Vessel Turn-in Program

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission is accepting applications for its Vessel Turn-In Program (VTIP). VTIP is a voluntary program designed to help owners dispose of their unwanted at-risk vessels before they become derelict. Upon approval of an application, VTIP will take a surrendered vessel and dispose of it at no cost to the boat owner. A derelict vessel upon waters of the state is a criminal offense and can carry serious penalties and fines or possible jail time. To qualify for VTIP, a vessel must be floating upon waters of the state of Florida and cannot be determined derelict by law enforcement. The owner must have at least one written at-risk warning or citation and possess a clear title to the vessel. To apply for or view program guidelines, visit MyFWC.com/VTIP or call the

The scheduled speakers will also address how Ian has impacted their subject area. The popular Monday luncheon/lecture series kicks off on **Monday, January 9** with Sidney "Buffy" Crampton, preservationist Steve Avdakov and engineer Charles Jordan addressing "Coastal storm resiliency: MBC's Past, Present and Future," with a walkabout tour following. Hazardous Waste & Sharps Drop-Off

The Mid County Mini-Transfer and Recycling Facility, 19765 Kenilworth Boulevard, Pt. Charlotte, is now accepting household hazardous waste and hypodermic needles (sharps). This service will be available from 8am to 5pm, Tuesday through Saturday. Examples of items accepted: pool chemicals, batteries - lead acid and rechargeable, cleaners and polishers, cooking oil, gasoline, kerosene, diesel fuel, pesticides and herbicides, mercury, paint, strippers, stains, varnishers, fluorescent bulbs, used motor oil, syringes and hypodermic needles in approved containers. This service is for Charlotte County residents only. Proof of residency is required. Businesses are not allowed to participate. If you are physically unable to exchange your sharps container for medical reasons, please call Charlotte County to request a pick-up and exchange 941•764•4360. Sharps are the only biomedical waste accepted at the transfer facility, as "red bag" waste will not be accepted. Please contact your

medical facility for disposal instructions for these types of bio-hazardous waste.

Utilities Payment Scam

Charlotte County cautions customers about providing credit card or other personal information, to callers claiming to be representing county departments. Multiple customers recently alerted the county's Utilities Department stating they were contacted via text message and a recorded phone message that their account was past due, and services would be shut off if they did not make a payment. "Charlotte County Utilities does not contact customers by phone or text message regarding past due accounts. "Our department will mail you an urgent notice if your account is past due", said Charlotte County Utilities Director Dave Watson. If a customer receives a phone call claiming to be from Charlotte County regarding a past due account, they should initiate a call contacting the department in question. "Should you be contacted by phone, text, email, social media or otherwise and









the initiating party asks or mentions a payment method, discontinue communication

immediately. Never give out or confirm sensitive information like your bank account, credit

card, or Social Security number - unless you know who you're dealing with," said Charlotte

County Sheriff's Office Public Information Officer Claudette Smith. "If someone has contacted you, you can't be sure who they are. Ovarian Cancer Prevention Study

While ovarian cancer is relatively rare, it is the fifthleading cause of cancer-related deaths among women. It is a stealthy disease, with no proven screening tests to help with early detection and no noticeable symptoms until its later stages when the cancer is harder to treat. That's why the Sarasota Memorial Research Institute is among 318 research sites across the nation participating in a clinical trial aimed at preventing ovarian cancer in women at high risk for the disease. "At Sarasota Memorial we have multiple trials looking at targeted therapies for ovarian cancer, but this one is probably the most exciting because prevention is better than treatment," said SMH

gynecologic oncologist Beverly Long, MD, principal investigator of the SMH study. "The study is designed to help determine the next best preventable surgery for premenopausal women with a genetic mutation that markedly increases their risk of dying from ovarian cancer." Known as the SOROCk trial, the study will assess whether removing the fallopian tubes (bilateral salpingectomy) reduces the risk of ovarian cancer among premenopausal women with inherited BRCA1 mutations as effectively as removing both the ovaries and fallopian tubes (bilateral salpingo-oophorectomy). Over the next 10 years, researchers will collect data from more than 2,000 premenopausal women (age 35-50) with the BRCA1 mutation, comparing clinical outcomes of those who opt to remove their fallopian tubes and ovaries with those who choose to remove only their fallopian tubes. Women who choose the latter can opt to remove their ovaries later and still be part of the trial. The study excludes women who are pregnant, plan to become pregnant, or have a prior history of ovarian cancer.



