





### **FEMA Flood Insurance** Rate Change

National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) insurance rates are changing. The NFIP is implementing a new phased methodology for rating flood insurance policies, which will affect many flood policies locally. The new methodology will enable the Federal **Emergency Management Agency** (FEMA) to deliver rates that are actuarily sound, equitable, easier to understand and better reflect a property's flood risk. New policies, beginning October 1st, will be subject to the new rating methodology. Existing policyholders eligible for renewal will be able to take advantage of immediate decreases in their premiums. All remaining policies renewing on or after April 1, 2022, will be subject to the new rating methodology. Contact your insurance provider to find out

### He's A Norman Rockwell Fan


When Englewood resident Ray Hazel talks or writes about matters historical (and sometimes hysterical), he likes to invoke the name of Norman Rockwell, America's most prolific illustrator and painter, known most famously for his cover illustrations for The Saturday Evening Post and Boys' Life. Rockwell was able to romanticize moments of everyday life in hometown America in a way that struck a chord with viewers—a chord they could play ever afterward in their minds. And Ray recognizes many "Norman Rockwell moments" he experienced in the process of growing up.

His hometown was Massena, NY, a rural settlement on the St. Lawrence River just south of the Canadian border. It was devoted largely to agriculture, with dairy farms and cow pastures dotting its landscapes, but it was also not far from a large Alcoa Aluminum plant that served as a lighthouse in attracting immigrants from Europe in the years after World War II.

"We lived in a diverse neighborhood," Ray says. "There were people from Poland, Armenia, Italy, Ireland. They had been coming over since the late 1800s and had opportunities to get decent jobs in the plant or the powerhouse on the river. My friends came from diverse backgrounds, but we didn't hurl epithets at each other—Wop or Mick or Polak. We didn't think of ourselves that way. We were a community. And we kids were free-roaming kids, just like free-roaming chickens. Our parents let us be who we were gonna be."

Ray had no brothers and only one sister. Cindy, who was four years younger, but he was nonetheless born into a large family: His Dad Leon had seven brothers and three sisters, and uncles, aunts and cousins populated the area of Massena he lived in, known locally as Skunk Ridge. Yep. That sounds like something out of Al Capp's comic strip, Li'l Abner. But to Ray it was "a neighborhood in the middle of nowhere," filled with Norman Rockwell moments

He wasn't a great student, he says, because he had other interests. "My youth revolved around nature, sports and school, in that order." He enjoyed playing with his friends and taking long walks through the woods and meadows around Massena with his constant companion, a foxhound named

Freckles. Ray was good at hockey and baseball, and he admits to being pretty cocky. "My ambition," he says, "was to play shortstop for the New York Yankees, like Phil Rizzuto," a major league baseball hall of famer. He didn't make it, but how many people do? It's good to have high aspirations.

Ray also liked writing and was interested in history. "Our English teacher, Mrs. Austin, got us reading books by Thornton Wilder, John Steinbeck, Ernest Hemingway and Jack London. She allowed me to express myself and be creative in writing. She was an inspiration, except when she threw erasers at us to get our attention."

He graduated from Massena High School in 1961 and went on to Albany Business College, where he earned an associate's degree in business administration. Having worked on the college newspaper, he landed a job with the Massena Observer as a cub reporter and got to polish his writing skills. "The trouble was," he says, "they just wanted plain, factual reporting, and I wanted to put some color and creativity into my writing." Eventually it became clear to him that he'd have no career as a reporter—right after he'd had a dust-up with his boss for embellishing the obituaries in the Observer's editions and drafting a tongue-in-cheek article promoting a beagle for the Mayor's job.

What to do next? As a kid he had built up a little business raising rabbits and selling both their offspring and their rabbit poop (a useful fertilizer) to the locals in Skunk Ridge. So he gave a try to retail sales, working in a men's shop in Massena. He was good at it and enjoyed it, but it was not the career he wanted, now in his early twenties.

As a nature lover who came from a family of nature lovers, he had taken up nature photography. "I had a passion



for going into places where no one else would ever go," he says, and he became good enough at capturing the wilderness with his camera that he won numerous awards at juried art shows and held several private showings. "I also kept a diary, and I would jot down interesting things that happened to me. I liked historical fiction, and I knew that someday I would write a historical novel." But writing historical fiction was still far in his future, and he was to face much adversity before he could do so.

There was a failed marriage, and a drinking problem that cost him his job and made him probe his life and lifestyle. But after a five-year struggle he overcame his affliction and was to remain cured for the rest of his life. He got a job at Alcoa as a mill helper and worked his way up the ladder to corporate management, first supervising his fellow

workmen at an ingot plant, then becoming night plant supervisor, later an operating systems supervisor and then moving into R&D for experimental casting and finally becoming an operations specialist in charge of quality assurance for the company. He was successful because he was fair, he was respectful of others—whether they agreed with him or notand he was a man of his word. Those were traits he valued and would stress in his later writings.

