

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# Wotable NEIGHBORS

"I have to be doing something all the time. I can't sit still," David Dignam admits in a moment of introspection.

Bingo! He's got that right. He is one busy guy—a founder, a funder, a fuxer, a door-opener, a donor and a doer. He started life in high gear, and he doesn't intend to stop until Mother Nature tells him, "Enough already."

If you were to Google him, David is credited with having founded 25 companies in his career. Asked if that's true, he says, "Maybe, I don't know, but a lot of them were nonprofits or were set up just to perform a specific purpose." Huh? How many of us retirees have been involved in the founding of even two or three companies in a lifetime, let alone 25? And who says David is done?

David was born in Venice, grew up on Manasota Key and went to Englewood's Lemon Bay junior and senior high schools, graduating in 1982. "I was probably a C+ student, maybe a B-," he says with a laugh. "I wasn't real focused then. I was into fishing, playing football and baseball, and I ran track." He was also into hiking, camping, boating, biking and outdoor activities, which led him to join the Cub Scouts and then the Boy Scouts. He went on to become an Eagle Scout and a Captain in Explorer Scouts, two marks of achievement and dedication. He has maintained his association with those entities to this day.

He was class president his senior year in high school, a big man on campus, and he looked the part in his blue corduroy jacket, jeans and cowboy boots. "I was a good kid, ('Digger' to his friends), and I was popular in school," David acknowledges. It's easy to see why. He has a relaxed and easy manner, open

and friendly. He shows an interest in the people he meets. He listens, and if they have a problem, he wants to help them. But he doesn't just talk the talk, he walks the walk, to use an idiom from sports world.

As the scion of a wealthy family, it was more or less preordained that David would become the president of the Key Agency, the family's privately-owned insurance firm headquartered in Englewood. But for a while at least, he wanted to be a cop. As an Explorer Scout in his junior and senior years in high school, he worked with the Charlotte County Sheriff's Department to set up an Explorer post in Englewood. "I helped in recruiting about twenty of my friends for it," he remembers. "We got to wear a uniform, work the front desk. ride with the deputies, work with the dispatcher—all of this in junior roles, obviously, but great preparation for Police Academy training if we wanted to go into law enforcement."

David signed up for the Police Academy's auxiliary training program when he enrolled in the University of South Florida in 1983, but he didn't go on to a career in law enforcement. He got his bachelor's degree in political science, which led him into the world of politics. In his junior year, when an opening occurred for an internship on the campaign staff for Tampa's Mayor Bob Martinez in his bid for Governor of Florida, David applied. Martinez had changed parties to run on the GOP ticket, and David (from a family of long-time Democrats) duly registered as a Republican and landed the job. "I was just a grunt," he says, but he got the lofty title of Deputy Director of Communications, effectively Deputy Press Secretary.

The hours were long, the pay low, and the excitement level high, with chances for David to mingle with high-ranking leaders from Florida, Washington, DC and elsewhere—including

President Reagan, President Bush the elder and Pope John Paul II

Martinez, a huge underdog, won the election, and David stayed on for a total of 18 months, delaying the completion of his college degree until 1988. As an assistant to two different chiefs of staff in the Martinez administration, he seriously considered the prospect of going into electoral politics himself as a candidate. Eventually he decided against it, but he formed friendships and relationships that would stay with him for a lifetime. Indeed, his experience in Republican politics subsequently got him the vicechairmanship of the Charlotte County GOP on two occasions during his long involvement with that organization.

"I'd gotten married to Laurie in 1986, and I began thinking it was time to settle down here in Englewood, help my dad in the family business and start a family of my own," he says. The Key Agency had been founded by his grandfather, George Dignam, in 1952 and carried on by his father Tom when George retired. David had worked in the company since his sophomore year in high school. "I was the mail boy, the files boy, the 'gofer,' whatever needed doing," he recalls. His dad knew he needed to learn the business from the bottom up to earn the respect of the employees rather than just be the owner's kid. Upon his return he started

as a customer service rep and then served as a salesman. He became president in 1998 and the company prospered, growing from a staff of 11 to its present total of 46.

Grandpa George had instilled in David the importance of giving to others, not just to promote business, but because it was the right thing to do. "He told me, 'Give, and it will be returned to you tenfold,' David remembers. That principle inspired him to make commitments to a staggering number of charitable and volunteer organizations over the years, in every case as a leader. He's been associated with the YMCA (the institution, not the song), the police academy (the training school, not the movie series), and the Explorer Scouts (the organization, not the car) all his life. He's a longtime board member of the Southwest Florida Boy Scout Council. He was a founding board member of the Englewood Family YMCA, and in August he will become Board Chairman of the YMCA of Southwest Florida.

