





The movie *She Said* (R) made less than \$6 million at the box office, disappearing rather quickly from the theaters. It's streaming now on Peacock. That's a shame because it's a terrific film, the best about the often-maligned field of journalism, since 2015's Spotlight.

By now, everyone knows about the Harvey Weinstein scandal and how the megasuccessful film producer is now in prison for a history of sexual misconduct and abuse. But it took journalists to make the public aware of his crimes in 2017.


New York Times investigative reporters Megan Twohey and Jodi Kantor broke the Weinstein story which launched the MeToo movement. They went on to win a Pulitzer Prize and to write the book "She Said".

Twohey (Carey Mulligan) and Kantor (Zoe Kazan) have no idea of the extent of Weinstein's acts and as the extent of his misdeeds begin to become apparent and as more women come forward, the reporters face hesitant victims with non-disclosure acts, an army of lawyers and even personal threats.

She Said is not so much about a bad man doing bad things as it is about two women doing great work. Director Maria Schrader doesn't dwell on or sensationalize the victims' dramatic accounts. She focuses on the journalists who believed in them and helped some of them regain their voice and power. The reason they succeeded in getting their sources to finally go on the record, is that their sources liked them and trusted them. Twohey and Kantor listen and they care and they're smart.

Having worked for a newspaper, I might have been a bit overly-fascinated with the newsroom scenes and the back and forth with the reporters' editors. With those editors being played by Andre Braugher and Patricia Clarkson, who wouldn't be?

Mulligan is excellent as always, delivering a sensitive



and focused performance and Kazan is also very strong. *She Said* drops the appropriate famous names and Ashley Judd, who accused Weinstein, appears as herself. When things finally come together after years of hard work, and Twohey and Kantor get the OK to publish, that push of the computer key is kind of exciting.





Since I am catching up on my Oscar nominees, I decided to pair *She Said* with *Women Talking* (PG-13), writer/director Sarah Polley's Oscar-nominated film about, well, women talking. The women are members of a rural Mennonite community who discover that for years they have been tranquilized and sexually attacked by the men in the community. When the men are carted off to jail they have two safe days to decide if they are all

going to stay and fight or leave the community en masse.

Women from three families are charged with making that decision. They meet in a barn and because they weren't allowed to learn to read and write, bring in a former member of the community and teacher. August (Ben Whishaw) to take notes for them.

The powerhouse cast includes Claire Foy, Rooney Mara, Judith Ivey, Jessie Buckley and briefly Frances McDormand. Their discussion of "pros and cons" tackles everything from "What is forgiveness" to "Can we still get to Heaven if we leave the community?" and "Can I take my 14-year-old son or is he already a lost cause?"

My daughter Emma commented that Women Talking would make a good stage play and I totally agree. You could actually call the move "stagey". Each character has a big scene or two where they are basically center stage. Do we get to know them? Not really. And can I just say for women who were never taught to read or write, they have better-than-average vocabularies. Ironically, I felt that I got to know the movie's one male, the best. Whishaw's August is a sweet, smart, fragile guy who has had a big crush on Ona (Mara) since they were kids. Ona, who is obviously very fond of August, for some reason doesn't want him in her life. Seriously? He is the only decent man in the whole community.

I liked a lot about Women *Talking*, which Polley adapted from a book based on a similar case in Bolivia. Watching these women taking their lives back and getting their first taste of power was kind of inspiring in an "I'm glad that's not me" way. Having three generations of women in a family brought up even more issues and questions and the older characters were an important part of the film. Yes, it was definitely "talky" but it's talk that's worth listening to. (Women Talking is only in theaters).

James Bond He Wasn't ... Or Was He?

Editors Note: This artical originally ran in the 3-11-22 Englewood Review. Dean Laux is still recuperating from an injury and hopes to be back at his typewriter soon.

Ray Humphrey is a man whose work was often a secret to many, but whose results were more often known to anyone who could read a newspaper. He has held so many positions that his briefest bio, in small type, would fill a page in the *New York Times* Sunday edition. And those exploits that he confesses to

would be fodder for an exciting spy novel. In fact, he can claim to be the inspiration for at least four tomes of that genre.

Publicly he has been thanked by U.S. Presidents John F. Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson and Richard Nixon for his work on behalf of our country. Privately he has lectured to or advised the FBI, New Scotland Yard and the New York City Police Department, among other institutions, on training, intelligence and security matters. And secretly he carried out special assignments for certain U.S. government agencies that were ... well, secret, even now. Let's just say his activities took place in Germany, Italy, Russia, Iran, Nigeria and Vietnam.

