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

On Wednesday afternoon, September 28, 2022, technically a category 4 hurricane, but for us, clocked as a category 5, Ian washed ashore and terrorized SW Florida including our beautiful Englewood community and peninsula with howling winds, blinding rain, and surging water for over eight unrelenting hours, resulting in imploding windows that allowed rainwater to pour in, twisted metal from falling gutters and destroyed lanais that screeched across lawns, roofs ripped apart as shingles and tiles flew, trees snapped and toppled like toothpicks, communication towers tumbled to the earth, and fear struck the hearts of those riding out the storm. The carnage proved to be enormous, unbearable for the multitudes that lost everything. No electricity, water, phone, or internet. No access to gasoline or working ATMs; only flooded streets and neighborhood exits blocked by fallen trees and blown debris greeted those trying to escape the prisons of their homes. Our quiet, tropical paradise had been hit hard and left devastated.

clubs in Englewood totaling 243 members that form The Rotary Club of Englewood, The Englewood Lemon Bay Sunrise Rotary Club, The Englewood Sunset Rotary Club, The Englewood Sunset Impact Club and The Rotary Club of Rotonda. Through our passion for service, we are able to use our time, talent, treasure, and connections to get things done. When Hurricane Ian blew into town and knocked us to our knees, Rotary

responded. The collective efforts of our five community clubs made a huge difference to many in need. All five clubs came together for the common good leaving behind individual club cultures in order to make a unified relief effort efficient and effective.

Immediately, through the generosity of one Rotarian that owns a shopping plaza, we were able to set up a collection point for donations that came from places far and wide. Rotary, an international organization, used its connections to bring in an estimated \$500,000 worth of donations to help begin the cleaning up process. Donations required sorting, staging and distribution to the public in need. For two weeks following the storm's appearance, Rotarians showed up to unload semi-trucks full of supplies. One day, two trailers appeared that had 82 pallets, each with 40 cleaning buckets per pallet, which required a forklift. The call for help went out and thirty minutes later we had three forklifts delivered by Rotarians.

Englewood is blessed with many giving souls with huge hearts. Rotarians are also quick to partner with other community stakeholders such as neighborhood associations, and community programs. Results happen quickly when it doesn't matter who gets the credit. We all have our hurricane stories and are eager to share. My purpose is to share a glimpse of Rotary and to say thank you for the numerous volunteer hours given with sweat and tears by so many that have come together to make it better. My heart is full of an attitude of gratitude.

Be sure to include the following: applicant's full name, current address, and damaged dwelling address; applicant's nine-digit FEMA application

number (found at the top of the determination letter); FEMA disaster declaration number; and applicant's signature and date. Record Year for Manasota Key Sea Turtle Nests

October 31st marked the "official" end of the sea turtle nesting/hatching season in Florida, but ... we're not done yet! A few nests remain on the beaches of Manasota Key even now in early November. Coastal Wildlife Club (CWC) volunteers will continue to monitor those nests until the very last one has been inventoried. "It's possible that some of us might be patrolling into December!" said

Carol McCoy speaking for the group.

CWC volunteers are responsible for daily monitoring of about 14 miles of beach in Charlotte and Sarasota counties. In 2022 we documented a total of 5,509 nests! Of those nests, 5,155 nests were Loggerhead (Caretta caretta), 353 Green (Chelonia mydas), and one Kemp's ridley (Lepidochelys kempii). For loggerhead and green sea turtle nests on Manasota Key, these are record numbers! While

these record nest numbers are certainly encouraging when considering the total population. it is important to note that each mother turtle lays several nests during the season and the number of turtles out there is less than the number of nests counted. Each turtle species still warrants protection.

Many people have inquired about Hurricane Ian's impact on sea turtle nests here. While our community unfortunately suffered major destruction, most local beaches were not severely eroded, and most sea turtle nests had hatched prior to the storm.

The Coastal Wildlife Club thanks the public for their ongoing support and concern for the sea turtles that use our beaches for nesting habitat. You can continue helping turtles by reporting any struggling or dead sea turtles you encounter. Please report them to FWC Wildlife Alert 888•404•3922.

Every day during the sixmonth turtle season, Coastal Wildlife Club volunteers monitor the beaches on Manasota Key and part of Knight Island (about 14 miles). Learn more about

Landscape Grants Available Due to plant loss from Hurricane Ian, the Mangrove Chapter of the Florida Native Plant Society is expanding its Landscape Grants to include private homeowners as well as public clubhouses, businesses, and non-profit entryways. These grants are meant to enhance or replace gardens with Florida native plants within the Chapter boundaries (Englewood, Venice, North Port, and Port Charlotte). As I write this, take a guess at how many daily showings there are of the Black Panther sequel Wakanda Forever at my local cinema. Go on, guess. 19! That means if you arrived late for your desired showing you would only have to wait approximately 11 minutes for the next showing.

