

Disaster Preparedness Sales Tax Holiday

The 2023 Disaster Preparedness Sales Tax Holiday is currently underway through Friday, June 9th for disaster preparedness supplies. Some examples of taxfree items include flashlights and lanterns costing \$40 or

less; reusable ice costing \$20 or less; radios costing \$50 or less; tarps and ground anchors or tie down kits costing \$100 or less; coolers and portable power banks costing \$60 or less; batteries and fuel tanks costing \$50 or less; smoke detectors, fire extinguishers, and carbon monoxide detectors costing \$70 or less; and generators costing \$3,000 or less. Also included are a number of items related to the safe evacuation of household pets. Common household consumable items that may be helpful with disaster cleanup are also included. For example, laundry detergent, toilet paper and paper towels, soap, sunscreen, and various household cleaning products, with a sales price of \$30 or less.

If you know Amanda, and by now you should, you know that I don't particularly care for superhero movies. I tend to abandon a series after the first movie when things get too explosiony. For example, the first Iron Man is smart, funny and suspenseful, with a great villain (Jeff Bridges) and relatively few explosions. Iron Man 2 is noisier and if I recall correctly, has an excessive number of robots. The first couple of Batmans (Batmen?) gave us Michael Keaton and next-level villains in Jack Nicholson and Michelle Pfeiffer. But now they are probably looked on as quaint and adorable. "Isn't it cute how so few civilizations are destroyed?"

I basically go to Marvel and DC Universe movies for three reasons: 1) Someone I love wants to see the movie, 2) I recently dragged said someone to a movie they didn't want to

see or, 3) There's nothing else I want to see. When I do end up at an Avengers movie or the 10th Spiderman film, because I've inevitably missed a few in the series, I end up very confused and ruin my loved ones' filmgoing experience. Then I ask questions like "Didn't he die in the first movie?" "What do you mean they're brothers?" and "When did she become evil?"

Imagine my surprise when I actually enjoyed 2014's *Guardians of the Galaxy*. The characters were charming and likable, the music, courtesy of the main character's Walkman, was fun and familiar and major kudos for casting Glenn Close as the leader of the Universe. I gave it four stars and voluntarily saw *Guardians Vol. 2* in 2017 and also awarded that movie four stars

When *Guardians Vol. 3* came out, I was ready. I'd seen both

movies and I was totally caught up. Uh, not so fast.

"There's something you need to know," said my Marvel-savvy daughter, Emma. "One of the characters died in *Avengers: Infinity War*. Well, not really, but mostly. Then the rest of them came back in *Avengers: End Game* and they left in their spaceship to go somewhere else with Thor."

Great, so apparently seeing the first two Guardians movies did not guarantee I would be able to follow the third one. But, apparently the Guardians people know that because the characters spend a lot of time "reviewing" their past, telling us who is related to who and who is sad and who is boss. So even if you don't have an Emma at home, you'll get caught up.

The leader of the Guardians is Peter Quill (Chris Pratt) who is not in top form as he

recovers from all that Avengers nonsense and the "death" of his girlfriend Gamora (Zoe Saldana). Meanwhile his adorable ragtag gang of intergalactic defenders holds down the spaceship until a warlock comes in and injures Rocket (voiced by Bradley Cooper), everyone's favorite super-smart raccoon. Why would anyone hurt an adorable raccoon? Apparently, our villain du jour, The High Evolutionary (Chukwu Iwuji) tortures animals for a reason which, spoiler alert, may not sit well with more sensitive viewers.

We see in flashbacks that Rocket was torn from his raccoon home and tossed in a cell where he becomes close to his fellow mutated animals, who are all incredibly sweet. Meanwhile the non-raccoon Guardians risk everything to save Rocket and that involves plenty of fun banter, especially between giant Drax (Dave Bautista) and adorable Mantis (Pom Klementieff). We also have tough and testy Nebula (Karen Gillan), Groot the tree (voice of Vin Diesel) and Guardian turned Ravager/pirate Gomora who doesn't remember anyone or anything about the Guardians because, again, she is not dead, just a different version of herself.

The relationship of these characters is the best part of the Guardians movies and it's the reason I've managed to see all three. I could do without the many, many creatures, most of which are made of some kind of goo and don't seem to serve any purpose. I also got very confused about what ship everyone was on and why some of the sub-villains were actually there. But I get confused at every Marvel movie.

