

After five years of planning, Englewood Helping Hand (EHH) was able to ceremoniously dig the first shovel of dirt for their new larger building to be able to help more people in need here in the Englewood area. Mark Rennie, former EHH board president and building fund coordinator for the project, dug the first shovelful as a gathering of EHH volunteers, partner church representatives, Sarasota County Commissioner Ron Cutsinger, Englewood Chamber representatives and members of the public gathered around. Ginny Anderson, current EHH Board President, introduced the EHH board members and thanked all the hardworking volunteers and many donors. Englewood United Methodist Church Pastor Bo Sim provided the blessing for "the anointed ground on which Englewood Helping Hand will be able to continue and expand to serve the Englewood area." The new building, near the site of the current food pantry/social services resource location on the Englewood United Methodist Church campus, will be a 2400 square foot warehouse type building with a large client lobby, running water, a bathroom, kitchenette, two offices for expanded social services assistance, and a large garage door for donations and All Faiths Food Bank shipments. 



#### He went from wine to water

Englewood's Kenn Visser pretty much by accident found himself in the businesses of growing fine wines and making pure water. But in doing so, he has done a great service to a great many people.

Kenn grew up in Kirkwood, Mo., an upscale suburb of St. Louis, and put in a couple of years at the University of Missouri, but on summer break in 1972 he got a job on a dairy farm outside of Vancouver, British Columbia. He liked the area so well that he stayed on, doing whatever work he could find on farms in the area. BC is rich in fruit and wine-growing properties, and within a few years Kenn gained considerable knowledge and expertise. Enough so that in 1979 he landed a job with Compact Orchard Development Co. in Okanagan Centre, BC, managing 100 irrigated acres of high-density tree fruits and wine grapes.

In 1982 he moved up to an executive-level position as general manager of Covert Farms in Oliver, BC. He now had responsibility for 500 irrigated acres of vineyards, tree fruits, ground crops and alfalfa. He trained and supervised a staff of up to 125 employees and did crop planning and management for 20 different crops, especially wine and table grapes. He was responsible for financial planning and crop-specific cost accounting programs. He initiated and monitored the firm's planting and pruning strategies, pest and disease control programs and direct-to-customer sales and marketing programs. "It was hard work," he recalls. "I'd work from early March into December without a day off." But it was worth it. He was a "man for all seasons," now an expert in the wine-growing business and well paid for his knowledge and skills.

In 1986 he accepted an offer to join a "First Nation" (we'd call it "Native American") enterprise that needed his expertise. "It was called Inkameep Vineyards, Ltd." he says. "They had all this land, they hadn't made any money on it for 17 years, and they really needed help. I signed

on for seven years as general manager, to help them maximize the value of their wine-growing territory. We concentrated on one thing only: growing grapes." His efforts paid off. The Inkameep made \$250,000 in profits the first year, and their business grew. And grew. So did the region. There are now 240 wineries in the valley. While working for Inkameep, Kenn also served as a director of the British Columbia Grape Marketing Board, where he co-authored industry position papers and helped develop strategies for BC's grape and wine industry under the Canadian government's free trade agreements.

Once the Inkameep had their vineyards booming, Kenn moved on. A business acquaintance asked him if he'd enter a joint venture in the water purification business. "I didn't know anything about water purification," Kenn says, "but he said, 'Let's just have fun and make money." After examining the concept

show in Los Angeles that could add high volumes of oxygen to water, and the concept fascinated him. "At the time there were no differentiated water choices," he says. "You got either 'spring water' or 'purified' water." But water with a high oxygen content would delay the buildup of lactic acid in the muscles, meaning that users would have longer and better performance times and a quicker recovery from exhaustion. That was ideal for athletes, of course, but also for the normal folks doing physical labor or exercising.

Kenn put together a team that bought the patent rights to the superoxygenation technology and formed Life O2 International, a Naples, Florida-based company that licensed it to partners in some 22 countries. Along the way, Life O2 worked with Water One, Inc. of Ft. Myers, to not only produce the high-tech water purifier but also to create a delivery system for the user

and financials, Kenn decided to go for it. The company, Water Pure & Simple, was to sell water bottling franchises for a purified product, and Kenn served as director of sales and marketing. In a five-year period, WP&S established 40 franchises, developed a customer base of 25,000 accounts and sold out to US Filter/Culligan for a tidy profit.

While he was at WP&S, Kenn saw a device at a trade that was small, solar-powered and mobile, so that it would have great value for those who were not connected to an electric grid system: water-craving inhabitants of rural areas, underdeveloped countries and areas that had suffered a major natural disaster that disrupted their grid system and water-delivery capability.