No Spring Training at Sports Park




How To Be The Perfect Party Guest

Our hosts made it easy for us to be "good guests." But often when we're invited somewhere we want to know what should I bring? What should I wear? How long should I stay? Here are some tips on how to be a guest who gets invited back year after year.

- If you are invited to a dinner, let your host know if you have any food allergies, aversions or dietary needs in advance, optimally when you RSVP. You did RSVP, didn't you?
- Arrive on time. If you are invited to a formal or sit-down dinner at 6 pm, get there at 6 pm. If you are running late, inform your hosts. If it's a buffet you have more wiggle room, but unless the host asked you to come early to help, don't ever arrive early. If that means waiting in your car, then wait in your car.
- Try to dress for the event. If the invitation says, "Wear your favorite holiday outfit," then make an effort to dress for the holidays. If it's an ugly sweater party, buy or borrow one. Your hosts would not have included it on the invitation if it didn't matter to them. If there is no dress suggestion, then dress up. It's a sign of respect to your host and your chance to wear something other than Florida's uniform of shorts and flip-flops.
- Bring what you say you're going to bring. It's



- Always try and bring a dish you feel confident will be a hit. I have made something for the first time ever for a party and it went over well, but I used a trusted cookbook and left time to go to Plan B if my dish failed.
- Always have a Plan B.
- If your host insists you don't need to bring anything or if you don't have time to prepare a dish, that's OK. But don't arrive empty-handed. Wine, chocolates and flowers are always welcome. And be sure to attach a card. Your host might not get a chance to open your gift until after you leave.
- Take photos and share them with your hosts. They are likely too busy to see to their guests and take pictures, and will really appreciate your effort. Just don't share on your social media until you ask permission.
- Offer to help twice, as in, "Can I help?" And later, "Are you sure I can't help?" If your host refuses, you can still stack plates and throw out trash. I know when I say

- "No," I mean it because I do not want anyone seeing the cyclone that hit my kitchen.
- Know when to leave. If you know you have to leave early, tell your host in advance. If you're hanging out late, watch your hosts for signs that they want the evening to wrap up, and of course offer to help clean before you head out.
- Send a thank you note or email card (I like evite. com and punchbowl. com), or if you must a text. Your host deserves an acknowledgment of their work and hospitality.
- When you host a party, send a detailed invitation like my friends did, being as specific as possible. Don't be afraid to tell your guest "I don't really need a dessert" or "Can you please bring a salad?" And of course, be sure to invite everyone who has invited you to their home.
- Finally, take advantage of after-Christmas sales. If you are invited to a friend's party every year and you know she collects Santas, pick up a Santa for next year's party. How happy will she be when you show up with your famous cheesecake and Santa.







While not a holiday movie per se, The Fabelmans (PG-13) is a gift to moviegoers from Steven Spielberg. It's the semi-autobiographical story of Sammy Fabelman, a young boy who becomes so fascinated with movies that he starts making his

I did a little research and almost everything that happens to Sammy, happened to Spielberg. Almost. But that doesn't really matter because nobody tells a story like Spielberg. I doubt an alien visited Spielberg when he was a kid, but that doesn't make me like E.T. any less.


Like Spielberg, Sammy has an engineer father (Paul Dano), a former concert pianist mother (Michelle Williams) and three vounger sisters. Sammy's story begins in New Jersey when his parents, Burt and Mitzi, bring him to his very first movie, The Greatest Show on Earth (Spielberg's first movie). The movie inspires young Sammy to recreate the train wreck scene and his mother encourages him to film it. Watching Sammy, you understand so much about why the character is compelled

to make movies. You also understand that if that passion was not supported and encouraged by Sammy's parents, we might never have had Jaws and Saving Private Ryan.