Born in 1935 during the Great Depression, Ray grew up in Wayland, Massachusetts as the oldest of three children in a middle-class family. He showed leadership skills early, serving as his senior class president, chairman of the student council, co-editor of the yearbook and a "straight A all the way" student. "I was a bookworm and a wallflower," he avers. "I was shy, bashful and inhibited at the time," traits that were to vanish in the years ahead. "My favorite book was Man of La Mancha, and I've been charging at windmills ever since."

Ray was interested in politics. "I was patriotic, and I wanted to do something for my country," he says. He was able to get an academic scholarship at Norwich University in Vermont, the oldest private military college in the country, and he majored in public administration, minoring in psychology. The school had an ROTC program under which Ray was given a commission as a second lieutenant when he

graduated in 1957—but in the regular Army, not in the Army Reserve, thereby placing him on track for a 20-year career. It was during his military duty that, with the approval of his commanding officer, Ray was first tapped by an unnamed federal government agency for "extracurricular" activities.

After basic infantry officer training at Ft. Benning, Georgia he went on to paratroop and ranger training. After being posted to Ft. Devens, Massachusetts in 1960 as an officer in the 2nd Infantry Brigade, he volunteered for

military police training at Ft. Gordon, Georgia in 1962. Why the MPs? "They were always working," Ray says. "In the infantry you stood around and waited for something to happen. In the MPs, you made things happen." And when he was posted to the Granite City, Illinois Army Depot as a Captain and Provost Marshal in charge of law enforcement and security, things did happen.

Granite City was on the eastern bank of the Mississippi River, just north of a tough town: East St. Louis. "There was a lot of activity off-post – a




lot of violence, and the Mafia was located across the river in St. Louis," he says "I had to deal with this criminal element frequently." Ray was one of the initial participants in the Mafia relocation program (later known as witness protection) during his three years in Granite City. "We were relocating Mafia members who were to testify against their bosses," and would be dead ducks once they violated their oath of omerta unless they were whisked away and protected. It was a tricky business, dealing with the bosses while trying to keep certain of their underlings

Shortly after Ray first reported for duty, there was a murder on post. A sergeant had killed his wife in their trailer and was holed up there with his three-year-old daughter, armed to the teeth. Ray, alone and unarmed, removed his uniform jacket and entered the trailer in an effort to talk the crazed and sweating noncom down. During their standoff, "I was just waiting for my help to arrive when a CID agent built like a tank crashed into the trailer and bowled everything over, including me." The soldier was captured, his daughter rescued, and Ray received a medal for heroism.

"I think that was one of the reasons I was recommended for the White House Fellows program," he says. He was already on an accelerated promotion program as a result of numerous outstanding efficiency reports, thereby getting promoted ahead of his contemporaries even though he was an ROTC guy and something of a nonconformist.

The Fellows program had been founded by President Lyndon Johnson in 1964 to bring together exceptional young professionals and give them a year-long first-hand experience working with highranking members of the federal government. About 35 candidates emerged from the initial vetting for the program's first year, and Ray was one of them. They spent two weeks at the White House during the competition and each evening convened for a session with a member of Congress, the Supreme Court or the Cabinet. "It was an exhilarating experience," Ray says, "but I didn't get to take a year off from the military. The Army sent me to Vietnam instead, on the grounds that I was critically

needed there. Ironically, when I got to Saigon, the military unit I was assigned to was surprised to see me because they thought I was going to work in Washington!"

In Nam he moved up in rank to Major with the Military Assistance Command Vietnam (MACV), responsible for security, law enforcement, internal affairs and investigations of major corruption scandals - one of which, the My Lai massacre, was of such international significance that Ray went to Washington D.C. to brief the White House on it. Twenty-six soldiers were charged with criminal offenses, but only Lieutenant William Calley, Jr., a platoon leader in C Company, was convicted of murdering 22 villagers. He was sentenced to life in prison but actually only placed under house arrest until President Richard Nixon commuted his sentence.

Ray had three-and-a-half tours on active duty in Vietnam and achieved the rank of Lt. Colonel when sent to the U.S. Army Command & General Staff College in Leavenworth, Kansas in 1972. Normally anyone sent there would be in line for eventual promotion to Brigadier General or higher. Ray completed his ACSG training and went on to become Provost Marshal of Ft. Devens before making an important decision. Xerox Corporation had been trying for some time to lure him into its ranks as Vice President for Global Security at a major league salary. He decided to first complete his 20-year career in 1977 and retire to the heady

life of a well-paid corporate executive.

Ray stayed at Xerox for five years before moving over to Digital Equipment Corporation in 1982, where he remained for 18 years. During those years he continued to work with federal government agencies on highly classified projects that one writer later described as "almost James Bondish, filtering personal computers into Russia to allow its citizens to secretly see a world outside the Soviet Union ... and countering tech theft by the Soviets" when our nation's security was at stake. He was one of the founders of the antihijacking Sky Marshall program and led our government's efforts to stem the activities of global drug cartels. Ray also put in some time as Chief of Industrial Security for the U.S. Army Command.

