Elsie Quirk Library Turns 60

Englewood residents, Elsie and Wellington Quirk, were inspired by a small community library they visited on a vacation in 1961, forming the idea of a similar library in Englewood. The Quirks donated land they owned along with \$10,000. The Friends of the Library was also formed that same year. Book donations, including 3,600 books from the Lemon Bay Woman's Club, and

hard work by volunteers led to the doors being opened on June 16, 1962. The popularity of the library has led to expansions and renovations over the years to the building located at 100 W. 

Notable NEIGHBORS

This Guy Has Certainly Shown A Lot Of Drive

More than 200 synonyms for the word "drive" can be found in the vast repositories of our English language, and Englewood's Roy Ault epitomizes a few of them in particular: nouns such as motivation, initiative, self-reliance and perseverance, and verbs such as impel and guide.

Born in 1934 during the Great Depression, he grew up in modest circumstances on his parents' small farm near Columbus, Ohio "I just grew up with little guidance," he says. "My dad and I did not see eye to eye until I was about 40 years old." At age 14 he decided to hitchhike across the country on his own. He wanted to see the Rockies in Colorado and the ocean lapping the shores of California, where some of his cousins lived. His adventures during that trip are a story unto themselves, but it was highlighted in his memory by taking over the wheel of a stranger's car and driving all night through the perilous

mountains in northern Idaho. "He asked me if I had my driver's license, and I told him I did, although it was restricted to the state of Ohio," Roy recalls. He made it, but just barely.

When he was 15, his parents sold their farm and moved to a one-room accommodation closer to Columbus, but Roy didn't go with them. Instead, he hired himself out to

another farmer so that he could finish his high school years at tiny Orange Township High School. "We were going to have a good basketball team that year," he explains. Roy excelled in basketball and football there and was a good student. "I graduated third in my class," he says, but he reluctantly adds that there were only twelve kids in his class.

He was a big fan of Ohio State University in Columbus, which then, as now, had great football teams, and he wanted to make a career of football coaching. So even though he was recruited by some smaller Ohio colleges, he held off to go to OSU when he graduated from high school in 1952. As it turned out, he did go to OSU but lettered only in lacrosse, as the competition in sports at a university with over 30,000

students at that time was fierce. But he outdid the competition for a gal named Sherrie, whom he met as a sophomore and would marry two years later, on December 21, 1956.

At OSU Roy majored in health, physical education and recreation and got his bachelor's degree in 1956, along with a teaching certificate. He then began a career as a football coach (and more) that would take him to several different locales and last for 18 years: Rockford High School (football), Bowling Green State University (football), Colonel White High School in Dayton (football, basketball, baseball), Cambridge High School (football, baseball), and

School (football, baseball), and finally Whetstone High School in Columbus, where he was assistant coach in football and head coach of the wrestling team. Wrestling? "I knew very little about wrestling, but I recruited a lot of help from friends who were wrestling coaches," he says, and his squads did well.

It was common in those days for the coaches to teach classes as well, usually in physical education or health. Roy followed that scenario until he reached Dayton, where driver education was added to his teaching load. That involved classroom lessons on the rules and regulations, safety measures and preparations for getting a license, plus driving practice on the road. At Dayton and thereafter, "every school where I taught, they had one car dealer who supplied the vehicles, either a Ford or a Chevrolet," Roy says.

In 1974 Roy said goodbye to coaching. He had been teaching driver education after school to get some extra money, and he realized that he could make more money teaching driver ed than he could coaching. He had a growing family, son Brad having been born in 1959 and daughter

Misty in 1961. So he and Sherrie decided to strike out on their own and set up Ault Driving School.

It was a low-overhead operation. They taught in some public schools and used church basements and space offered by nonprofit organizations. Their cars came from local Ford or Chevy dealers at no cost for the public school programs, though they had to have their own equipment for private schools. "We got busy right away, teaching kids, immigrants and adults who had never gotten around to applying for a driver's license," Roy says. Soon he had to take on help. Their most popular package was six hours of road and classroom training for \$149, and the business grew rapidly. Roy spent most of his time managing the burgeoning operation, and Sherrie handled the purchasing and payrolls. By the time they sold the business in 1979, they had 50 employees in 12 locations in Ohio, owned over 20 cars and were one of the top three driving schools in the state.

So why did they sell? "Number one, Sherrie's mom was down here in Englewood, and we wanted to be near her, as her health was failing. And number two, I was worn out. I had worked hard all my life, and I was ready to get some rest," Roy proclaims. "We bought a house, we bought a boat, and we went out on that boat every day for two years." And after two years? "We ran out of money," he freely admits. "So I went out and got a job as construction coordinator for the La Casa mobile home community in North Port. My job was to ready all the units for occupation once they were completed."