Writer/director James Gunn has helmed all three of the Guardians movies and he clearly has an affection for the characters and a keen sense of how to tug on viewers' emotions before blowing things up. He also delivers plenty of laughs. Is Guardians Vol. 3 too long? Yes. Is it overblown? Yes, but aren't all Marvel movies? But Guardians made me laugh, yes and nearly cry. (Did I mention the sweet mutant animals?) Assuming there will be a Vol. 4, and there's no reason not too, I'll probably be back.



She's In A League Of Her Own

You could call Susan Parsons Zipay a natural athlete. The secondvoungest of seven children born to William and Doris Parsons during the Great Depression, she honed her skills against her older brothers and sisters, and she was readily accepted by the neighborhood kids – male or female – in Hingham, Massachusetts to play in their daily sandlot games. whether it was baseball, softball or even football. "I started playing sports when I was five." she says. "The first time I put on a pair of ice skates, I could skate right away. Any sport seemed to come easy to me." In high school she played field hockey, basketball and softball, while sandlot baseball with the guys was a regular thing whenever there was a game.

Sue's family scraped by in those depression years, and Sue made no plans for college. "I didn't know what I wanted to do," she says. "I thought I'd just get married and be a housewife. That's what most people did in those days." But by chance, in her senior year Sue's softball

teacher learned of an opportunity for her. Some ten vears earlier. in 1942, a women's professional baseball league had been formed, and it was still going strong. She knew Sue had the talent, and she sent her name to the office of the All American Girls Professional Baseball League. Lo and behold, a few days later Sue received a contract in the mail to play for the "Rockford Peaches" of the AAGPBL. "I hadn't known anything about it until then, but I figured, 'Why not?' So I got on a train and went to South Bend," where the League's headquarters was located.

For the next two years, Sue was a baseball professional at the national level, and she maintained a hectic schedule. "We played every night, and a double-header

on Sundays," she says. Couple that with the travel to and from the four or five midwestern

locales where they played, and not much time was left over for anything else. But it was a great experience, and the players loved it.

Alas, the AAGPBL didn't last. With television blooming, people were staying at home more, and attendance flagged. The founder, chewing gum

magnate Philip Wrigley, sold off the rights, and the new owners didn't have the knowledge and financing to market it properly. The League folded in 1954, though the AAGPBL Players Association continued as an entity representing the former ballplayers. Later on, in 1988, Sue and the other AAGPBL players were inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y. in recognition of their contributions to the sport. But in 1954, Sue was without a job

She went home to Massachusetts and got one with Raytheon as a secretary. But apparently the League had not taken up all of her attention after all, for she'd met Tom Zipay while on tour, they'd had a whirlwind romance, and they were married on Christmas Day of 1954. Tom was to go on to serve in the U.S. Navy as a pilot and in the U.S. Marines as a helicopter pilot before completing

his tour of duty and making a career as a pilot for American Airlines. Meanwhile, Sue made a career as a stay-at-home Mom, raising their three children: David, Judy and Bob.

But that doesn't mean she was inactive. In the early 70s she discovered tennis. "It was easy for me," she admits, "because the motions with the tennis racquet are similar to those in baseball. But I was self-taught, and so I decided to get instruction at Jack

Barnaby's course in Harvard, Mass. and then at Vic Braden's college in California, to learn the proper swings and become capable enough to instruct others." She was a quick study. In 1987, with their children fully grown, Tom and Sue moved to Florida, and after much house-hunting settled in Englewood. In 1989 Sue and her son Bob bought the Englewood Tennis Club, which they have been operating for 34 years now. She has been involved in leadership roles for regional, state and national

women's tennis leagues and their events since then.

But her passion now is focused on baseball. In 1992, women's baseball got a big boost with the release of Penny Marshall's light comedy, "A League of their Own," starring Tom Hanks and Geena Davis.

The AAGPBL players, including Sue, were invited to the studio for inclusion in some of the movie's scenes. Sue was there front and center. After that heady experience, she served on and off as a board member for the Players Association, but she found that the board wasn't doing anything to advance interest in their sport.

"I got it in my head to do something for women who want to play baseball," she asserts. "We've got ice hockey, wrestling, soccer, tennis, golf and softball. But softball is not baseball, and a lot of women don't want to play softball. It's a different game. We need to foster interest in women's baseball." In 2019 she founded American Girls Baseball (AGB), a nonprofit 501(c)3 organization affiliated with the AAGPBL Players Association. Its stated mission is to continue the legacy of this famous women's professional league and provide women with opportunities to train and compete in the game of baseball at every level.

