





Indicators of Storm-Related Fraud are: 1) A contractor or restoration professional who offered to waive or discount your insurance deductible. 2) A contractor or restoration professional that has received payment and has failed to provide any repairs to your home. 3) A contractor or restoration professional who offered to provide repairs at a cash-only discounted rate and has failed to provide repairs to your home. 4) A contractor or restoration professional who pressured you to sign an AOB and has failed to provide any repairs to your home or stopped responding to your contact attempts. 





# What I'm Watching

For the first time in a long time, what I'm watching is broadcast network comedies! While the new batch isn't up to the level of my dearly departed faves Parks and Recreation and Brooklyn Nine-Nine, these shows show promise and prove that the networks can still produce quality sitcoms. It's not quite enough to fill a column but it's a start.

Abbott Elementary (ABC, Tuesday) is a charming and funny sitcom about teachers in a struggling inner-city school in Philadelphia. Created by and starring Quinta Brunson and wisely filmed "mockumentary" style like The Office, sharp dialogue and relatable characters have helped Abbott become a hit. Brunson's Janine is idealistic and enthusiastic, but her fellow teachers who have been at the school for decades, not so much. The cast is wonderful although Janelle James as Ava, the principal who has no business being a principal, makes me want to throw my #2 pencil at the TV.

Grand Crew (NBC, Tuesday) follows a group of young black professionals as they deal with life, work and relationships in Los Angeles and hang out at a wine bar in their spare time. Created by Dan Goor and Philip




Augusta Jackson of Brooklyn Nine-Nine, the show boasts one of the most charismatic casts on TV and it's very funny. It's a joy to watch a sitcom that strives to be smart and relevant, while not skimping on laughs.

*Pivoting* (Fox, Thursday) is much better than its premise would suggest. Three female friends who have been close since childhood react to the death of another friend with impulsive and life-changing decisions. While the writing is a bit more pedestrian than Grand Crew and Abbott Elementary, the three leads, Eliza Coupe, Ginnifer Goodwin and Maggie Q, have such great chemistry, that they make the most of tired storylines (bad mom wants to be good mom, nice mom has



a crush on her trainer, etc.) Coupe is the stand-out here as the semi-attentive mom with the awesome husband. Like many Fox sitcoms, *Pivoting* is a bit more edgy with plot lines and language than the average network sitcom.

The Woman in the House Across the Street from the Girl in the Window (Netflix) does not live up to its genius title. It's supposed to be a send-up of all the movies and books where a woman, in this case Anna (Kristin Bell), witnesses a murder and, gosh darn it, nobody believes her. Anna sees "the girl in the window" get killed, but since a personal tragedy has led her to excessive wine drinking and blacking out, she is not the most reliable witness. The problem with The Woman in the House etc. is that it doesn't go all in with the humor and parody, creating an uneven and confusing viewing experience. It's also way too long. I will say the last episode and killer reveal is a doozy.




The Gilded Age (HBO) is created by Julian Fellowes, the man who brought you Downton Abbey with the same music you listened to when you were watching Downton Abbey, but set in 1880s New York City instead of London. It's old money versus new money and opulent homes versus ridiculously opulent homes. The servants are loyal, disgruntled or up to no good and the older generation is doing its best to prevent the younger generation from socializing. Christine Baranski and Cynthia Nixon are fabulous as sisters trying to keep their niece out of trouble. If you can stop thinking "I wonder how much that property would cost in New York today," The Gilded Age is very entertaining.


School of Chocolate (Netflix) takes everyone's favorite confection to the next level. I feel like a rock star when I make frosting from scratch, but seeing what these professional

chefs do with chocolate under the guidance of a cool French teacher guy is mind-boggling. A certain columnist may or may not have gotten so hungry watching School of Chocolate that she resorted to eating hot fudge sauce out of the jar at 11:30 at night.