It also means the movie I saw there the previous weekend, Armageddon Time, is gone, as is the movie I wanted to see this weekend, Tar, starring Cate Blanchett.

The good news is Armageddon Time (R) is not a must-see on the big screen. It's a small film about a Jewish family in New York City in 1980, based on the life of its writer/director James Gray. If it is true to life, that means Gray was a very annoying 12-year-old.

Paul Graff (Banks Repeta) is a sixth-grade troublemaker. He acts out in school and gets in trouble. He ruins family dinners for no reason. He is defiant, angry and hates his life so much he wants to run away. The problem is he's such a brat that when things don't go his way and when he gets in serious trouble, you don't really care. I only felt badly for his parents. I wanted to yell, "Be nicer to your mom. She's trying her best and she cuts you way too much slack "

Paul's mom Esther is played by Anne Hathaway who does a lot with an underdeveloped role. Paul's dad Irving (Jeremy Strong) is less sympathetic since he feels the belt is the answer for Paul's bad behavior. But this kid is exasperating.

Paul finds a fellow troublemaker in Johnny (Jaylin Webb) a Black classmate who is repeating sixth grade. Johnny isn't doing well in school, has a troubled home life and is a victim of "the system". When Paul's parents move him to a private school he's picked on for being Jewish by his entitled classmates who include members of the Trump family. Jessica Chastain has a quick turn



as Mary Trump who delivers a pep talk to the students. It's all a bit odd and doesn't really go anywhere.

I enjoyed Armageddon Time most when Sir Anthony Hopkins appeared as Paul's grandfather. This relationship brings out the best in Paul and we see that he has the potential to be a decent kid. It reminded me of a much better movie, 2021's Belfast. Hopkins elevates every scene he



is in, as does Tovah Feldshuh as his wife and Paul's grandmother.

Gray does a very good job of conveying the time so you always feel like it's 1980. It would have been nice to hear more period music. The dinner table scenes also feel authentic as the best intentions of sharing a meal with family disintegrate into yelling and bad feelings. Ultimately though Armageddon is a bit heavy-handed with its storytelling and worse, gives us a protagonist we just can't root for.

Armageddon Time \star \star \star \star \star

If you enjoyed Knives Out (and who didn't) you should have fun watching the whodunit See How They Run (PG-13) now on HBO.

It's 1953 and there's been a murder at the theater where Agatha Christie's Mousetrap is enjoying a successful run. The victim is an unlikeable American film director (Adrien Brody) with, spoiler alert, a lot of enemies. Enter Inspector Stoppard (Sam Rockwell) and Constable Stalker (Saoirse Ronan), assigned to solve the murder.

Of course, there are plenty of suspects, but none are as interesting as Stoppard and Stalker. Rockwell is terrific as always, but Ronan, who is better known for her dramatic roles, is an absolute delight as the extremely dedicated and determined Stalker, who takes notes constantly and really enjoys arresting people. The two are gold together.

There's another murder (there always is), and eventually the detectives and all the suspects (including an actor playing the actor Richard Attenborough) end up at Agatha Christie's house. Like Knives Out and the works of Christie, See How They Run keeps you guessing. First-time director Tom George infuses the movie with upbeat energy and you can see a bit of director Wes Anderson in his style. It's all good fun and I would not complain if like Knives Out, See How They Run got a sequel, just to see Rockwell and Ronan spar on screen again.





Portrait Of An Artist As A Young Man for a nickel apiece." Okay, he had to give it back, but it seems he already had the business acumen of a freelance artist.

"Disney was a big deal back then, and that was my big inspiration," Bill recalls. "We'd see all the cartoons on a color TV my friend's family had: Mickey Mouse, the Road Runner, Bugs Bunny, and it was so good I could almost smell and taste the color. That was what got me going."

His first notoriety came at age 10. He was in the hospital to have his appendix out, and in the children's ward he drew pictures of Charlie Brown and Snoopy on the glass walls for the entertainment of the other kids there. A local newspaper found out and did an article on him. As he grew older, he would do line drawings of cartoon characters for fun and use oil paint to fill them in, thereby developing some experience with oils while also enhancing his skills as an illustrator.