In 2010 Haiti was hit with a monster, magnitude 7.0 earthquake that knocked out the is-

land's grid system and left large areas with no clean water source. Families were drinking muddied rainwater and worse, and were ravaged with waterborne diseases. "The disaster in Haiti was horrific," Kenn remembers. "I went there and saw tent cities where the natives were drinking water from cisterns that was so toxic that they were sick every day. Waterborne disease is a worldwide killer, and something had to be done there." The Water One units were an ideal solution. So Kenn got in touch with some charitable organizations he knew would be interested in placing sustainable off-the-grid purifiers in the hands of the Haitians. He found partners in Rotary International and its local affiliates, Lemon Bay Sunrise Rotary and the Rotary Club of Englewood.

The effort in Haiti paid off. Many hundreds of lives were saved there, and the effort inspired Kenn to start a similar project in Cuba in partnership with the Southwest Florida Methodist Churches. The Southwest District Mission Program included the Englewood United Methodist Church as a fundraiser and supporter. Agape Flights in Venice made the initial flights to Cuba bringing purifiers to churches there. "Right now, 36 Methodist churches in Cuba have purifiers," Kenn says. He

got other projects going in the Dominican Republic, Honduras and India, and he worked with Rotary Club affiliates as far away as Chevy Chase, Md. The Salvation Army raised \$145,000 for purification kits to be sent to 4,500 families in Puerto Rico. And current projects are underway in Colombia, Venezuela and Ecuador.

"Through these efforts with our local partners," Kenn observes, "we have given people the tools they can use to have sustainable off-the-grid water where it is desperately needed." It may have been a lucky accident that Kenn Visser ended up in the water purifier business, but there are no doubt thousands of people in several countries who are mighty glad he did.



### LAUNDRY ROOM RENOVATIONS

Does it seem like your hamper is always full and the washing machine is running constantly? You may not be imagining it. *Laundry Butler for You*, a wash, dry and fold service, says the average household washes 50 pounds of laundry a week and 6,000 articles of clothing every year. #### Assess your equipment

If your appliances are aging, a laundry room renovation can start with an investment in new appliances. New models have large capacity loads, tend to be energy-efficient and could have innovative features that help fit with your laundry lifestyle. Purchasing front-loading models also can free up design space, as you can install a counter directly above the units, saving room for other items like drying racks.

#### Figure out your room needs

A laundry room need not be limited to laundry only. Many homeowners make large laundry rooms catch-all spaces that can serve as utility or mud rooms, pantry overflows, or off-season storage areas. Consider the functions you want the room to serve and include those ideas in your designs.

#### Think about a utility sink

Many washing machines drain out directly to waste pipes in the floor or wall, but you also can opt to have them empty into a utility sink. This sink also provides a convenient place to handwash items, clean tools or paintbrushes, or store items that perhaps you do not want to bring into a bathroom or kitchen sink.

#### Include some flair

This utilitarian space need not be boring or bereft of design elements. Mirror your home's style in the laundry room, and

#### **WHAT TO PLANT**

Annuals/Bedding plants: The hottest days of summer limit planting

to heat-tolerant vinca, coleus, salvia, and celosia.

Bulbs: Aztec lily, butterfly lily, walking iris, and spider lily can Herbs: Herbs that can be planted from plants (not seeds) include bay laurel, ginger, Mexican tarragon, and rosemary.

Vegetables: Start planting eggplant, okra, peppers, pumpkin, squashes, and tomatoes for the fall garden.

#### WHAT TO DO

Palms: Check older fronds for yellowing as it may indicate a magnesium or potassium deficiency. Apply an appropriate palm fertilizer.

Vegetables: Solarize the vegetable garden for 4-6 weeks in preparation for fall planting if not done in July.

Poinsettias: Pinch back poinsettias and mums before the end of the month to allow time for buds to form for winter

**Ornamental plants:** Fertilize those plants that show signs of deficiencies. Rapid growth and leaching rains may result in nutrient deficiencies in some

**Annuals/Bedding plants:** Remove spent blooms, cut back,

and fertilize flowering annuals and perennials to extend the bloom season into the fall months.



- Keep naloxone handy for others who may be at risk, or yourself in case of relapse.
- Avoid medicines that contain opioids or similar compounds.

### A Real Hero Restores Life

Earlier this summer, an
Englewood area resident
received a guide dog from
Southeastern Guide Dogs and
is now able start living her life
again. Cheryl (Cheri) Sytsma
has been rescued by her own
personal hero, aptly named Hero!