Raid the Fridge (Food Network) may not have an intimidating French teacher guy, but it does have a fun premise. Professional chefs have to create dishes from ingredients in fridges that are "exact replicas" of refrigerators of regular people like you and me. Magnets and stuff on top of the fridge provide clues on what might be inside and the winner gets a fridge full of cash. My verdict: Everyone has bacon in their fridge. Beware the "Portland Hipster Fridge" and who in the world keeps their marshmallow fluff in the fridge?

# ADDRESS AIR LEAKS TO SAVE ENERGY AND MONEY

Rising energy costs coupled with the continued adoption of eco-friendly lifestyles are two factors driving homeowners to seek ways to reduce energy consumption in their homes. Reducing energy consumption is reason enough for many homeowners to make changes around the house, but saving energy sometimes means saving substantial amounts of money as well.

Energy-efficient appliances and eco-friendly building materials can help homeowners reduce energy consumption. But homeowners looking for additional ways to cut cooling and heating costs can address air leaks around the house to make their homes more energy efficient.

• Identify air leaks around windows and doorways. Winter in Florida is a great time of year

to identify air leaks. On those cold nights, particularly if it's windy, the cold air makes it easy to detect air leaks. Feel for leaks around windows and doorways when it's cold; you can quickly detect if air is flowing in from the outside. Leaks around windows and doors waste energy because the interior of the home is either colder (in the winter) or warmer (in the summer) than it needs to be, prompting homeowners to turn up their thermostats or rely more heavily on air conditioning units

Look for leaks elsewhere around the house. While windows and doorways are where many leaks are found, leaks also may be found around plumbing, electrical fixtures and dryer vents. Inspect such areas by feeling for drafts or looking for signs that insects and critters might be entering.

Look up and down. Evidence of air leaks may be noticeable on both the floor and the ceiling. Dirty spots on carpeting and the ceiling may be indicative of air leaks at interior wall/ceiling joints and wall/floor joists. Fixing such leaks may be as simple as applying some caulk.

Go with gaskets. The United States Department of Energy recommends installing foam gaskets behind outlet and switch plates on walls. Outlets and switch boxes on exterior walls provide another place for air to leak into a home and drive up energy costs. Properly installed gaskets can cut back on air infiltration, providing an inexpensive way to save energy and money.

• Cover the kitchen exhaust fans when you are not cooking. Kitchen exhaust fans can help prevent fires and unfavorable

indoor air conditions when preparing meals at home. But such fans provide opportunities for air to enter a home, so make sure they are tightly closed or covered when no one is cooking in the kitchen.

Air leaks around a house



can waste energy and contribute to high energy bills, particularly during the winter and summer when temperatures outside tend to be at their most extreme. Homeowners looking to reduce their energy consumption and save money can inspect various areas of their homes for air leaks and immediately address any they discover.









# His Message Is Clear: Be Prepared

How does an Australian farm boy with "humble beginnings," to use his words, end up keeping company with kings, queens, heads of state and international celebrities in far-off lands such as Austria, Brazil and Tanzania? Certainly not via a magic carpet, a friendly genie or a very rich uncle. Lawrence Anthony ("Larry") Wilson can tell you he did it the hard way: on his own.

Born to Lawrence and Judith Wilson in Sydney in 1972 as the youngest of four strapping boys, he was a scrawny kid who got bullied and picked on from the time he was 5 years old. But he was a scrappy one. "Even then I didn't back down," he says. "I'd go right back at 'em with all I had." As he grew older, he also grew bigger and stronger and faster, and by the time he was a teenager at 6'4" and 265 lbs, most folks wouldn't want to find out how tough he really was.

"I was a capable but unwilling student in school," he admits, although he points out that his Mom, a career nurse and healthcare worker, gave him a liking for biology and medicine. "I was more into hunting and fishing," he says. He was also an outstanding athlete, excelling in rugby, cricket, field hockey and motorcross biking, which earned him some attention from area sports fans.