Teenage Sammy (Gabriel LaBelle) keeps making movies, wrapping his sisters like mummies, staging battles with his

fellow Boy Scouts, all the while dealing with increasingly complicated family issues. His father's new job moves the family from New Jersey and his grandparents, to Arizona and finally to California, which might eventually be good for Sammy's potential career, but not so good for the family.

In *The Fablemans*, if mom is happy, everyone's happy. The move to California means leaving behind Paul's co-worker and family friend Bennie (Seth Rogen). Where Burt is practical, responsible and even-tempered, Bennie is funny, passionate and



outgoing. Bennie's presence kept Mitzi from feeling like a bored, lonely housewife who gave up her career to raise her kids. With him not there, she does what any bored mom would do and buys a monkey (yes, Spielberg's mom bought a monkey).

California isn't great for Sammy either. His high school is populated by teenagers straight out of yes, the movies, and he's picked on for being Jewish. Spielberg strays from his real-life by giving Sammy a girlfriend, a devout Catholic determined to date and convert him. She convinces Sammy, who has taken a break from moviemaking, to

pick up his camera again. And once again, we can see the passion and thought process that would in just a few years, give the world a director who knew how to masterfully manipulate a movie audience

Because The Fabelmans is more or less based on fact and co-written by Spielberg, with Tony

Kushner, what we see on screen feels absolutely authentic, from the noisy dinners in New Jersey with his Jewish grandparents, to intimate conversations and a senior class "Ditch Day" straight out of Beach Blanket Bingo. When Sammy meets his idol Director John Ford (a genius cameo by Director David Lynch), you might think "Like that would happen." But guess what kids, it did, basically word-for-word.

Every actor delivers an authentic, believable performance, from Rogen who does the most with his limited screen time, to Judd Hirsch who as Mitzi's Uncle Boris, literally bursts into the house, corners Sammy for a wild talk about the circus and following your passion and then leaves in a scene that might win Hirsch an Oscar nod.

And speaking of Oscars, Michelle Williams is obviously gunning for one and Spielberg gives her plenty to work with. Mitzi, like Spielberg's mother, is an emotional, artistic, temperamental force. Williams gets to play guilty, angry, exuberant, heartbroken, nurturing, and she delivers but occasionally pushes it just a bit on over-the-top. Dano, who I normally find annoying, is excellent. But for me, LaBelle is the stand-out as Spielberg's stand-in. In a daunting assignment of playing a legendary filmmaker for that legendary filmmaker, LaBelle is perfect. That's it, perfect. With just weeks to go, The Fablemans, Spielberg's 33rd and his most intimate film, is my favorite movie of 2022.

Be sure to include the following: applicant's full name, current address, and damaged dwelling address; applicant's nine-digit FEMA application number (found at the top of the determination letter); FEMA disaster declaration number; and applicant's signature and date. Mail the appeal letter to: FEMA Individuals & Households Program, National Processing Service Center, PO Box 10055, Hyattsville, MD 20782. Use Caution When Hiring Home Repair

The Charlotte County Community Development Department urges residents to exercise caution when hiring home repair organizations. Most contractors and non-profit organizations are legitimate and know the necessary steps to rehabilitating your home or business after a natural disaster, but there are some organizations that do not have the knowledge and experience in the building permit process. If you are obtaining help from a contractor, please verify their license, insurance, and registration with the county. If you are using a non-profit organization, make sure they are using contractors that are registered with the county as well as obtaining building permits. While getting

discounted labor and materials may be welcome, the pain of having to tear out or redo work may be compounded if that new work lacked proper permitting, inspections and contained substandard materials not approved by the state of Florida. Charlotte County reminds residents debris cleared from vacant land for the purpose of land clearing is not eligible for storm debris collection. All land-clearing debris is the responsibility of the property owner and is required to be disposed of privately by being brought to the county landfill or other proper disposal locations and should not be brought to the roadway for collection. For storm-related information, call the Charlotte County Call Center from 8am to 5pm, Monday-Friday at 941-833-4000 or 941 • 743 • 1320.