"I didn't have any formal training in art until I went to art school," Bill says. "I first heard about being an illustrator when I was 14. There were several high-profile illustrators living in our town in Connecticut, and I thought that might be a neat thing to do." Bill graduated from New Milford High School in 1977 with every intention of becoming an illustrator.

He came down to Southwest Florida at age 18 to study at what was then known as the Ringling School of Art in Sarasota. "I liked the area, and that's how I eventually ended up here," he says. At Ringling he took the usual courses in drawing, graphic arts, illustration and painting. "They offered fine arts in my final

year, but the course didn't seem to do anything for me, because I wanted to be an illustrator. I learned a lot on my own after I graduated." His classwork did involve painting with oils. "I remember doing a sports car calendar and a poster for the circus. That was a lot of fun. And in our final year we were putting together portfolios of our work to show when we applied for jobs."

After graduating in 1980, Bill turned down an opportunity to work for American Greeting Cards in Cleveland and decided to go to New York City, the mecca, to find freelance work on his own. "That was tough, and I had bills to pay," he says, so he went back home to work for his dad in land surveying for the next eight or ten years. In 1984 he married his wife Debbie, and he spent full time on the surveying work five or six days a week, while going into the City for freelance assignments in his spare time.

One of his first freelance jobs was for Golf Digest. "My studio for freelance work was at one point in the cellar of our rented cottage, at another time in my mother-in-law's knitting room, and at still another time in what had been the embalming room of a funeral home. A lot of people got the heeby-jeebies when they came into that studio," he jokes. "I didn't care if it was creepy, because I wasn't outside in the freezing cold, and I wasn't surveying-I was painting!" He also took on a teaching job at an art school in Greenwich to help make ends meet.

Finally he started getting freelance assignments with publishers-Harcourt Brace,

Simon & Schuster, Houghton Mifflin, Random House, Holiday House, Cobblestone Books, as well as a children's Bible publisher. "My specialty was children's books," he says, and he was at it full-time. "I did about 60 children's books, and my specialty was historical subjects. They were mostly picture books." The picture books were generally 32 pages in length, and Bill's illustrations might include the cover, the book jacket if there was one, and as many as 28 pictures for the interior pages. Each book was almost a portfolio of his work in itself. And for many of these books, Bill did oil paintings as part of the process. "I'd also go out and do oil paintings for fun," he says, "not as a means to an end."

One of his big projects was for the American Girl series. "That was a two-year project," he recalls. "I went out to Idaho and Oregon and took lots of photos and had them pinned all over my boards." Typically, Bill would take the photos and use them as models for his painted illustrations. At about that time, in the 1990s, digital photography was coming into vogue. Illustrators were finding it easier to use digital photos rather than oils. In Bill's words, "illustrating was heading south, and I didn't want to trade my paintbrush for a pixel." He was ready to move into plein air painting full time.

"Plein air painting started in the 1500s in Italy, where artists wanted to portray life where it was," Bill says. "It is part of a process of collecting information from life, painting small field studies. I use the studies to do larger works, because they offer accurate color and values that a camera can't.'

"Plein air is the most difficult form of painting," he notes. "You can't work from photographs. You have to work outside (hence the name), and you can't control the lighting. Conditions change-time of day, rain, wind can all wreck your project, and you have to get your work done quickly." When he got into plein air artistry, he entered regional and national competitions. The events typically

have 25 to 50 artists from all parts of the world for a week to 10 days. When the competition is over, the plein air works are sold, and if one is lucky, there is also award money to be won.

There was plenty of action. "In any given month, there could be as many as 15 events going on," he recalls. "As the years went by, my work became known, and I would get invited to several competitions in the course of a year." He also taught at workshops and showed his artwork at sponsored events. He placed paintings with fine arts galleries on consignment. "I'd set the price, and if they sold a piece they'd keep 50 percent," he says.

Bill reckons that he's done over 1,000 book illustrations and more than 1,400 paintings in his 40-year career. That is prolific. And he can't claim to have ever been a starving artist. "My profession allowed me to do what I wanted to do and to live a comfortable life," he says. That life includes Debbie, their two daughters, Allison and Caitlin, and their four grandkids.

"Yes, like everyone else I was painting to make money," he admits. "But for me, painting is a way to document your life. As a painter, you go outside, find a place, and sit down for a couple of hours. Pretty soon things begin to happen. You establish understanding and empathy for what you see. You try to put that into your painting, so that others may see what you have seen."

It's fortunate for us that through his numerous landscapes, seascapes and touching portraits, Bill Farnsworth has given us thousands of chances to see and feel what he has seen.