The family farm raised beef cattle and dairy cows, and young Larry put in long hours at farm chores every day. When he was old enough, he also spent four evenings a week flexing his muscles as a bouncer at the local bars along Sydney's waterfront. He took courses in a variety of martial arts along the way, and it was at Sydney's harbor that he first developed his skills in maintaining order in crowded conditions that could become hazardous-particularly when U.S. Navy sailors were in town on shore leave after a lengthy tour

"In 1993 I met a gentleman—a former soldier in Rhodesia, now Zimbabwe—who had a personal protection company, and he told me that if I came to work for him, I could make big money as a bodyguard, \$50 an hour

for four hours' work per day compared to the \$20 an hour I was making. That sounded great. But he said I needed some field experience in a war zone setting, to prove to myself that I could operate successfully under

dangerous conditions. I was 21 years old, and the next week I was off from Sydney to Paris, France on a one-way ticket, ready to join the French Foreign Legion and gain that experience." He signed on with the FFL, but shortly after his arrival in Paris he "became sick enough to pass on a chance to become cannon fodder in a battle zone," he says. Instead, when he recovered his health he went back to Sydney and worked for a couple of years for his Rhodesian friend, doing close protection for witnesses who were waiting to testify in court.

"I knew then that I had the skill set to make a career by providing protection for others who did not have those skills," he says. By this time he had taken every martial arts course he

could sign up for, and he was ready. There's a saying that chance favors the prepared mind, and Larry was prepared to make a life of helping others be prepared.

In 1996 he went back to Paris, where he worked briefly for the Australian government and then landed a job as a security officer at the United Nations Headquarters in Vienna. Austria. In that capacity he had duties much like the U.S. Marine Corps guards have at America's embassies around the world: screen entrants to the property and check the security of the premises daily. "Once you crossed into our UN enclave, you were in our territory, and we had the power to arrest and prosecute any intruder," he says. That gave him experience in the use of police powers to protect UN property at the massive headquarters building. He also traveled out of Vienna to provide personal protection for UN authorities at conferences and other meetings.

In 1998 he took on a bigger assignment as Special Projects Supervisor for the UN's International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY) in The Hague, Netherlands, which was prosecuting war criminals from the armed conflict between Bosnia and Herzegovina. This involved him in mission work for Head Prosecutor Carla Del Ponte in Macedonia, Kosovo and



Tanzania and providing security for all evidence collected in the cases

In 2002 the Australian government posted Larry to its embassy in Berlin, where he did background checks on foreign nationals seeking citizenship in Australia. In 2008 he went back to UN Headquarters in Vienna as Senior Security Officer, a position he held for the next six years. It was in those years that he dealt extensively with internationally known figures. "I looked after lots of dignitaries," he says fondly. "The King and Queen of Sweden, the King and Queen of Thailand, our Australian Prime Minister, the Director General of the UN, America's Secretary of State Hillary Clinton and American actor and film director Nicolas Cage. I had dealings with Turkey's President Recep Erdogan, Monaco's Prince Albert and many others."

His responsibilities at the UN included not only close protection of dignitaries but also responding to intrusions on UN property and public protests in the compound or its perimeters, responding to alarms at the UN's highly sensitive narcotics and nuclear research laboratories, and also to medical incidents that might occur anywhere on the property. He provided countersurveillance and intelligence services to the UN's Threat and Risk Department, and training for the UN's counter-assault team members. In all his years of security work, Lawrence found himself in many a "tight situation," as he puts it, but he was able to use his own training and experience to avoid serious injury and to head off disaster. He put that experience into the training he gave to others. "I wanted them to be prepared," he says. "It's better to be ready for trouble and not experience it than it is to experience trouble and not be ready for it."

In January of 2015 Larry moved over to the International Atomic Energy Agency in Seibersdorf, Austria as Site Security Supervisor. In that capacity he was the primary liaison for the IAEA with the UN's Department of Safety and Security and with the Austrian police. He was responsible for protection of the Seibersdorf nuclear labs and all their personnel, assets and facilities-a

critical job for a high-risk category 2 nuclear site. Not bad for a one-time Australian farm boy who decided to make himself into a protector of others.