Temporary-Use Housing

For residential property not

part of a Manufactured Home Zone District, Sarasota County developed a Temporary Use Permit (TUP) application to be used for those requiring temporary housing on a residential property. However, the property owner will need to check their homeowner's association restrictions. These TUPs are valid for a one-year period, with the ability to extend three months based on an active building permit for the repair/ reconstruction of the residence. If already in a Residential Manufactured Home Zone District, the Sarasota Unified Development Code allows either an RV or a manufactured home in the Residential Manufactured Home Zone District, so a TUP is not required from the county for temporary housing within these districts.

FEMA Scans

A hurricane survivor recently reported getting a text that their "federal government check in the amount of \$2,800 has been disbursed". The text instructed the person to visit a link and provide personal information for FEMA to verify. This is a scam. FEMA is not providing any financial assistance in the amount of \$2,800. If you have applied for disaster assistance, FEMA

will notify you of its decision and it may also contact you if it needs additional information to process your application. This may come in the form of a letter. In some instances, you may receive a phone call. Be extremely careful when clicking any links. Other common scams are if you did not apply for assistance but receive a letter from FEMA, call the FEMA Helpline at 800-621-3362. Con artists may try to apply for FEMA assistance using your name, address, and SSN they have stolen. Be cautious if somebody asks for your nine-digit application number. A FEMA inspector will not ask for this as they already have it in their records. FEMA inspectors never ask for or confirm banking information. Ask the inspector to show their ID badge. Don't believe anyone who promises a disaster grant and asks for large cash deposits or advance payments in full. If you believe you are the victim of a scam, contact local law enforcement and report it to the Office of the Attorney General by calling **866**•**966**•**7226** or visit www.myfloridalegal.com.



Ancient Florida Swamp Is Alive


The Everglades are a part of Florida and if you would like to experience a swamp ecosystem, take a ride down I-75 to Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary, just east of Naples. Part of the western section of the Everglades, this pristine environment lets you appreciate the natural beauty of a bald cypress tree swamp. There are five different ecohabitats on display here: pine flatwoods, wet prairie, central marsh, sawgrass pond, and an old growth bald cypress forest. The sanctuary now occupies about 13,000 acres.

The Corkscrew Swamp is the largest, old-growth bald cypress forest in North America. There are ten landmark old cypress trees

that were never harvested, and the girth of their trunks

is amazing. All the trees, including may apple and southern maple, rise from the swamp floor, forming a "river of trees" during the rainy season. You see many examples of cypress "knees," small stalagmitelike projections raising from the root system of the cypress trees.

To this day, scientists are uncertain as to the purpose

these "knees" serve.

traversed on a wooden boardwalk that travels 2 1/4 miles through five different eco-habitats. No wading through muck and mire on this path, although it can be a little slippery after a rain without sole-gripping shoes. Most of it is under canopy although there are some open spaces when

you walk

along the edge

of the marsh prairie. Being that it was rainy season, the canopy floor was alive with blooming aquatic and marsh prairie plants.

Signage reminds you to speak softly and, in the peace and quietness, your ears attune to the 'noise of silence'. It is relaxing to listen to the birds, hear the breeze through the trees, and just enjoy the sounds of silence.

Bird watchers will love this sanctuary and it is a gateway site for the Great Florida Birding Trail by the Audubon Society. Not being bird watchers, we did not seek out the birds, but their numbers were many and songs varied as they noted our passage through their territory.

Depending on the season, you have opportunities to see many bird species, from the wood stork, snowy egret, and bald eagle to painted bunting, bluegray gnatcatcher, green and tricolored heron, and black-bellied whistling duck. Standing dead trees, called snags, are killed by lightning or disease, and become an important wildlife habitat for birds. Taking binoculars is wise.

Early in the 1900s ladies' fashions included hats with long and decorative feathers.
Millions of birds were killed just for their plumage, such as snowy egrets, herons, storks, and other wading birds. One such camp was located here at Corkscrew Swamp. The National Audubon Society moved to protect

these birds nesting here in 1912 and in 1954 worked to save the forest, accepting responsibility for the area, and creating the Corkscrew Swamp Sanctuary.