After two years there, the management firm in California asked Roy if he'd become the manager of their mobile home community in Bradenton, Colony Cove. It was a huge community with over 1,000 homes, and the pay was a big step up from La




Casa. He took it, and for three years he was basically in charge of the sales force selling and building the units there. He'd fly up to cities in Minnesota or Wisconsin or Ohio on weekends and hold sales seminars for northerners hungry to escape the ice and snow to retire in Florida. Back home in Bradenton the rest of the week he'd supervise the handling of customers who came to the office as a result of those seminars and other sales efforts. Then he'd serve as construction coordinator to be sure the units were ready for occupancy.

In 1986 he got an offer he couldn't refuse: manager of the Lemon Bay Isles mobile home community right here in Englewood. "I took it," he says. "The pay was good and I didn't have to make the long drive to

Bradenton every day," and perhaps best of all, the work week stopped on Friday at 4 p.m.

During that time at Lemon Bay Isles, Sherrie suggested that Roy could give driver training courses here in Florida part time, and he decided to give it a go. He found ready customers, and lo and behold, by 1989 they were back in the driver education business again, full time. They formed what is now known as Ault's **Driver Education** Center (managed by their son Brad), and it's a

thriving business up and down the west coast of the state.

As if he didn't already have enough on his plate, in 1986 Roy walked into the office of the Charlotte Sun newspaper and asked if he could write a regular column for them. They gave him a go-ahead, he started sending in weekly articles for a column entitled "Roy's Rhetoric" under which rubric he could write on any topic at all, and he kept it up for 33 years until retiring in 2019. How's that for drive?

Well, now 88 years of age and hobbled a bit by injuries to his back and knee, he has

slowed down physically, but not mentally. He's written nine books that he's self-published and is working on a tenth, just to fulfill his longtime interest in writing-and to answer a challenge Sherrie put to him a few years ago. He plans to keep going. He's been his own man since he was 14 years old ... and he's Sherrie's man too. Their 66 years of marriage will attest to that.



Emma Goes to Hollywood

Note: My daughter Emma Glam, who is even more devoted and schooled in film than yours truly, agreed to write this guest column on our recent trip to Hollywood.

When I was a kid, my dream was to go to Hollywood, be in movies (better ones than my mother Amanda), and possibly win an Oscar. Well, I finally got to Hollywood and got my Oscar (sort of). My main objective was to visit the long-awaited Academy Museum of Motion Pictures, an entire museum dedicated to filmmaking, the Oscars and filled with memorabilia. I prepared for my visit by researching all the exhibits online and had received membership in the museum for my birthday, resulting in discounts during my visit. I could barely contain my excitement as I saw the beautiful five-story building that just opened in September 2021. Walking in I was instantly overwhelmed. My self-guided tour officially began with a well-edited multi-screen movie montage depicting the dawn and evolution of cinema. Then I saw the massive Mt. Rushmore backdrop used in the 1959 classic North By Northwest, as part of an exhibit on the art of backdrops. I enjoyed an exhibit on classic films like Citizen Kane (yes, I saw Rosebud) and The Wizard of Oz, as well as trailblazers like Bruce Lee and Martin Scorsese's film editor Thelma Schoonmaker.

Things got even more exciting when I entered the Oscar Room of wall-to-wall statuettes, including the first Oscar for Best Animated Feature for *Shrek* and Best Visual Effects for the original *Star Wars*. Next were clips of Oscar speeches throughout the years,

and I noticed that with the exception of Meryl Streep and Steven Spielberg, nearly all the winners represented minorities in Hollywood.

As I walked through the museum I felt that the Academy was attempting to go out of its way to make up for decades of underrepresentation. It was less "We love movies" and more "We're sorry." The most glaring omission was the almost complete lack of acknowledgment on how immigrant Jews basically founded Hollywood and the movie industry. (This actually has bothered so many people that according to the New York Times, next spring the museum will open a permanent exhibit devoted to the contribution of

Jewish studio founders like Samuel Goldwyn, Jack Warner and Louis B. Mayer.)

More treasures awaited. I was surprised to learn that writer/ director Spike Lee is as big a movie buff as I am, as I took in his collection of vintage signed movie posters including The French Connection and Dog Day Afternoon. In the costumes exhibit I saw many outfits that I recognized from movies,

including the yellow dress Emma Stone wore in *La La Land*. Two days later while watching the film on the train, I thought "I saw that dress."

One of the best parts of the museum was The Oscar Experience (free to members, but extra with general admission). I got to live my dream and actually hold a real Oscar, and boy is it heavy. The finale was an amazing exhibit dedicated to Japanese filmmaker Hayao Miyazaki, known worldwide as the Walt Disney of Japan. I have been a fan since I saw Princess Mononoke when I was eight. I was incredibly lucky as the exhibit was closing just days after my visit. It was as extraordinarily beautiful as his movies.