The AGB seeks to recruit sponsors willing to support the sport financially, get donations for specific events and create organized competitive leagues and training programs offering women the promise of a future at the collegiate and professional level

The AGB's initial focus has been on the presentation of an annual "All-American Women's Baseball Classic Tournament," played in November by four teams: the Rockford Peaches, the South Bend Blue Sox, the Racine Belles and the Kenosha Comets, all of them wearing replicas of the original team uniforms. This

year's tournament will be held in Sarasota's Ed Smith Stadium, spring training home of the Baltimore Orioles, which can accommodate 8,500 spectators. The ticket price is a bargain \$10.

Of course there are costs to the AGB for all of this: training, travel, uniforms, overnight accommodations, meals, stadium rental, game programs and promotion, to name a few. Costs can be mitigated by taxdeductible donations from individuals and corporations, and by using volunteer help for any of its many tasks. At this writing, Sue has signed up two sponsors for the event and is seeking more. The principal financial contributor: Sue Parsons Zipay. The principal volunteer: Sue Parsons Zipay.

She is truly in a league of her own. But she'd love to have some other folks join her.

South Florida Gardening Calendar



FERTILIZER RESTRICTION

Both Sarasota and Charlotte Counties restrict the use of fertilizers containing Nitrogen and Phosphate from June 1 through September 30. This protects the water quality in our creeks, lakes and marine water that receive runoff from the storm water system. The counties suggest using iron, manganese and magnesium to help keep your lawn green. For more information go to www. scgov.net or http://charlotte. ifas.ufl.edu/horticulture

WHAT TO PLANT

Annuals/Bedding Plants:

Annuals that can take full sun during the increasingly hot summer months include celosia, portulaca, vinca, and some coleus.

Palms: Summer's warm, rainy months are the perfect time to plant palms. Make sure not to cover the trunk with soil

Herbs: Plant heat-loving herbs, including basil, ginger, summer savory, cumin, Mexican tarragon, and rosemary.

Vegetables: Plant tropical vegetables, such as boniato, calabaza, and chayote this month.

WHAT TO DO

Pests: Monitor the landscape and garden weekly for harmful insects. Knowing which insects attack a plant can aid in identification and treatment.

Irrigation: Watch for drought stress and water as needed if



rainfall has been spotty. Focus on new plantings and follow watering restrictions. When rains begin, shut down the irrigation system.

Propagation: Produce more plants by air layering, grafting, division, or cuttings.

Palms and Cycads: Watch for nutrient deficiencies or other problems and use an appropriate treatment.

Pruning: Lightly prune

summer-flowering shrubs, like hibiscus, oleander, and ixora, during the warmer months to increase blooming.



Lawns: Check frequently for damaged areas and keep insects in check with early treatment. Determine whether yellow and brown lawn patches are caused by chinch bugs, disease, or lack of water. Take time to determine the cause so your remedy is effective. Rejuvenate areas where grass does not grow well by replacing it with versatile groundcovers. Summer rains usually begin this month as do lawn fertilizer restrictions in some areas of the state. Check with your municipality to see if this applies to your area.

Soil Solarization: Clean up your vegetable garden and solarize the soil for 4–6 weeks to kill pests and disease.

Lightning safety: Be safe outdoors during storm season.





Daylight Savings Time for Anglers

As the heat gets turned up towards those summer temperatures that make outdoor activities problematic during the middle of the day, anglers should take advantage of the benefits of Daylight-Saving Time. There are some folks that feel it isn't worth the hassle of changing clocks twice a year, but anglers are a special case.

For instance, if we have dinner at a "normal" hour, say 5-6 PM, that leaves 2-3 hours of daylight for fishing after the evening meal. This eliminates the chance of being late for dinner because the fish were biting. By going fishing after dinner, you are on the water at the best time of day to enjoy that sunset bite. There is a magic hour between a half hour before and after sunset when fish seem to feed with abandon, especially on top water prey. By fishing after dinner, when you come home at dark, you usually won't miss dessert.

The morning bite around sunrise lasts for an hour or so before solar radiation discourages the fish from feeding and the over-heated anglers from fishing. Kayak anglers are mostly shallow water enthusiasts, and their target fish are more influenced by light conditions than many deep-water species. In the winter, when the water is colder, gamefish become more active as the sun warms these


shallow bays. In the summer, the most comfortable temperatures on the flats for both prey and predator are sunrise and sunset when they cool off a little. With gulf water temperatures starting in the mid 80's, the water on our shallow flats can approach 100°F at midday which sends baitfish and gamefish heading for deeper water or shady spots way back under a mangrove shoreline.

