



RENOVATE OR MOVE

Many home improvement television series showcase people deciding whether to improve upon their current homes to make them into the houses of their dreams or to put "for sale" signs on their lawns and move on to something new.

The question of whether to move or stay put depends on various factors. Such factors may include emotional attachment to a home, the current economic climate, and the cost of real estate. Current data points to a greater propensity for people to invest and improve upon their current properties rather than trading up for something new.

According to information collected by John Burns Real Estate Consulting, the percentage

of homeowners moving up to their next home is the lowest in 25 years. Many are opting to make starter homes permanent by expanding them and repairing homes for the long haul.

The National Association of Realtors said that, between 1987 and 2008, home buyers stayed in their homes an average of six years before selling. Since 2010,

however, NAR says the average expected length of time people will stay in their homes before selling is now 15 years.

Part of what's fueling this permanency is that many home buyers were able to acquire rock-bottom mortgage interest rates shortly after the 2008

recession. As a result, they're not inclined to walk away from those rates, even if doing so means getting more house. Also, a low inventory of available houses has stymied repeat buying for many people.

Those factors and others have led many homeowners to invest in renovations instead. The experts at Bankrate say realistic budgeting and comparing renovation project costs against

mortgages and interests rates can further help individuals decide whether to remain in their current homes or move out. Very often a smarter layout and more efficient




There were just a handful of moviegoers at the Spotlight Theatre in Venice for the Sunday showing of *The French Dispatch* (R). Originally scheduled for a May 2020 release, it's the tenth movie from writer/director Wes Anderson and his first liveaction feature since 2014's *The Grand Budapest Hotel*.

There is no mistaking a Wes Anderson film for the work of any other filmmaker. His movies are meticulously crafted, almost staged, with arresting visuals, choreographed action and an evocative mix of intense color, black and white and animated imagery. He's worked with the same cinematographer since his first film Bottle Rocket. He's just as loyal to his actors. His regulars Bill Murray, Tilda Swinton, Edward Norton, Jason Schwartzman and Adrien Brody are all here along with several dozen others. Alexandre Desplat, who won an Oscar for scoring The Grand Budapest Hotel, is also back.

When publisher Arthur Horowitz, Jr. (Bill Murray) dies, the *French Dispatch*, a *New Yorker*-esque magazine based in Ennui sur-Blase, France, will also cease publication. The movie is presented as a series of three vignettes, stories the *Dispatch* writers filed for the final issue.


Tilda Swinton, who for some reason just has to wear fake teeth in Anderson's movies, is the art critic who writes about a murderer/artist (Benicio Del Toro), who is inspired to paint by a prison guard (Lea Seydoux from No *Time to Die*). His paintings attract the attention of a gallery owner (Adrien Brody) and his uncles, (Yes, that's Henry Winkler). Then we meet a very monotone Frances McDormand, who plays a nononsense writer covering student revolutionaries, in what I felt was the least successful of the stories. In the final piece, Jeffrey Wright (also from No Time to Die) is a food writer who gets caught up in a kidnapping and shoot-out while writing about a prison chef.



I enjoy Anderson's unique and slightly quirky aesthetic, but his films can be overwhelming. There is so much to take in visually and there are so many players that actors like Christoph Waltz and Saoirse Ronan barely get any screen time. The dialogue is so artfully crafted and dense, the actors can come off as stilted. The exceptions are Murray and Owen Wilson, two of the most chill actors working today. Still, with all the derivative drivel out there, I'll take Anderson's unique look at the world any day.

I love it when a movie introduces me to a real-life character or story I knew nothing about, hence *The Electrical Life of Louis Wain*. I mean how could I resist this description, "The true story of eccentric British artist Louis Wain whose playful, psychedelic pictures transformed

the public's perception of cats forever." And it stars Benedict Cumberbatch AND is free on Amazon Prime. Sign me up.

While there are plenty of cute cats and kittens, this movie is no fairy tale. Louis lives with his mother and five sisters, none of whom are in a hurry to get married. He's a bit odd and unhappy until he meets a woman ten vears older than he is and from the wrong social circle, which in the early 1900s England, does not go over well. When his wife (Claire Foy) becomes ill, Louis, an illustrator, starts drawing pictures of their cat to cheer her up. Soon, his cat drawings are everywhere and people start thinking, "Hey, maybe cats aren't evil and it

But there's that family thing again. Wain's mother and sisters are counting on the only man in the family to support them. Sadly, while his paintings are selling, Wain is really bad with money and he is experiencing symptoms of mental illness. The more he loses touch with reality, the wilder his cat drawings get.

wouldn't be the worst thing to

have one or two in my home."

Cumberbatch is terrific as the brilliant and tortured artist with a fondness for felines. He instantly makes you care about his character. You want Louis to be happy but you know that's not going to happen. The movie glosses over Wain's later life, but it was pretty grim. There is a lovely scene toward the end of the movie that ties back to an earlier scene that may or may not have happened, but made me happy. And can I just say that Cumberbatch sports some of the best old-age makeup I've seen in years. The Electrical Life of Louis Wain, is a fascinating true story with a stellar performance and adorable cats. It's worth checking out.