Ray retired in 1998 at age 55. "I had been contributing articles to a lot of magazines, mostly outdoor magazines, and I never wrote about how you do things. I wrote about why you do things," he says. "If you search for why people do things, you find out who they are and what their values are."

He has so far written and published six novels (some of them illustrated by his partner and soulmate, Anne Butler), all of them based on his personal experience, and all of them stressing the values of love for family, neighbors and our canine friends. "The main characters in my books are immigrants whose families came here," he says." They made great sacrifices and overcame great adversity to provide a new life for their children and to become good citizens of their new country." He confesses that he's changed some names to protect the innocent ... and the guilty, but all of his settings are historically

Ray is a storyteller, painting heartwarming pictures of life with all its vicissitudes in the 20th century. Words are his paintbrush, and it's not surprising that his works evoke the same emotions as the wondrous illustrations of Norman

Rockwell. If you liked Mr. Rockwell, you'll enjoy what Ray has to say as well.

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

The Big Leap (Monday, 9 pm on FOX) - I enjoyed the first two episodes of this drama, "inspired by" a British show called Big Ballet. On The Big Leap, a group of amateur dancers in Detroit get a chance at fame and redemption when they audition for a reality TV show. There's an aging ballet dancer, a cancer survivor, a regular guy with above average moves and our hero Gabby (Simone



Recasner), who abandoned her dancing dream to raise her son etc. I'm loving watching the show's executive producer Nick Blackburn (Scott Foley) manipulate his cast to create drama. If the rest of the cast can rise to the level of Foley and Recasner, *The Big Leap* could be one of the biggest hits of the season

Ordinary Joe (Monday, 10 pm on NBC) - You might remember James Wolk as Bob Benson, the guy you loved to hate on Mad Men. Now he's the guy, make that three guys, you love to love. Ordinary Joe follows Joe Kimbreau on the three paths he might have taken after college; nurse, police officer and musician. Each story

arc is framed in a different color, an unusual move that helps keep the viewer keep track of the storylines. The first episode was well-written with engaging performances.

La Brea (Tuesday, 9 pm on NBC) - I had to submit this column before the premiere of this sci-fi thriller about a giant sinkhole at the La Brea Tar Pits that opens and takes down a bunch of unfortunate Californians. This isn't normally my cup of tea, but the trailer, pun intended, sucked me in.

Alter Ego (Wednesday, 9pm on FOX) - Sorry, Celebrity Judges Alanis Morissette and will.i.am and other judges and a hostess I'm too old to know. This convoluted attempt to milk the success of Fox's hit The Masked Singer, is just too much for me. The visuals are weird and the set-up is nuts. I will quote from TV Guide. "Aspiring singers are seen live as computer-generated figures they designed. Meanwhile, as they perform onstage, a motion capture suit and special helmet transmit their movements and facial expressions to their alter ego." Amanda out.

Ghosts (Premieres October 7 at 9 pm on CBS) - I would love to share all the new sitcoms headed to Network TV, but NBC, which brought us everything from Cheers to Friends, doesn't have a single sitcom on the air this fall. Neither does FOX, which prefers its comedies

Queens has fewer jokes and an all-black cast, including singer/ actress Brandy as Xplicit Lyrics. Her bandmates are Butter Pecan, Lil Muffin and Professor Sex. so Queens wins the name game. South Florida Gardening Calendar



### **WHAT TO PLANT**

Annuals/Bedding plants: Even though temperatures are still warm, begin planting for the cooler months ahead. Impatiens, alyssum, and dianthus are good plants for the fall/winter garden.

Bulbs: Plant agapanthus, rain lily, and Clivia lily now for blooms next spring or summer. Add organic matter to the planting bed for best results.

Herbs: A wide range of herbs can be planted from seed or transplants this month. Some to try include dill, fennel, parsley, and cilantro.

**Vegetables:** Easy crops that can be grown now include beans, broccoli, carrots, collards, lettuce, green onions, peppers, radishes, spinach, and tomatoes.

### **WHAT TO DO**

Lawns: Control winter weeds in lawns before they appear. Preemergence herbicides must be applied at the right time to be effective. Apply when nighttime temperatures are 55°F-60°F for 4-5 days.

**Ornamental trees and shrubs:** Fertilize plants that are not

performing as desired. This is the last month of the year to fertilize shrubs and trees. Controlled-release fertilizer provides nutrients over a longer period of time.

Lawn fertilization: Fertilize lawns if needed.

**Strawberries:** Prepare beds and set strawberry plants this month. Strawberries also make a colorful and tasty container

planting. Either way, water daily until plants are established.

Palms: Palms have unique nutritional needs. Select a fertilizer that contains controlled release nitrogen, potassium and magnesium.