Larry did have one occurrence that he wasn't prepared for. He met a beautiful young woman named Aleida in 2010 at UN headquarters, but he found himself not ready to make her acquaintance. "I was still involved in another relationship, which was winding down badly,' he says. It seemed that a golden opportunity had passed him by, but some two years later he by chance met her again, and this time his mind was prepared. Things got serious, they became a couple, and they got married in

"In 2017 my project with IAEA ran out, and Aleida and I decided to move to America," Larry says. "I had job opportunities in New York, and I could have stayed with the UN, but I decided I wanted to have a business of my own and be my own boss."

During the years he was in Europe there were crises everywhere, and in every country hostile environment awareness training (HEAT) was a requirement. "I had developed expertise in that field. I was a weapons specialist, a counterassault trainer, a tactical medical instructor, skilled in emergency response activity. I had training in threat and risk assessment, fire protection, radiation security measures, incident command and rescue techniques." He felt he could offer that expertise to America, where hostile situations seemed to be becoming ever more frequent and dangerous.

He and Aleida now had some company: their young daughter Isabella and also Sophie and Nicolas from Larry's prior conjugal relationship. "We're a real mishmash of nationalities," he says, all having been born outside the U.S. They moved first to New Jersey and then rather quickly relocated to Florida, where the weather was friendlier. "We love it here in the Englewood area. It's quiet. It's off the beaten track, and people only come in this way if they live here or they're lost. We looked and looked, and we finally found the right home last August. It's a fantastic community and it has fantastic schools. We'll be

staying here and putting our kids through college and letting them build careers of their own."

Lawrence and Aleida have set up a company called American equalizer that offers training in tactical medical response, proper pistol and rifle technique, and for local entities, hostile environment awareness and response. He's begun giving talks at volunteer organizations and has already found several new clients in the short time he's been here. "We can show people how to cope with whatever emergencies they might encounter," he says, "and we fervently hope they will never encounter them."

Amen. Now that's a service we could all benefit from.

# Shallow Water Structure

Anglers relate to structure because so many gamefish hang around it. Structure can be anything from a rock pile on an otherwise barren sandy bottom out in the gulf to a PVC pipe that marks a channel or hazard for boaters. Kayak anglers and shore fishermen utilize structure including the pilings of a pier, mangrove roots, oyster bars, and locations like bridges and seawalls.

This confluence of gamefish and anglers around structure is not a coincidence. Baitfish, crabs, shrimp, and other goodies hide in structures to stay alive. The most obvious hiding place around our estuaries is among the roots of the red mangrove. That's why kayakers, flats skiffs, and wading anglers work their way along mangrove shorelines. The abundance of bait draws snook and redfish on a high tide that allows them into this nursery to feed. As with most structure fishing, the challenge for the angler is getting a hooked fish away from the structure. Most structures around saltwater will have barnacles or other sharp shelled attachments that can cut braid or mono with ease. Keeping a snook out of these roots will test an angler's tackle as well as their determination.

Wading anglers and kayakers can approach crab traps, old docks, and seawalls that attract bait and gamefish, too. A word of caution though about crab traps, and the floats that mark them. The trap and the float are usually several yards apart, depending on the water depth and current. Do not cast between them or over the rope that connects them. It's really hard to free a barbed hook from a rope but you should never, under any circumstances, raise or move a trap; that's a big no-no. The alternative is to cut off the lure or hook and leave it





in the rope where it could inflict a severe injury to the crabber when he checks his traps. They hate this. You would, too.

