroyed ourselves."

For the record, Jean has been waving her sign at the corner of Dearborn Street and Route 776 for 18 years now, and she has no plans to stop doing so anytime soon. Why would she? "It's the only activity in town," she says wryly, and there's a lot of truth in that.





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Surviving Hurricane Ian Part 2: Aftermath and recovery

It's been nearly three months since Hurricane Ian made its tortuously slow and calamitous giant monster-crawl through our community. We have survived an apocalyptic event here, and we have the scars to show it. I have no regrets for staying to ride out the storm, but it is not lost on me that I can say that because my home and person were spared. Our first weeks post-Ian, were a challenging adventure for us, and a relentless trauma for many across Florida whose homes were badly damaged or destroyed, or who suffered bodily injuries or deaths of loved ones.


On the ground in my community, a group cleanup day was immediately coordinated to help our friend Helen begin to dig out. There was an entire large metal roof crumpled up in her yard, blown in from somewhere in the neighborhood. While we were working, a troop of National Guardsmen appeared on foot in their boots and uniforms, walking her heavily damaged neighborhood and checking in at every home, taking information to secure assistance. This scene was very moving, along with the incredible ongoing influx of trucks from out-of-state

companies - electricians, tree workers, roofers, flood and mold specialists, and then the enormous black double-train FEMA debris removal trucks, which are still a constant sight here - it was wild. These rescue workers filled parking lots all over town for many weeks with their equipment and temporary RV homes. The FEMA trucks have taken over the small private-plane airport up the street from us, and the mounds of debris they have gathered there to process appears like a new mountain range on our flat Florida landscape. There have also been many groups of volunteers, some from states far away, who mobilized to offer their labors of love to our communities. A popular cafe in town posted that, although they had no food, they somehow had

We got busy on our own property setting up the solar power station and panels we had fortuitously purchased recently, and a smaller solar setup we use when we are camping. We were pleased to find that we were able to keep our household fridge and freezer going for the whole week that the power was out, along with our phones and lanterns (constant sunny weather helped!). It didn't seem worth it to charge our computers since we had no internet. But we did find that we could make quick smoothies in our Vitamix without draining our solar battery. That felt like luxury! We ran the chemical-free water from our hot tub through our carbon Berkey filters for drinking water. Our water district was able to give everyone a slowly increasing trickle of water to our homes, but was strongly cautioning us to try not to use drains, and to flush toilets as minimally as possible since there were many breaks in the main water lines, and sewage was backing up into many homes as well, so what we each did would affect the whole system. A neighbor tipped us off



to remove the sewer cover in our yard so that it would back up there instead of into the house. That relieved my mind some, and thankfully, we did not experience any backup at all. Our power was restored in a week, but the water/ sewer restoration took another week or so. With our neighbors we reveled in the wonder of our tranquil star-lit nights while all the lights were out for a week.

We had to purchase a gas chainsaw, since our electric ones were useless under the circumstances. Fortunately, my partner Todd, got a paid week off from his day-job while their buildings got repairs. Instead, he spent the better part of each day behind a chainsaw. I laughed out loud when I discovered an intact hen's egg - not even hardboiled! - underneath a branch in our vard (I still don't know how that happened). When I wasn't dragging branches to the street for the FEMA trucks to pick up, or moving our solar panels around the yard to catch the best sun rays, I was waiting in lines to apply for various forms of assistance. These long lines were, in a strange way, a therapeutic place for swapping our incredible tales of traumas and miracles.

The best thing to come of my time in line was the unforgettable tree-work assistance gifted to us by an energetic Samaritan's Purse church group from Ohio. A father and son and four of their comrades arrived on our land with three large landscaping machines, and worked intensively for two half-days, leaving their equipment with us overnight. No job was too big for this team fueled by love, and we cannot imagine what we would have done without them. They prayed over us several times, engaged us in lively discourses about the meaning of God and life, and proudly gifted us Bibles with their personal inscriptions. I understood that this was all part of the exchange. They were delighted with my description of a ripe mango as a perfectly complete expression of God's handiwork, and I sent them on their way with a bag of their favorite banana lara bars 'for the road,' and a heartfelt thank you card.

We accepted their persistent invitation to join them for a free dinner at the local Samaritan Church. They were so genuine and gracious, and eager for us to sit at their table and share

bits of our lives with each other. We learned about their families back home, and things about the life of a samaritan traveling to disaster zones. There were about 200 people at this nightly community dinner for the workteams and their invitees (like us), and it was touching to hear highlights of the day's recovery missions from those wishing to stand up and share.

Finding a body shop to repair my car, which was hit by a falling tree, was another adventure. The first shop my insurance company referred me to said they could fix my car in six months! The next shop they offered turned out to have been crushed in the storm. I did some legwork and my car did finally get repaired last week. We are still waiting on the roof repairs. Blue roof-tarps remain seemingly everywhere, but the generators and sirens have subsided and the chainsaws and trucks are less constant. Slowly but surely, the roadside debris piles are really diminishing.

Though each of us has our own unique journey through the aftermath of Ian, some common threads in our collective experience seem to be the early shock and disorientation (and actual dislocation for many), leading to grief and sadness, and some frustration and anger too. As the realization of the full extent of the damage gradually set in, along with the dawning of understanding that we were in this for a really, really long haul, a palpable sense of some

communal depression emerged. For the strong-hearted, we are offered an abundance of lessons in patience, acceptance, surrender, non-attachment and resilience. Many plants inspired us with their stunning revival and unprecedented sudden growthspurts and blossoms, in the endless sunshine following the deep storm rains.