Last year Deborah Hegedus, Past President of the Rotary Club of Englewood, reached out to Ferst Readers to partner in bringing books to local Englewood children as part of Rotary's literacy program. Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is reminding people on the water to slow down and look out for migrating manatees. As water temperatures cool, manatees are naturally migrating to warmer waters around the state. Go slow and look out below to allow them to swim safely. While manatees are large, they can be difficult to see in the water. That is why it is important to follow boating guidelines in manatee protection zones: motor slowly, wear polarized glasses, and always give them space. Manatee protection zones are marked by waterway signs and maps of manatee protection zones are available online at MyFWC.com/Manatee by clicking on "Data and Maps." Manatees depend on water warmer than 68 degrees Fahrenheit to survive the winter, so in the fall they travel to Florida springs, power plant discharges and other warm-water sites. Remember: Disturbing manatees at warm-water sites can cause them to swim out of those protected areas and into potentially life-threatening cold water. During the colder months, seasonal manatee zones require boaters to slow down in certain areas to prevent manatees from being injured or killed by motorboats or personal watercrafts. Boat strikes continue to be a major threat to Florida manatees. FWC law enforcement officers are on patrol in state wa-

sonal manatee speed zones and take appropriate enforcement actions. Physically handling a distressed or stranded manatee might cause more harm. Instead, report injured, distressed, or dead manatees to the FWC's Wildlife Alert Hotline at 888-**404-FWCC** (3922) or dial #FWC or *FWC on a cellphone so trained responders can assist. The FWC takes manatee conservation seriously by actively implementing science-based conservation measures that are making a difference for manatees and habitat. Resources for boaters, educators and other interested members of the public are available at MyFWC.com/ Manatee. What should you do if you see a manatee? The Viewing Guidelines page provides helpful tips on respectfully viewing manatees, additional

guidelines for boat and personal watercraft operators, and information on what you can do to help these amazing aquatic mammals.

Are you interested in supporting the FWC's manatee research, rescue and management efforts? You can purchase a Florida manatee license plate or donate \$5 to receive a collectable FWC manatee decal. Both are available from your local Tax Collector's office.

If you would like to see manatees up close, visit Janus, Iclyn, and Aria at The Bishop Museum of Science & Nature. These three manatees are currently receiving care in the Parker Manatee Rehabilitation Habitat. The Bishop is located at 201 Tenth Street West in Bradenton. 

Wide Gap Hooks

Anglers looking through a fishing catalogue will appreciate the amazing variety of hooks available. They're specialized for a specific lure or bait or even target species. Among the choices are treble hooks, double hooks, live bait and circle hooks, to name a few. You'll also see several hooks known as wide gap hooks from many manufacturers. These are our favorites for several reasons but they're not cheap.

Wide gap hooks are primarily intended for creating a weedless profile for lures or baits and are used in both freshwater and saltwater. Kayakers exploring the shallow grass flats in this area are familiar with the weed situation that can ruin the action of a lure or bait as floating grass hangs up on treble hooks or on the nose of some jig heads. There is nothing like a serving of grass on your presentation to let predators know this is NOT a real meal swimming by.

In addition to the weedless benefit, they are also great for getting that solid hook up and will not shake loose or be easily thrown during a prolonged battle. Not all "weedless" lures use wide gap hooks. Many of the hollow frog lures on the market use a double hook with the sharp ends above the frog. This rigging helps keep the frog weedless, so it won't hook up on emergent vegetation. The issue we have had with most frog lures is they don't seem to have enough gap to ensure a solid hook up. We're also concerned that a double hook rig could allow the hooks to pry each other out. When purchasing any weedless lure, check out the gap to see if it seems wide enough to create a solid hook up.

These same considerations apply to weedless saltwater lures. Without a wide gap, a fragile hook set may pull free during the excitement of landing a good

fish. Using a wide gap hook in the 5/0 range also makes it harder for a fish to swallow the lure making for an easier release. One other function of a wide gap hook is that it creates ballast and a keel that helps keep your presentation upright. When you combine all these factors and add in the weedless part, a wide gap hook becomes

an obvious option. Weighted wide gap hooks are popular for saltwater lures and are designed to work deeper.

Not all wide gap hooks are created equal. One quality we look for every time is a laser sharp point. In a kayak, where a hookset is challenging due to the mobility of the boat, sharpness counts. It is not enough to jerk really hard to set the hook. The "rip their lips off" strike is not effective in a kayak because the kayak moves toward the fish as you pull on the line. A laser sharp hook combined with braided line will penetrate even bony mouths with little pressure, which is usually supplied by the fish as they depart with the lure. Some guides recommend their clients avoid striking altogether and just start reeling. The hook will do

VMC makes a wide gap hook with a long shank that allows the hook to ride further back in the lure. These are particularly good for plastic worms or any lure that benefits from having the hook further towards the tail end of the lure. Most manufacturers make both a regular strength and a thicker version of the same hook. These heavier hooks are better for larger saltwater fish



that might bend out the lighter hooks. We like the lighter weight hooks when frog fishing for bass. The heavier hooks will cause any lure to sink faster, and that added weight makes it hard to "tickle" the frog across emergent vegetation along the shore.

Kayak anglers need the security of a good hookset to land that quality fish. We cannot put too much pressure on a fish during the battle while the kayak is moving towards the fish as easily as the fish moves away from the kayak. A laser sharp wide gap hook will stay engaged even if a little slack enters the system as both the kayak and the fish change directions during the battle.