Bridges are popular places for shore anglers that take advantage of the structure involved and the tidal flows produced by the narrow channel under bridges. The deep channel next to the shallow water near the abutment helps, too. On a rainy day, or a sizzling summer afternoon, under a bridge may be the most comfortable spot to fish. Bridges can be especially productive at night when the fender lights draw baitfish and shrimp to waiting snook, snapper, redfish, ladyfish, and others. Sheepshead hang out at the base of bridge pylons where lines can be easily cut on the attached barnacles. As mentioned above, the issue with fishing structure is getting the fish out of it. Snook, in particular, will utilize any nearby structure to free themselves. A little heavier tackle and an aggressive attitude will be needed to land most bridge fish.

How about that lone PVC pipe stuck on the edge of a flat? The most common reason it's there is to mark a deeper area or channel for navigation. We think

of it as structure, not for just the pipe itself, but more importantly it marks a change in depth and that's a type of structure. As low tide approaches, predators and baitfish move off the shallow flats that can, in the winter, be dry at low tide. The bigger fish leave first and stage in nearby deep spots. As the water continues to fall, the smaller baitfish head to these same spots and concentrate there which makes for easy pickings for waiting predators. That's a good spot to be in as an angler. Whether you're a shore fisherman, a kayak angler, or just wading the flats, structure is productive. Use it.



# **EARS Assists In Hoarding Situation**

Englewood Animal Rescue Sanctuary has reached out beyond Englewood to rescue seven of 63 dogs seized in a horrendous hoarding situation in North Carolina. An EARS volunteer, Sandra Clouatre, is from the area where this tragedy took place and asked her fellow EARS associates if they could provide help as the shelter in Gaston County was overrun. EARS shelter manager Todd Zimmerman and Sandra made the long drive on January 24th and returned the next day with seven of those dogs. All the dogs were basically feral, kept both inside and outside the house in squalid conditions, and had experienced no human touch. They were shy and timid and would bite when

approached by a human. There were several dead dogs on the property as well.

EARS staff and volunteers are proving that love can overcome fear and the dogs are beginning their transformation from fearsome animals to pets who are learning to trust humans and value their love and companionship. Two animal behaviorists, one a seasonal visitor from Michigan, are helping teach the fosters how to approach and gain the dogs' trust and work towards socializing them.

This kind of endeavor is very expensive. One of the dogs has already tested positive for heartworms and appointments

for testing have been scheduled for the rest. Treatment for heartworm costs well over \$1,000 per dog and EARS does not have funding for this in their reserves. The dogs also need all their vaccinations, flea control, spaying/neutering, and other medical issues that may be uncovered during vet exams. All the dogs were malnourished and are now being fed a high quality (expensive) pet food by Fromm. EARS is extremely grateful to Laurel Road Veterinary Clinic in Nokomis for stepping up to offer their services for these dogs at a reduced rate; donations to this clinic and earmarked for these dogs' treatment would be most welcome. The dogs are small, mixed breeds who are very smart and are approximately 2 to 5 years old. They need lots of love and time plus training to allow their individual personalities to emerge, but Todd Zimmerman believes they will all be little love machines once their faith in humans is established. Their names, given to them by EARS, are Enzo, Milo, Gage, Sasha, Oliver, Rupert, and Charlie.

Sandra, the EARS Volunteer who initially had all the dogs in her home, is working hard to establish the beginning of the trust process with people.

Because the dogs had no real interaction with humans and no experience with the outside world, she stresses that these dogs have a long road ahead of them to overcome these handicaps and it will take individuals who have the patience, love, and time necessary to help them adjust and become a part of a human family. Sandra has no dogs of her own now but has embraced fostering as a way to get her "dog fix" and she likes the challenge of working with dogs to prepare them for their forever home.

I visited with the three dogs who were still in Sandra's care. These dogs are timid but have made amazing strides in accepting humans and follow Sandra around the house as their pack leader. While feeding them chicken bites, all three surrounded me and I was able to pet one of them. They want to love, and the EARS volunteers are allowing that process to happen. Sandra voices the need for foster pet parents for the organization, "The more fosters we have, the more lives we can save "




