Kudos to CODA

In a previous column I expressed my affection for the Apple+ film CODA. On Sunday, at the Academy Awards show, everyone was talking about it for the wrong reasons. The movie scored a bit of an upset by beating *Power of the Dog* and Belfast, to win the Oscar for Best Picture. CODA is an old-school family and work drama with a great story, humor and lots of heart. The entire cast of mostly deaf actors, especially Marlee Matlin and Oscar-winner Troy Kotsur, is exceptional. If you haven't seen it, you can sign up for Apple+, watch CODA and binge watch the Emmywinning comedy Ted Lasso. And good news, at press time it was back in the theaters, including Venice Spotlight.

Meanwhile at the Movies

A movie like CODA is just fine on the small screen, but bigger films deserve bigger screens. Cvrano is the latest take on Edmond Rostand's classic Cyrano de Bergerac. You know the story. Set in 17th century France, Cyrano is brilliant with words and the sword, but cursed with an abnormally large nose, he is unable to express his love to the beautiful Roxanne. When Roxanne falls in love with one of Cyrano's soldiers, who is not as eloquent, Cyrano woos Roxanne for him.

In this version, based on an off-Broadway production written by Erica Schmidt, Cyrano, played by the brilliant Peter Dinklage from Game of Thrones, is fearful of expressing his love because he is a dwarf. He's also brave, charismatic, charming and funny. Roxanne (Haley Bennett) is dating a creepy Duke but falls in love, at first sight, with Christian (Kelvin Harrison, Jr.) a dashing soldier in Cyrano's regiment. Oh, and did I mention this Cyrano is a musical? Not a fun Producers musical or a go-for-broke Les Miserables musical, more of





an "I'll just sing a few words here and there" musical. Bennett has a beautiful voice and gets the most opportunity to sing. Dinklage, who originated the role on stage, equates himself nicely, but he's so intense and soulful, it doesn't matter that he's not the strongest singer. There is one exceptional song, "Wherever I Fall," sung on the battlefield, that had me in tears.

Director Joe Wright (Atonement and Pride and *Prejudice*) has a way with a period piece. The film is exquisite and is packed with imagery from the battle scenes to choreography in a bakery that I fear will be lost if and when you watch at home. No matter, it is worth seeing Cyrano, especially for Dinklage's performance.

Three Things I'm Watching on TV

Drive to Survive is back for its third season on Netflix. I am a long-time Formula One

racing fan and obsessed with this show. But apparently, now *Drive* is one of the streaming network's biggest hits. While I'm fairly sure that many fans are not waking up at 7 am on a Sunday to watch the Austrian Grand Prix in real time. I also understand how Drive to Survive has enthralled so many viewers. This show has everything; drama, humor, fast cars, handsome men with cool accents, intense rivalries, exotic settings, and a heads up, lots of swearing, some of it quite creative. The camerawork is phenomenal. Watching Drive to Survive, you feel like you are on the track. And if you're up at 7 on a Sunday, take in the real thing.

If you like Amy Schumer, you will enjoy the Hulu dramedy Love and Beth. Schumer's Beth is drifting through life with a less than ideal job and boyfriend, when in the very first episode, major tragedy hits. Schumer not only stars, she is a writer, director and producer of the show, which she has said is semi-autobiographical. I am about three episodes in and the series is beginning to find its way, partly due to a fun and low-key supporting turn by Michael Cera.

As I anxiously await the May return of my favorite not-quite-a-sport, offbeat competition series Holey Moley, I've become hooked on a show about dominoes. Domino Masters is hosted by a very enthusiastic Eric Stonestreet of Modern Family. It features teams with fun names like the Dominerds and Charlie's Angles, creating extremely elaborate structures that involve impressive chain reactions, disco balls, fireworks, jelly beans, axes and flying cats. When Stonesreet declares "It's topple time!", you can't turn away. Domino Masters is just plain fun.