With the sun rising around 6:30 a.m. this time of year, it is possible to fish the early morning snook bite on the beach without resorting to "O-Dark 30" heroics. The best time for stalking snook on the beach actually starts an hour after sunrise as the sun gets high enough to come from over your shoulder which gives you the best light for seeing into the water. Of course, polarizing glasses help anglers see snook shadows on the white sand of the trough. By walking into the wind and the shore current, you get to approach these fish from their tail end which lets you get amazingly close before they are spooked. Make long casts diagonally out towards the first bar and retrieve your bait or lure with the current. Snook are ambush feeders that lie quietly in the trough waiting for unsuspecting bait to drift their way. If you see bait scattering, put a cast upstream of that area and you'll usually get a strike.

The evening hours can be a cool time to fish also as the sun sets and a shore breeze cools the afternoon heat. We especially like this time of day for bass

fishing in our local lakes and canals. As the light fades, bass tend to look up to silhouette their prey. Top water lures and flies are most productive during low light times. This time of year, frog imitations are very productive wherever you hear frog calls. Keep in mind that frogs are active because insects are active also. One of the big drawbacks to late day fishing anywhere is the bug issue. A good repellent, long pants and long sleeves can help keep your focus on fishing rather than swatting mosquitoes or no-see-

Now that we've sprung ahead to daylight saving time, anglers should take advantage of these adjusted times to fish and avoid the heat of the day. One of the biggest challenges anglers face is adapting to different conditions and situations that affect themselves and the fish they pursue. Be flexible and you'll catch more fish.

Coast Guard Auxiliary Helps Save Lives

Eagle Eye Award

People ask me "What does the Coast Guard Auxiliary do?" That "what" is boiled down to one simple answer, "We help save lives." The "how" is the more complicated discussion that involves many Coast Guard active duty personnel and Coast Guard Auxiliarists performing a myriad of tasks and missions to protect the public safety. These missions mostly go unnoticed by the public.

One of these missions deploys U.S. Coast Guard surface assets in the South Florida Straits, supported by air assets from Coast Guard Air Station Clearwater, the largest and busiest Air Station in the Coast Guard. This is a complex and coordinated team effort among active duty U.S. Coast Guard, the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary, and partner agencies who perform their duties relentlessly.

On a recent air patrol, four U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Air Team members, Marc Miller, Flotilla 96, Wiggins Pass - Aircraft Commander and Assistant District Flight Safety Officer: Kevin Wilcox. Flotilla 84, Sarasota - Aircrew and Auxiliary Air Coordinator; Graham Leadbetter, Flotilla 87, Englewood - Aircrew, and Nick Koenig, Flotilla 91, Fort Myers Beach - Aircrew, were near the end of their Air patrol when Kevin Wilcox spotted a 28ft chug located 40 nautical miles from Southeast Marathon, Florida in the vicinity of the Cay Sal Bank area.

Being out of air time, they handed off the sighting to a FWC aircraft followed by the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter William Trump. The result of this mission



was saving 26 persons lives. This air-to-surface coordination and synchronization is exactly what these missions are designed to do - help save lives.

Despite all the technological advances employed in these missions, the eagle eyes of the men and women who remain vigilant while conducting lookouts from both air and sea are critical to the success of these missions. For their outstanding

service to this mission, this Air Team was awarded with the "Offshore–Eagle Eye Award" by USCG Captain Tim Sommella.

Next time someone asks you "What does the Coast Guard Auxiliary do?", you can help them understand the one simple answer; "They help save lives."

Pet Hurricane Preparedness Kit

When you assemble your hurricane preparedness kit, remember to pack a kit for your pet. Besides the items listed below, make sure your pet is microchipped in case you are separated and that your pet is up to date on its vaccinations, and you have the records. A photo of you and your pet can help identify you as a pet's owner as well.

Some of the items you will want to include in an emergency kit for your pet are:

Food – Keep at least a week's supply of food in an airtight, waterproof container and food bowl

- Water Store a water bowl and several days supply of water.
- Medicine Keep an extra supply of the medicine your pet takes on a regular basis in a waterproof container.
- First Aid Kit Talk to your veterinarian about what is most appropriate for your pet's

emergency medical needs.
• Collar with ID tag and a harness or leash. Include a backup leash, collar and ID tags. Have copies of your pet's registration information and other relevant documents in a waterproof container and available electronically.

- Traveling bag, crate or sturdy carrier, ideally one for each pet.
- Grooming items Pet shampoo, conditioner, and other items, in case your pet needs some cleaning up.
- Sanitation needs Include pet litter and litter box (if appropriate), newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags and household chlorine bleach to provide for your pet's sanitation needs.
- Familiar items Put favorite toys, treats or bedding in your kit. Familiar items can help reduce stress for your pet.