A bold new sky-blue billboard at the entrance to our town proclaims: 'Englewood Strong'. We are strong together in this community, and we know it. Our downtown renovation project barely missed a beat, our farmer's market is back in full swing, and we had a cheerful vegan health festival last weekend in our beautiful new plaza. In the midst of ongoing major repairs, normal activities are resuming and the snowbirds are flocking in, as usual for this time of the year. Despite a dreaded red tide algae bloom


impacting our beach ecosystem temporarily after all the run-off from the hurricane, I delighted the other day in watching a pod of dolphins race by, likely chasing a school of fish.

My friend Evelyn, an artist, has respectfully allowed some of nature's newest sculptures to remain in place. A 100-foot pine tree fell and bisected her backyard, and she delights in the fairy-land of archways, tunnels and playful passages it has created, with its climbing vines now blooming at eyelevel. The huge oak tree gracing the entrance of the community hub we all know as 'The Open Studio', lies dramatically on the ground, alive with fresh leaves and half of its roots still in the ground. A beautiful sign, handpainted by Evelyn and placed next to a stone bench nestled comfortably in the branches reads: 'Honor What Is'.

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
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I sprang for the \$5.99 to rent Tár, (R) mainly for star Cate Blanchett, who is a front-runner to win the Best Actress Oscar. Blanchett plays Lydia Tár, the mercurial conductor of the Berlin Philharmonic who seems to be on top of the world. She's highly respected, just wrote an autobiography, has a devoted wife and adopted daughter, distractingly-perfect hair, custom suits and is about to conduct Mahler's Fifth Symphony. But shocker, she didn't get there by being a sweetheart.

And that non-sweetheart behavior comes back to haunt Lydia when a former disciple/ girlfriend commits suicide after Lydia wields her maestro power and blackballs her. Then there's the social media thing which Lydia has never paid much attention to because when you're that big a deal you don't need to right? Uh, wrong.

You don't have to like or know classical music to enjoy Tár. It's more a film about having power, abusing it. And it's about Blanchett who is truly magnificent. Even though Lydia is selfish, manipulative and dismissive of just about everyone, Blanchett magically makes you feel a tiny bit bad for her as you watch her inevitable downward spiral. And because she's so riveting, the film does not seem 157 minutes long.

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Yes, there are some confusing and frankly unnecessary scenes but writer/director Todd Field (Little Children) who wrote Tár for Blanchett, has crafted a compelling and very contemporary narrative for our greatest contemporary actress.



If you have HBO Max, you have free access to the film that narrowly replaced The Fablemans as my favorite movie of the year, The Banshees of Inisherin (R). Already an awards darling, by the time you read this, Banshees should have scored a slew of Oscar nominations, and may I say in advance, well-deserved.

Set on a remote island in



Ireland in 1923, Pádraic (Colin Farrell) and Colm (Brendan Gleeson) are old friends who have a comfortable routine that has become a bit too comfortable for Colm who without warning breaks off the friendship. Why? Not for any dramatic reason, but because Pádraic is boring. The break-up is as brutal as you'll see in any bad boyfriend rom-com. Colm ignores his former friend to hang with his fellow musicians at the pub, leaving Pádraic to seek solace from his sister Siobhan (Kerry Condon) and his beloved pet donkey Jenny.

When Pádraic refuses to let his former friend be, Colm reacts in a most surprising and desperate manner. You're like, "Nobody would ever do that" and then five minutes later



you're in. Why? Because Martin McDonagh knows how to write. He previously teamed with Farrell and Gleeson for 2008's terrific In Bruges. His screenplay is smart, funny, shocking, sad and surprising. And it's the best film about male friendship and the importance of connection that I've ever seen. Inisherin might be a beautiful island but Pádraic seems to be the only content person on the Island and that happiness evaporates when Colm "breaks up" with him. Siobhan, who lives with her brother and is bored to tears, feels trapped and their aimless friend Dominic (Barry Keoghan) has it even worse.

If I was a voting member of the Academy (and I should be) I would hand Oscars to Farrell,



Condon and McDonagh for writing. I'd also give an award to Jenny and the island, both crucial sporting players. Throw in the Best Picture Oscar and I'm good.

The Banshees of Inisherin



Sometimes a movie doesn't grab the critics but captures the audience. Judging by the crowd at the cinema at 11 am on a Sunday morning and a 97% audience rating on Rotten Tomatoes, that's the case with A Man Called Otto, based on the Swedish novel and film adaptation A Man Called Ove.


Tom Hanks stars as Otto, a down-on-his-luck curmudgeon who lost his wife, his job and his purpose. He dedicates himself to policing his neighborhood, yelling at people for illegal parking and throwing newspapers, and heaven forbid you don't clean up after your dog. But nobody seems to get mad at Otto, so you know this is a movie.

When Otto decides the neighborhood watch isn't enough he tries to end it all and despite his best efforts, fails. Then a noisy and needy family of four with one on the way, moves in next door. Tommy can't fix anything and Marisol can't drive. They need Otto. Soon Marisol is bringing Otto home-cooked meals, the kids are drawing him pictures and then there's a cat and a baby. There's always a cat. Throw in some flashbacks to Otto's courtship of his beloved wife Sonya and we begin to understand why he's such a Grumpy Gus.

I know A Man Called Otto (PG-13) sounds a bit shmaltzy. and it is, but it works, mainly because Hanks is perfect for the role and Mexican actress Mariana Trevino as Marisol is a fabulous foil. Like Banshees, Otto speaks to the life-changing significance of relationships and how we define family. Is it a bit manipulative? Yes. Are there issues with the story? Yes. Will it make you cry? I plead the Fifth. But if you just dig in and let these characters into your life, vou'll love Otto.