Notable NEIGHBORS

uergen Kroos is already noticeable in his neighborhood. On his 140-ft. by 100-ft. residential lot in Englewood Isles, he grows over 40 different fruits and vegetables, and he gives many of them away to friends and neighbors. Want some oranges, passion fruit, papayas, lemons, limes, plums, strawberries, pineapple, persimmon or bananas? He'll get you a few. Or how about parsley, rosemary, basil, peppers, tomatoes, lettuce, radishes, eggplant, onions, cucumbers or parsnip? Sure, help yourself. He enjoys gardening, but he gets even more pleasure from giving samples to others who enjoy eating them.

But that's not what Juergen is truly notable for. Gardening is only a sideline, a hobby. Juergen is, and has been for years, the "King of Cans"-that is, the master at making those ubiquitous containers of so many food products we all eat.

Think about it. A can must be light in weight, yet sturdy. It must be suitable for containing powders such as tea or coffee, solids such as pears and peaches, liquids like soups and sodas, or semisolids such as dog meat. It must be suitable for long-

term storage, yet easily opened. And it must be pliable enough to take on any shape or size, from a snuffbox to a barrel. The manufacturer must have a production line that shapes the can, inserts the product, seals the can and adds the label. The process of making it is complex and variable, and it takes someone with the technical and mechanical skills, the experience, and an understanding of the whole process to master it. Juergen has done just that. Here's how he became the "King."

He was born and raised in Glashagen, Germany, well within the region that was known in the post-World War II era as East Germany, the Deutsche Demokratische Republik. His parents were wealthy farmers, with 1250 acres of land given to raising sheep, cows, pigs, horses, grain, sugarbeets and potatoes. Their "farmhouse" looked like a Victorian estate you'd see on BBC television. And Juergen and his seven, count 'em seven, siblings didn't have to work the farm. There were over 40 hired hands to do that. "We had a sheltered life," he says, "... until 1945." That's when

The 'King of Cans' the war ended and Russian

troops moved in to occupy their sector of Germany. Russian soldiers plundered the Kroos farm, "taking everything that wasn't nailed down," Juergen remembers. Shortly after that, their farm being large, it was confiscated by the East German authorities in the new Communist government. "A friend of ours in the administration warned us of this two days before it happened," Juergen recalls, "but when we received the formal notice, we had two hours to collect our belongings and leave the farm.'

There followed a tortuous trip for the family of ten, by horse-drawn wagon, by cattle car, by train and "by hook and by crook" that ended up in Goettingen, in the British zone of occupation in December of 1945. Over the next eight years, which can best be described as "hardship" in that war-torn country, Juergen's schooling came in fits and starts, but he got his first exposure to English and earned an apprenticeship in can manufacture, becoming a journeyman machinist as well as a journeyman farmer before he was to emigrate from West Germany to Canada.

When he disembarked in Canada from the liner "Seven Seas" on May 23, 1954, he says, "I was 22 years old with \$5 in my pocket. What a beginning!" And oh yes, he had a contract to serve on a farm near Ottawa for one year. He lasted three weeks. The living conditions were miserable and the work strictly hard manual labor. So he headed for Montreal and

thus began an odyssey that took him through job sites in ten different locations, everincreasing responsibilities and compensation, and eventually a demand for his knowledge and skills from companies in some 20 countries around the globe.

He began by teaching horseback riding to vacationers in the Laurentian Mountains



north of Montreal. That fit his background as a rider on the family's farm in Glashagen, but it was just a temporary stopgap. He soon found a job as a tool & die machinist at Eagle Toys in Montreal. A year later he took a similar job at an aircraft factory in southern Ontario. His first big break came when he landed a position as a maintenance machinist

When he disembarked in Canada from the liner "Seven Seas" on May 23, 1954, he says, "I was 22 years old with \$5 in my pocket. What a beginning!"

at American Can, one of the giants in the field of container manufacture. "They transferred me to the section where the cans were manufactured. It gave me the chance to learn everything about can manufacturing, and I applied some of my own ideas to improve the machines for better production," he says. AmCan realized they had a budding talent on their hands. They first assigned him to train new machine workers and then asked him to come to the company's headquarters in New York City.