Oleanders: Control the oleander caterpillar, which is a year-round resident in South Florida, without harming beneficial insects by pruning off infested leaves or spraying with BT (Bacillus thuringiensis).

Twig girdlers: Control twig girdlers by cleaning up and destroying fallen branches that young twig girdlers can use for harborage.

### Chaos

Does anyone remember the movie the Fifth Element from 1997, staring Bruce Willis and Milla Jovovich? It was a futuristic thriller were once again good saves our planet from evil. In one memorable scene the villain intentionally pushes a glass off his desktop to demonstrate his chaos theory. Suddenly a flock of cleaning robots spring into action and sweep up the scattered glass while the villain explains how chaos and order are interdependent. Which you must admit is an interesting concept.

For those among us that have never seen chaos on Dearborn Street before, the current street "improvement" must seem shocking. But for the rest of us, the ones that debated putting a fence across 776 to keep the first street improvement to ourselves, this second "breaking" seems a lot less painful.

Living through improvements, especially for our

local businesses, is seldom easy, no matter how great the outcome will be. A fun analogy might be your penny pinching relative who annoyingly came back to visit. Or that neighbor who again brought his pet over for you to watch as he travels. The good, or the bad news, depending on your age, and level of pet appreciation, is that time flies. Relatives leave, neighbors return, and improvement projects get finished before you know it.

Now the point, your Old Englewood Village Association, OEVA, is under construction as well, but not to the point of chaos as some have assumed. Let's back up for a moment. Historically OEVA focused on Dearborn Street, because nearly forty years ago when OEVA was founded, the street was the focus of our community. But even then, Englewood was much more than one street with a handful of pioneering businesses. Nearby was Grove City, Old Grove City, Cape Haze, Rotonda, New Point Comfort, Point of Pines, Englewood Farm Acres, Placida,

Englewood also included what I would call intangible assets. Current examples would include our extensive arts organizations and activities. We have natural resources like the beaches and our waterways. And tourism, while not a true brickand-mortar business, is a big part of our community. Englewood also has a growing collection of planned communities, love them, or hate them. Most offer tons of resident amenities like recreational, social and entertainment services

Back to the theme, order from chaos, via improvements. OEVA, like our beloved street and plaza, is being improved. Part of that process has been defining what the community would like our efforts to focus on and who, or what, does OEVA represent? Some believe that OEVA efforts should remain focused on supporting the local businesses by hosting or sponsoring entertaining events intended to draw consumers to the street.

Others want to accomplish the same goal but with a slant

towards art projects. Some want OEVA to become an informational superhighway where our local information is organized, managed, shared, or easily retrieved. Some just want to feel, something, anything, which drives me crazy! Myself, I want two things. To co-manage the downtown with our fellow community organizations for everyone's benefit, and to effectively expand some of Dearborn Street's life into the adjoining walking arts district.

Unlike the glass example, we don't have to break anything to achieve these goals. Best of all, OEVA is already working on them. Part of that process is communicating better so OEVA is improving our already amazing web site, www.OldEnglewood. com, that was created and donated to the organization by our past president, Eric Peterson.

The planned improvements will expand the foundational automation, the ease-of-use features, add a new community blog and link it to several social media outlets. Forums will be expanded for different interest

groups and the organizations planning, sharing, and record storage tools will be improved.

I know this all sounds repetitive and expensive, perhaps even wasteful. Personally, I was hesitant to buy into the concept that OEVA needed a better community tool, because my "smart" phone is basically a paper weight that spends most of the day on my desktop where it belongs. But after some very serious shopping, a remote contractor was hired to expand on Eric's work. This contractor is qualified and professionally managed by a third party.

In closing. Order does seem to be dependent on chaos in some mysterious way. But rest assured that in a very short period of time, the chaos will pass and Englewood will have safer cross walks, better sidewalks, new landscaping, benches, lighting, additional parking, and a downtown plaza to be proud of; not to mention a better OEVA community web

### **EcoQuest Aster!**

Participate in the Marie Selby Gardens' Aster EcoQuest Challenge during October. The aster, or sunflower family (Asteraceae), is among the largest flowering plant families, with more than 1,620 genera and over 23,600 species. These plants have a prominent place in everyday life as the family includes many economically important crops (such as sunflowers, safflowers, artichokes, lettuce, and endive), herbs and medicinal varieties (such as calendula, chamomile, echinacea, and tarragon), as well as beautiful ornamentals such as aster, chrysanthemum, cosmos, dahlia, gerbera, marigold, and zinnia. For October, EcoQuest is observing asters in this area. Each month a new EcoQuest Challenge is announced to encourage documentation of a specific species or group of species. So far, more than 200 species of aster have been found in Sarasota and Manatee Counties. Start sharing what you find on the iNaturalist app which you can download on your mobile device or visit iNaturalist.org on your computer. Set up a user account and join the Sarasota-Manatee EcoFlora Project, Asters All Around, and click join. For questions call 366•5731.