One of the special sights of the Corkscrew Swamp during the late summer is

the elusive ghost orchid. Attached high above the floor in a tall bald cypress tree, it is a pale yellowishgreen color that almost looks ghostly (hence its name.) There are about 2,000 of them left in the wild and they are found only in SW Florida and Cuba. There is only one noted in the sanctuary and you must use binoculars to sight Our mammal sightings were limited to SE lubber grasshoppers, raccoons, fox squirrels, butterflies, and water skippers. Being the area was one big flowing sheet of water, varying in depth from a few inches to a few feet, that eliminated

mammals such as black bear and white-tailed deer.

The origin of the Corkscrew Watershed is several miles northeast of the sanctuary. The water moves slowly towards the Gulf of Mexico in broad sheets, providing

freshwater for coastal rivers and estuaries. The water all comes from rain and despite the black color (caused by tannic acid from the trees) the water is very clean. Although full of water in the summer and fall, the water level falls to nearly dry in the spring.

Wet prairies or marshes are ecosystems that have water for more than five months each year and are covered by plants such as grasses, sedges, and forbs (herbaceous flowering plant that is not a graminoid). We saw lots of large, broadleaved plants known as Alligator Flag (or Fire Flag) with their spiked stalk blossoms. We did not see any of the plants' namesake - alligators. Other plants present were pickerelweed, lance-leaf arrowhead, lichen, water fern, water lettuce, and buttonbush.





Seven Interesting Facts About The Winter Solstice

Nocturnal animals and human night owls may rejoice during the winter solstice. On the winter solstice, people can witness the Earth's longest night and shortest day of the year for their respective hemispheres. For individuals living in the northern hemisphere, the winter solstice generally occurs between December 20 and 23 each year. Those in the

southern hemisphere experience the winter solstice between June 20 to June 23.

In 2022, the northern hemisphere's winter solstice occurs on December 21 at 4:47pm. The solstice may come and go unnoticed, but it's an interesting day on the calendar.

1. Not only will the winter solstice occur on a specific date, it also occurs at a specific time when the Earth's semi-axis tilts furthest from the sun. This corresponds to when the North Pole is aimed away from the sun on

Earth during the December solstice

the 23.5 degree tilt of the Earth's axis. At this point, the sun also shines directly over the Tropic of Capricorn. The information and trivia site Mental Floss says the solstice happens at the same moment for everyone on the planet. However, the hour it occurs depends on your time zone.

2. Areas of the Northern Hemisphere can have varying lengths of day and night on the solstice. For example, New York City may have nine hours and 15 minutes of sunlight on the winter solstice. If that upsets New Yorkers, they may be happy to be outside parts of Finland, some of which get less than six

hours of sunlight on the solstice.

3. The word "solstice" is derived from Latin and means "sun stands still." It was chosen to describe this cosmic phenomenon because the solstice sun seemingly appears in the same position at noontime for several days before

and after the winter solstice — at its lowest point in the sky.

- 4. It is easy to mistake the solstices for the equinoxes, which also occur twice a year. However, the equinoxes occur in fall and spring and mark when the sun is directly above the equator and night and day are of equal length.
- 5. Despite the winter solstice indicating the beginning of the astrological winter, it may not be the coldest time of the season. Usually those temperatures are reserved for January and February.
- 6. The Farmer's Almanac reports that many cultures marked the arrival of the solstice as a time of death and rebirth. Early man also kept track of the days by observing the sun's position in the sky. In fact, historians believe Stonehenge was created to monitor the sun's yearly "movement."
- 7. Many traditions associated with Christmas originated during Pagan celebrations for the winter solstice. For example, Scandinavians would burn a juul (yule) log in the hearth in honor of the god Thor. Thor's job was to bring the sun's warmth back to the people.

While the winter solstice and the lack of sunlight synonymous with it may not be something everyone looks forward to, there is a silver lining. Following the winter solstice, the hours of sunlight gradually increase by the day, eventually paving the way for the spring equinox.