Ray "retired" in 2000 when he came to Englewood, but he has continued to be involved in major security issues. He spent three years consulting for the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC). He's served on several federal commissions in the U.S. and was president (and later chairman) of the

American Society of Industrial Security-International, the largest industrial security organization in the world. He's a much sought-after speaker at assemblies and conventions related to international security. And he still gets phone calls from Washington, D.C. at odd hours and times.

For all that he's done, he's been given some great sobriquets around the world. "In Nigeria they called me The Black Man in a White Man's Skin," he says, and elsewhere he's been dubbed "The Great Conciliator" and "Super Sleuth."

That all begs the question: Was Ray Humphrey James Bond? The answer is clear: No, James Bond was just another Ray Humphrey wannabe.



Changes Coming to Deer Prairie Creek

A long-time favorite launch of ours and one we tried for over a decade to keep off the radar to preserve its wild nature is being "upgraded" and changed. It won't be the primitive, natural area we loved and tried to protect. Instead, a new pedestrian bridge, ADA kayak launch platform, and an enlarged fishing pier will bring a more developed feel here. We were granted a sneak preview of the coming changes that should be available for all to enjoy by mid-March, 2023. Until then, heavy equipment and construction make the closure necessary for the safety of the public.

Parking is a major consideration to accommodate the anticipated popularity of this new and improved facility. A new parking area near the lower launch is designed to accommodate 10 vehicles as well as 2 longer trailer spots. In the main lot, parking has been expanded to 26 vehicle spots with 3 additional drive-thru trailer spaces. If all of these spots are filled, upwards of 30 kayaks could be floating on this little creek previously loved for its pristine solitude, which is not available at any other kayak launch in the area.

One of the most obvious changes is the new pedestrian bridge across the outlet of the main lake above the spillway. This bridge will make access to the northern part of the preserve easier and drier for those who want to hike into this area Wide enough for vehicles, it is structurally limited to the lighter loads expected from non-vehicular use. Bollards will be installed to help prevent vehicles from crossing this bridge and collapsing it. The bridge will facilitate access not only by hikers and bikers, but also make it easier for bad actors too. All of us who value and respect this preserve should be alert for suspicious activities in this newly opened area.

Another "improvement" is a full-fledged fishing pier in the location of the old pier and extending out into the lake. It will also

be a popular alligator viewing platform. The workers we saw during our visit drew the attention of several alligators by dipping buckets of water from the lake for construction use. Any commotion sounds like a dinner bell to these primitive creatures. An angler landing a fish will surely get their attention. With the ADA cutouts that lower the railing in several places, it will be possible to bring a chair to the pier and enjoy the scenery from a seated level. We hope this pier will not become an alligator feeding platform and create aggressive gators that will endanger kayakers. The new ADA kayak and

canoe launch will be the change most kayakers will have to deal with This one uses the same floating dock concept with sloped ramp and two launch slots like the one at Senator Paul B. Johnson Park on US 41. Unlike the PBJ launch, this structure shaped like a "T", may not require quite the number of right angle turns to hit the slot. Still, it will still be a challenge for even a non-disabled kayaker to use this structure. The slots and ramp are narrow, and the angles involved will make it difficult to line a kayak up with the slots. During landing the sloped ramp stops the bow of the kayak before the kayaker can reach the railings provided for pulling themselves up the ramp and into the slot. Getting in a kayak will require lowering oneself into the kayak from a standing position and crawling to get out, which is more difficult than getting in or out from a seated position while in ankle deep water. As with the Paul B. Johnson ADA launch, we suspect this one will also be little used as kayakers find alternative launch spots nearby.

New picnic shelters complete the upgrade and are connected by concrete walkways that replace the pavers previously used. You'll also see more fences to restrict access to sensitive shoreline areas. Riprap has been imported to shore-up areas along the bank suffering from erosion caused by our recent Hurricane Ian. The old parking area went underwater during Ian, and we are interested to see how the upgrades weather big storms.

So, prepare for the changes you will encounter on your next visit to Deer Prairie Creek. All things change and evolve but manmade changes can occur shockingly fast. Let's hope the folks at Sarasota Parks and Recreation are as dedicated to preserving the pristine feel of Deer Prairie Creek Preserve as they are to expanding access. It is difficult to manage an area like this in the face of ever-increasing population pressures. We hope the improved access to this small, pristine resource also includes a plan to conserve the beauty and solitude that visitors come here for. Thoughts and prayers for Deer Prairie Creek appreciated.