My next adventure was the Legends of Hollywood bus tour. My guide Mark was very informed and amusing. We saw the sordid side of Hollywood as we passed by The Viper Room, where River Phoenix met his tragic end, and a hotel nicknamed "Riot at The Hyatt" due to its association with wild rock groups. From L.A. To Seattle on Amtrack's Coastal Starlite

My film-buff daughter Jenna has dreamed of going to Hollywood since she was 10. We planned a trip for her 30th birthday, which coincided with the opening of the Academy Museum of Motion Pictures. Then COVID hit. When I found out that my annual work conference would be taking place in Los Angeles this June, the trip was back on with an extended vacation to visit family and friends in San Jose and Jenna's friend in Seattle. I decided we would take Amtrak, 11 hours from L.A. to San Jose and 22 hours from San Jose to Seattle.

Amtrak's Coastal Starlite is a favorite of train travelers, with spectacular views, observation cars and decent dining. The earlier you book, the less expensive the tickets. I booked coach for the two of us for less than \$300. The sleeper car cost more than our roundtrip airfare and the roomette, where we would share a bathroom but still get all our meals, was pricey as well. However, after you book your tickets, Amtrak offers you the chance to "BidUp" on an upgrade. You choose the amount and Amtrak tells you if you have a "poor" to "excellent" chance of a winning bid. I bid on a business class upgrade on the San Jose trip and a roomette upgrade on the longer ride. Even though the bidometer said my \$20 per person bid was just "fair," 90 minutes before the train's L.A. departure, I got an

email congratulating me on moving up to business class.

I expected Grand Central Station level chaos at the main train station in the county's second-largest city. We arrived early, and surprisingly breezed through baggage check-in. Then we were directed upstairs to the Metropolitan Business Lounge. As a budget traveler, I was in heaven, sipping coffee, eating a packaged croissant and watching Good Morning America, 20 bucks worth of upgrades before we even boarded the train.

You don't get your seats on Amtrak until you board. We asked for upstairs and

settled into our oversized faux leather recliners. Unlike an airplane, you can lean back without irritating the person behind you and there's plenty of room for all your stuff. Business Class

passengers

get free bottled water but don't expect any packaged croissants.

Business class has its own observation lounge and I had read that it fills up quickly so I wasted no time in grabbing a table. I watched the California coast roll by the windows until it was time to hit the

a limited menu and no seating. We brought our moderately priced hot dogs back to the lounge for the best views of the trip from Santa Barbara to San Luis Obispo. The water turned a deeper blue and beachgoers, surfers and trailers were replaced by cliffs and dunes. On the other side we passed a small town with an actual saloon and a sheriff and then Grand Junction, which didn't appear to be either grand or a junction. I finally fell asleep just around the halfway point.

We had talked about dinner in the dining car but at \$45 a person, we decided to wait until we hit San Jose at 7:45 and opted for the cafe's cheese and cracker tray and M&Ms. What happens on Amtrak stays on Amtrak.

About that arrival, apparently the nickname of the Coastal Starlite is the Coastal Starlate. My niece was able to track the train on the Amtrak app and we were only about 30 minutes late for a smooth pick-up and a trip to In-N-Out Burger.

San Jose to Seattle

When Amtrak emailed me that my roomette bid was "unsuccessful", I promptly put in a "strong" bid for business class. One hour before departure I got the bad news that my bid was rejected.

Business class was sold out, so it would be coach for us. As a consolation prize, I told Jenna we would spend the money we saved on that fancy dining car dinner. Scratch that, coach passengers don't have access to the dining car. I felt like Leo DiCaprio in "Titanic."

We boarded the Coastal Starlite for Seattle at 8:30 pm. I had dressed for comfort, but Jenna changed into pajamas and slippers on the train. There is a dressing room in addition to the restrooms on board, even for coach. I put in earplugs even though the train was pretty quiet. Jenna slept soundly for almost 10 hours while I struggled to get comfortable in my coach seat, missing business class's 25% extra legroom. I snagged about three hours before giving up at 7:15 am as the train entered Oregon. I ordered a coffee and grabbed breakfast from my snack stash and headed to the coach sightseeing lounge (is sightseeing a downgrade from observation?), I was rewarded with an impressive view of tall trees, lakes, snowcapped mountains and more green than I've seen in 25 years.

Breaking up the trips with movies, conversation, naps and of course the views of the Pacific Northwest, made the 33 hours go by pretty quickly. The leisurely pace of the train is the opposite of the level of stress of airline travel where sometimes three hours can feel like 33 hours. If you're not in need of sleep, the coach seats are fine for traveling. But for a trip over eight hours, business class is the way to go. And if you really want business class or a sleeper car, don't gamble on BidUp. Just book early.