Out of AmCan's New York headquarters, the execs began to ask Juergen to trouble-shoot in factories around the U.S. and also in Puerto Rico, Canada and Venezuela. He did so, and in solving some problems for the company he made lasting contacts and friends within the industry. When AmCan moved its headquarters to Greenwich, N.Y. in 1971, Juergen asked to go back to work at the factory level, and he was assigned first to Baltimore and then to Tampa as Engineering Manager. In 1975 AmCan asked him to go to England to straighten out their British subsidiary. Then followed stints at Indianapolis and Rochester, N.Y. "Wherever there was trouble, they asked me to go," Juergen avers. "And I went." And he learned how to deal with problems in every facet of container manufacture.

He decided he would retire when he reached 55 but his services continued to be needed, and he didn't officially step down until 1987, at age 56, with 31 years of experience behind

him at AmCan. "My wife Kaetie and I toured up and down the coast of Florida to choose a place to live in our retirement, and we settled on Englewood. It had everything we were looking for: beaches, golf, a freshwater lake for irrigating my plants, and friendly people," says Juergen.

But with such an early retirement age, Juergen wasn't about to quit working. He had his own consulting firm: Kroos Associates, consultants in metal container manufacturing technology. His consulting work included clients in Brazil, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, Peru, Honduras, India, Thailand, the Philippines, China, South Korea, Slovakia, Austria, Italy, Germany and Switzerland. Not to mention the United States.


In 2001 a serious bout with Guillain-Barre' syndrome-an autoimmune disease that left him paralyzed from head to toe-sidetracked him for well over a year. "I could breathe and eat, but nothing else," he recalls. He went through an arduous rehab regimen and is cured ... mostly. A modest limp and the cane he carries are his reminders of those difficult days. His passions for golf and tennis have been victims of his ailment, but he has other pastimes now: his gardening, poker and bridge with friends, spending time with his three children and five grandchildren, two of them lovely young adopted Chinese ladies. His wife Kaetie passed away a year ago, and at age 90 he has given up most of his consulting work. Yet companies still vie for his time and advice whenever they encounter trouble.

After all, he is still "The King of Cans" to many around the globe.



Trying Something Different

Everyone knows that confidence in the lure you're using is important. We aren't sure if it's experience or faith, but it often proves true. Why switch from something has worked before? That's often why we fish at the same spots, too. We usually start with a 1/16 - 1/8oz. red or chartreuse CAL jig head with a shad tail on the flats. We carry lots of alternatives but always seem to start off with something that worked before. For flies, we always seem to start with shrimp or Clouser patterns.

We really enjoy kayak fishing on our favorite freshwater spot this time of year as the frog population gets active (read amorous) and can be heard along the shore. That's when we tie on a 5/0 wide gap hook with a Zoom Horny Toad rigged weedless for bass. Over the years the Watermelon Red and Watermelon Seed colors have worked best but again, that may be because that's about all we used.

On lakes where the bass are spawning this time of year, it's hard to beat a worm crawling across their bed for some catch and release action. Lately we have been using the tiny 1/32 oz. bullet weights ahead of a black worm. That rig lets us "snake" it across surface vegetation yet dive to the bottom at the edge of the weeds. We go through a lot of black worms.

Occasionally we get the urge to try out new lures and flies. It's hard to have confidence in any new lure, so we look up a few videos on the internet to see how other anglers work these lures. When we say "new," we mean new to us, not new on the market. There aren't many lure or fly designs that haven't been invented. It's usually just the materials that change on newer products.

We had seen reports of fish devouring mice along shorelines.



These reports were usually about brown trout or pike in chilly water. Lately though, we started noticing tales of bass, pickerel, and gars being caught on mouse flies. So, we ordered a few made of deer hair that looked real. They would make a great cat toy without the hook. Tied weedless with a loop of monofilament to protect the hook, they can run across emergent vegetation before swimming for their lives.