Cheri was born with "lazy eye", aka amblyopia, which gave her double vision. Of course, Cheri just thought everyone saw like she did. At age five, she had her first surgical procedure to try to correct the problem, but it was unsuccessful. Even with glasses, she struggled in school as she tried to learn to read. Feeling frustrated, she is thankful that her first and second grade teachers continued to encourage her to keep trying. Although she enjoyed the subjects of science and math, school was very hard for her and forget gym! She saw two of everything, so she never was sure which object was the "real" ball. Her mother chose not to put her into a special class as she wanted to keep her in mainstream schooling. During high school, she worked as a CNA (Certified Nursing Assistant) in the evenings as she loved the idea of helping others.

After graduating high school, Cheri began classes at a junior college where she had the good fortune of meeting a vision specialist who taught her to block out the page except for the line she was reading, and the world of reading opened up to her. She graduated from the Chicago School of Massage Therapy in 1985 and was hired by the upscale Mario Triocio Salon & Spa in Chicago, where she performed massage, acupuncture, reflexology and aromatherapy. Later in her career, she worked for a chiropractor.

Cheri moved to the Englewood area after vacationing with her mother and stepdad. She relocated here because she fell in love with the beaches and outdoor lifestyle and, of course, the weather. Up until about ten years ago, her vision had remained more or less consistent, but then her vision started to worsen with dimming vision in

her right eye, bad headaches, and problems with dizziness. Then she started losing the peripheral vision in her left eye and was declared legally blind two years ago.

Cheri applied for a guide dog through Southeastern Guide Dogs and during the wait, found herself withdrawing from social outings due to frequent falls and balance loss. Her world narrowed to basically being homebound due to safety concerns, and even then, she would run into objects in her house.

The application process to receive a guide dog lasted about two years as Southeastern Guide Dogs had curtailed their training and programs due to COVID-19. In the meantime, she served as a relief puppy-raiser volunteer for the organization and took dog training lessons. With the easing of the pandemic restrictions, Cheri received the news she had been waiting on! Her application was approved April 20th. Southeastern Guide Dogs brought four "trial" dogs to visit Cheri and allow her to "test drive" each dog by practicing walking and other activities. Each guide dog has its own pace, and that pace needs to be matched to the person's pace as a dog moving too quickly or slowly will increase the potential fall risk.

On May 2nd, Cheri went to the Southeastern Guide Dog campus in Palmetto for a three week stay. Each member of her eight-person class enjoyed a private room and she was

introduced to her dog, Hero. Hero is a two-year-old female yellow Labrador retriever and the two spent their time developing a personal bond and undergoing partnership training during the three-week session. "Hero is very much a go-getter, and she wants to learn and to teach me to do the right things," Cheri says. The campus is set up with various life scenarios and the students, with the help of their dog partner, learn how to function successfully and safely in the "real" world. Towards the end of the class, the students have field trips to different locations for real-life situations. Cheri says as the relationship develops over time, you learn

to communicate with your dog and teach each other how to work as a team and understand what your partner is saying. She can't praise Southeastern Guide Dogs enough, mentioning the outstanding campus, the bonds formed with her human instructors, and her entire experience there. There is no cost to the guide dog recipient. Thanks to generous donations from FROMM Family Pet Food and Elanco, she receives free dog food, and is provided with Hero's heartworm/flea protection and free regular vet

Cheri plans to start pursuing the activities she enjoys, like basket weaving, swimming, and creating a social life, as well as continuing the Zoom courses by the Lighthouse of Manasota (vision loss education center) on her computer. She and Hero continue to learn as a team and when off duty, Hero loves to play ball and she really loves people.

Before withdrawing due to her vision loss, Cheri had been a very friendly and social person. Hero is also very friendly, so the pair are starting to regenerate a social life together. She has become an advocate for both the American Council of the Blind and the Florida Council of the Blind. "Hero makes me feel a lot more secure, independent, and just happy to go out and engage in life again," Cheri declares and then adds, "She is my hero. I have been looking forward to this time for nearly two years now, and it's finally here!"

Cheri offers some guidelines for the public when you encounter an individual with a guide/service dog.

Remember that the dog is working – do not try to greet the dog or distract it from doing its job. If at some point, the person offers to let you greet the dog, wait until the person gives the command to the dog that's it is okay to interact with you.

It is disheartening to have a person focus on the dog and forget that the dog has a person with it – greet the person first.

If you are asked for directions, remember that a person with impaired vision can't see, so don't point in a direction or say "over there" or "at the yellow sign." Give a verbal direction like "continue straight ahead to the corner" or "it is on your right in four feet."

NEVER grab the dog's leash or harness!

If you come across a service dog alone, follow it, as the dog is trained to seek help for the owner and will lead you to that individual.