Tips for a Long Distance Train Trip

- 1. Research your train. Read blogs and reviews for insight on the best views, best place to sit and what to order from the dining car.
- 2. Unlike most Amtrak trains, the
 Coastal Starlite has no WIFI so plan your
 entertainment in advance. I brought my
 Chromebook with downloaded programming
 and wrote this story on the train. Jenna went
 old-school and packed a DVD player and
 movies she hadn't seen in years. Download
 podcasts, books etc. Bring two sets of
 earbuds in case one fails. If you don't have
 unlimited data on your phone, spring for it the
 month of your trip.
- 3. Download or print the train schedule so you know what town you're in when you snap photos along the way.
- 4. Check your bags at no charge. Storage space for oversized bags is limited and I can't imagine bringing them up the narrow stairs. We stuffed overnight bags with snacks, beverages, toiletries, clothes, sleep masks, travel pillows and blankets, a must on an overnight trip.
- 5. Talk to people. I met an 11-year-old boy from Alaska crocheting a scarf for his brother, a young man who made his living foraging for morels in rural Oregon, and shared animal crackers with an adorable 3-year-old girl. It's all part of the journey.


















hurricane preparedness

It's Hurricane Season – Are You Prepared?

Provided by Charlotte County

Don't delay your preparations for this year's Atlantic hurricane season that runs June 1 through November 30. Know what to do before, during, and after a hurricane: prepare now, survive during, be safe after.

Put together a disaster plan with your family and for your business before a hurricane. Have emergency supplies in place at home, at work, and in the car. Know your local community's evacuation plan and evacuation routes and how to receive alerts. Listen to local officials via radio, TV, and social media to keep abreast of the storm and what you need to do.

Have a plan. Know your flood evacuation zone. Figure out where you will go if you need to evacuate – seek out family and friends first who are in a safer area and use an emergency shelter as a last resort. Be forewarned: evacuation centers offer no bedding, no generators, limited food, and twenty square foot of space per person. Who will be your contact person and how will you communicate?

Don't wait until the last minute to prepare supplies. Refill prescriptions. Have your vehicles filled with gas as no power means gas can't be pumped. Experts recommend having a week's supply of nonperishable food, one gallon of water for each person a day, toiletries, cash (banks, ATMs, and credit card machines don't work without electricity.) Have a battery or solar-powered radio, flashlights, a charged cellphone, and important documents & insurance info (if evacuating.) Secure your boat early and clear your yard of furniture, potted plans, trash cans, and other objects that can cause damage in heavy winds. Keep up to date on your landscape trimming to minimize yard debris. Don't leave trash & yard waste containers out prior to a storm.


Protect your windows and glass doors with plywood or storm shutters. Turn off power and water prior to leaving home.

Don't forget about your pet's emergency kit. Have a leash & collar with proper ID, vaccination records, crate, food, water, bowls, cat litter, scoop, trash bags for waste, and a photo of you with your pet. Don't leave pets alone at home if you evacuate. Find pet-friendly hotels at petswelcome.com and pet-friendly shelters.

If traveling to escape the storm path, experts suggest going shorter distances instead of hundreds of miles as you may become stranded on the highway due to traffic volume and you don't want to ride out a storm in your vehicle!



HELP KEEP OUR SEA TURTLES SAFE -ESPECIALLY DURING NESTING SEASON





FILL IN HOLES AND KNOCK DOWN SANDCASTLES

Nesting sea turtles and hatchlings can fall in holes and become trapped, and sandcastles create unnecessary obstacles for sea turtles on their way to and from the sea.

TURN OFF LIGHTS AND KEEP SHADES SHUT

Bright lights left on at night can disorient sea turtles, leading them away from the ocean and into danger.





REMOVE ALL ITEMS-INCLUDING TRASH

Beach chairs, sun tents, and umbrellas can entangle nesting sea turtles and hatchlings and block their way to and from the sea.

DO NOT DISTURB SEA TURTLES OR HATCHLINGS

Please keep your distance and do not approach nesting sea turtles or hatchlings. Do not pass in front of turtles or block their way to the ocean.





GO SLOW FOR THOSE BELOW WHILE BOATING

Nesting sea turtles spend increased amounts of time close to shore and near the surface during nesting season which puts them more at risk to be unintentionally hit by boats. Going slow and keeping an eye out for turtles at the surface can help save these threatened and endangered species!

The volunteers of the Coastal Wildlife Club remind you to help ensure this year's sea turtle nesting season has a phenomenal hatch rate by following the tips above. Remember only one out of every 1,000 hatchlings survive to adulthood! The CWC weekly nest totals as of June 10th on Manasota Key show heavy nesting: 1839 loggerhead nests and one Kemps ridley nest.