So, after watching edited videos of kayak anglers catching bass with a mouse fly, we put our tandem Malibu2-XL kayak in the Subaru and headed to Deer Prairie Creek. We haven't used our tandem in a while but for fly fishing, having the angler in the front and a paddler controlling the kayak in the back works great. It is also handy, with fly tackle, for the paddler to hit reverse to help pull a bass out of thick cover


By mid-day, we had no takers on the mouse and reluctantly switched to spinning tackle and a Horny Toad but had no interest in that either. So we headed upstream where overhanging trees make fly fishing impossible but provided protection from the increasing wind and sun. Up the creek we had strikes on

every cast but mostly from gars. Garfish will often grab one leg and ruin the lure. We found that if we didn't pull too hard, they usually turned loose.

As we started back to open water for some more experimentation with the mouse fly the wind continued to increase. Finally, after a zillion casts with only gars interested, we had a solid strike and hook up with a nice bass on the mouse fly that wound up being the only bass we landed that afternoon. Later, we did have more bass on, but none came to the kayak for their picture.

As the sun got lower, the wind increased and began blowing randomly from different directions. Wind is always an issue for kayak anglers, but it's even more of a challenge for kayak fly fishers. We were grateful for the tandem kayak, but that became challenging as we were blown broadside across the open water. Casting backhand under branches and into the wind from a kavak being blown around became too great a challenge and we packed it in.

But on a windy day when nothing else was working, we caught a bass on a mouse fly which makes it our new "favorite fly." When the wind dies down we're anxious to show mice to snook under docks and along a mangrove shoreline. Stay tuned. Try one, you might learn to like mice, too.

Oyster Gardeners Wanted Around Lemon Bay, gardening can mean more than planting lettuce and tomatoes in your backyard each summer. Many residents around the bay have discovered the fun and satisfaction of cultivating their own oyster gardens. Oyster gardens are designed to propagate Eastern oysters, the bay's native oyster species, on a vertical strand of oyster shells attached to docks. Once grown, these oysters are returned to the bay to help replenish the once-teeming oyster population that has been decimated by disease, poor water quality and overfishing.

Lemon Bay Conservancy is recruiting interested residents to participate in their oyster gardening project "One Dock at a Time." If you have access to a dock, you can become a citizen scientist by hanging and monitoring an oyster strand. With guidance from Florida Sea Grant extension service and Florida




Celebrate Florida's gopher tortoises on April 10th. Coastal Wildlife Club, Inc. (CWC) is pleased to announce that the Charlotte County Board of Commissioners has proclaimed April 10th as Gopher Tortoise Day. The gopher tortoise (Gopherus polyphemus) is a threatened species in Florida and throughout its range in the Southeast. Gopher tortoises live in all 67 Florida counties and are known for their extraordinary digging skills. A keystone species, their survival is essential to the survival of hundreds of other species as well. For this reason, the appher tortoise and its burrow are protected under state law. They prefer areas with well drained soils such as in uplands and coastal dunes. You can also help tortoises survive by watching for them in the road. Gopher tortoise activity is highest mid-morning and mid-afternoon, with peak activity from April through September. Gopher tortoises are landbased reptiles and should not be placed in water. If you see one in the road, aive it space to cross by itself. If necessary and if it is safe to do so, you are allowed to move it to safety. Always carry a tortoise level and move it in the direction it was going. Never try to drive over a tortoise assuming your vehicle will clear the animal. This often leads to severe injury or death. If you have a burrow on your property, keep it safe by not walking close to it. In your yard, you can add native plants that gopher tortoises like to eat. These include gopher apple (Licania michauxii) and blanket flowers (Gaillarida sp.) You can celebrate the gopher tortoise by going to www.GopherTortoiseDayFL.com to find activities and information. CWC is an entirely volunteer, non-profit organization dedicated to increasing public awareness about coastal wildlife and habitats in southwest Florida. Learn more at www.coastalwildlifeclub.org.