Add to that his involvement with the Charlotte County **Development Authority** (elected official), the Charlotte County School Board (elected member), the Charlotte County Boys and Girls Club (founding board member), the Charlotte County Police Athletic League (founding board member), Drug-Free Charlotte County (founding board member), Gulf Coast Community Foundation (Chairman of the Board), the Lemon Bay Sunrise Rotary Club (President), the Englewood Community Health Clinic (cofounder and board member) and the USF Sarasota/Manatee Community Leadership Council (member), and you can see a pattern of leadership in giving ... and one busy guy. And oh, yes, David was also a co-founder of Premier Community Bank and Florida Shores Bank, and he now serves as a board member of Gulf Coast Strategic Investments, just to have something to do in his spare time.

Of all his charitable activities, the one that stands out for David is helping the father of Denise Amber Lee establish a foundation in her name. Denise, a 21-year-old Englewood resident and mother of two young children, was abducted, raped and murdered on January 17, 2008. The crime could have been prevented if there hadn't been a complete mishandling of five separate 911 calls, including one from the victim herself. Help arrived too late.

"When you call 911, it's the first line of defense, and these people need to be trained," David asserts. Through the foundation, whose board David has chaired for the last nine years, he was able to push through changes in legislation in Florida requiring mandatory training and certification for 911 operators. The Denise Amber Lee Act serves as a model for other states to use, and the foundation is working on getting similar legislation passed. "We've gotten it in 14 other states so far," David notes, and they continue to work toward nationwide reform.

Now at age 58, David is beginning to give some thought to the strange concept of "retirement." Once he's ready to step down as head of the family company, he'll turn the reins over to his son Brandon. What then? Well, don't expect him to don his cowboy boots, mount his trusty roan horse and ride off into the sunset. He won't be the world's busiest man, but you can bet he'll be the busiest cowboy in Southwest Florida.

cover the trunk with soil.

Herbs: Plant heat-loving herbs, including basil, ginger, summer savory, cumin, Mexican tarragon, and rosemary.

**Vegetables:** Plant tropical vegetables, such as boniato, calabaza, and chayote this month.

#### **WHAT TO DO**

**Pests:** Monitor the landscape and garden weekly for harmful insects. Knowing which insects attack a plant can aid in identification and treatment.

Irrigation: Watch for drought stress and water as needed if rainfall has been spotty. Focus on new plantings and follow watering restrictions. When rains begin, shut down the irrigation

**Propagation:** Produce more plants by air layering, grafting, in check with early treatment. Determine whether yellow and brown lawn patches are caused by chinch bugs, disease, or lack of water. Take time to determine the cause so your remedy is effective. Rejuvenate areas where grass does not grow well by replacing it with versatile groundcovers. Summer rains usually begin this month as do lawn fertilizer restrictions in some areas of the state. Check with your municipality to see if this applies to your area.

Soil Solarization: Clean up your vegetable garden and solarize the soil for 4-6 weeks to kill pests and disease.

**Lightning Safety:** Be safe outdoors during storm season.

# Choose grass that suits your climate and region

Establishing a vibrant lawn requires research, including determining which type of turf is the best fit for a property. The lawn experts at *Pennington* say that homeowners can set up their lawns for success by choosing turfgrasses that thrive in their region.

Lush lawns feel great underfoot, add curb appeal to a home and are the crowning touches on complete landscapes.

According to the Home Depot, the two main types of grass for turf are warmseason grass and cool-season grass. Warmseason grasses grow best in hot weather. Most will go dormant and turn brown in cool temperatures. Warm-season grasses should be planted in late spring for the best chances of thriving. Cool-season grasses are better for northern climates, where the mercury will eventually drop. They are characterized by rapid growth in the spring and fall. Some may turn brown during periods of high summer heat.

In certain instances, a mix of warmand cool-season grasses may be needed. That's particularly so in the "transition



zone" of the United States, according to Lowes. The transition zone runs from roughly Delaware to North Carolina on the east coast and central California to Arizona on the west coast. However, lawns in the transition zone typically fare best with cool-season grasses, indicates Lowes.

Here's a closer look at various types of grasses, courtesy of Pennington, Lowes and The Home Depot.

#### Warm-season grasses

- Bahia: This is a tough turfgrass especially suited for heat and humidity. It has a rougher texture than other grasses.
- Bermuda: This produces a very droughttolerant lawn and is great for high-traffic areas. It requires a lot of sunlight to grow.
- Buffalo: This grass is low maintenance and tough. It has low water needs and a fine texture. Full sun exposure will produce a vibrant lawn.
- Centipede: Popular throughout the southern United States, this slowgrowing grass is ideal for homeowners who desire a low maintenance lawn. It has a coarse texture and is best in areas of low foot traffic.

#### Cool-season grasses

- Fescue: Fescue comes in many varieties and is good in areas with mild winters and warm summers. It has high droughtresistance and can endure medium foot traffic
- Kentucky bluegrass: Finely textured with a deep, evergreen color, this grass thrives in growing conditions marked by good soil, regular sunlight and routine watering.



 Perennial ryegrass: This flourishes in full sun, but tolerates light shade. It forms a lush, finely textured, deep green lawn. During periods of drought, it will need additional watering or go dormant. Homeowners can increase their chances of establishing beautiful lawns by selecting the right type of grasses for their climate and landscape.



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

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# OLD ENGLEWOOD by Todd Tracy VILLAGE

### Informational Overload

By now, it is too late to say Happy Independence Day, suggest a family barbecue recipe, a favorite firework, or share a secret Englewood location to watch the annual display. Instead, I would like to take advantage of the holiday's afterglow by reminding us all that our spirit of independence is just as important today as it was on July 4th, 1776.

Independence means many things to many people. For some, it is challenging complicated political or social structures. For others, it is finance, mobility, moving out of mom and dad's basement or dropping a cable subscription. For this story, I would like to focus on what I believe is one of this generation's biggest independence challenges, information.

What inspired this line of thought was a recent debate at an Old Englewood Village Association (OEVA) meeting where we discussed "adding value to our members". Value, like truth, is very subjective in this age, so the conversation was interesting.

Some suggested that we as a community organization had an informational responsibility to our memberships, even the public at large.

I agree that organizations should engage their members using as many modern informational tools as possible, and that outreach has community value. What I disagreed with was the notion that organizations have a one-way responsibility to educate their members and the public, suggesting that society is already too full of informational opportunities for those that wanted to be informed and engaged. That perhaps an organization's time and resources would be better spent getting things done.

To support my minority opinion on informational saturation and personal responsibilities, I searched the internet for like-minded opinions and found several articles of interest. One was published on June 29 in 2017, by "ieeessit", entitled "Drowning in Information." It suggested that there was a paradox

between information and meaningful knowledge. I agree with the premise completely; more information does not automatically create a smarter or happier community.

My peers seem convinced that reaching out to the membership via social media, weekly newsletters, updates from the association President, engaging folks on the street, even buying promotional advertising would add value to the membership. Granted, in a perfect world where people were not already overwhelmed and everyone was honestly interested, it might work. But lives are busy, families are complicated, jobs are demanding and even our golden retirement years leave precious little time to get excited about even more delivered information.

Then I reminded everyone that fellow private and public organizations have done all the above for years. That despite their tens, even hundreds of thousands of out-reach dollars spent, they still fail to reach everyone, as if that were

even possible. The comic relief was when a member suggested that he loved the near daily "annoying and seldom read" outreach from a fellow community organization.

OEVA, like all the rest of the great organizations and publications in this community, would love to keep everyone perfectly informed and content, but the reality is that we cannot. There are simply too many facts and opinions from too many sources that are constantly in flux for any local organization to report, much less get consistently right in a timely manner.

No matter how many man hours volunteers give, or how many organizational dollars are spent on employees and consultants, the net results would be the recreation of a sub-standard wheel. My point would be that if you really want a professionally managed global informational source that is constantly updated, reliable, with links, maps, photos, business bios, hours and even their menus, simply pick up your smart phone.

Membership value was equally an interesting debate, and again, I believe that value and valued is not a one-way street either. But that discussion will have wait, my time is nearly up.

In closing, did you know that OEVA is deeply involved in the Englewood Arts District? That OEVA continues to work on its organizational structure and platforms, messaging, promotion, and continues to work with other organizations towards the future management of our downtown. Just because you did not receive a newsletter, get invited to a picnic, or win a contest does not mean that the association has been lax; it might mean that more is getting done, with fewer words.

OEVA continues to play an important role in our community. Our Town Hall Meetings continue to engage the public, events are being planned and the artists and businesses are appreciated and supported, but we could use your help.
