



At this point, the biggest surprise of the evening is that none of the women have had a wardrobe malfunction as there was some serious gravity-

I was kind of hoping that Andra Day could pull off a major upset, winning for her starring role in *The United States vs. Billie Holiday*, but all of the performances were exceptional this year.

By playing fast and loose with the award order and ending with Best Actor, the producers were obviously going for an emotional finale by honoring the late Chadwick Boseman, who had received nearly every major award for his final performance in Ma Rainey's Black Bottom. Boseman, who died in 2020 at just 43, was considered "a lock." But, in a shocking and very uncomfortable turn, last year's Best Actor winner, Joaquin Phoenix, announced the winner as Anthony Hopkins for The Father. And Hopkins wasn't even there. It was almost, but not quite, as bad as the legendary, "You win La La Land, no, you win Moonlight, fiasco in 2017. Your lesson today, don't mess

with the running order of an institution unless you have inside information.

While I did not enjoy the ceremony, *Nomadland* was my favorite film of the year and Director Chloe Zhao's win was my "YES" of the night. She is only the second woman to win the category in the history of the Academy Awards. Next year, there should be more "big" movies for us to see on the big screen, and a more conventional ceremony. Let's hope #OscarsLessBoring.

Englewood's most interesting man?

Jonathan Goldsmith, the man who first (and best) portrayed "The World's Most Interesting Man" in the Dos Equis beer commercials, has nothing on Englewood's Frank Collins. In his 70s? So is Frank. Silky white beard and mustache? Frank has those too. Wears a white suit? Frank dons one on occasion. Saves an angry bear from a bear trap? Frank saves par from a sand trap. Travels to exotic places? Frank has been there before him. And Frank is an accomplished sailor and a licensed pilot, to boot. Take that, Mr. Goldsmith.

Perhaps not surprisingly, Francis Lewis Collins is often called "The Man Who Does (Almost) Everything" at the Hospital Volunteers of Venice (HVV), a nonprofit 501(c)3 organization associated with Venice Regional Bayfront Health. He has served three terms as president of the HVV and at one time or another has held just about every volunteer position at the hospital.


Born in Grand Forks, North Dakota, a state so sparsely populated that you'd know everyone in it by their first names if you could find them, Frank grew up on a farm in Hamilton, about 60 miles north of Grand Forks. Mostly wheat. A few sheep. Some cows. Sounds idyllic? "I hated it," he says. He was a city boy at heart. After studying finance and accounting at the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks, he was looking for a way to distance himself from farm country. He found it when Lockwood Grader Corp., his first employer, transferred him to their branch in Long Island. Frank and his new wife packed up their belongings and drove across the plains and farmlands of the Midwest to New York. "When I first saw the skyline of Manhattan," he says, "that was it. I knew I was in heaven."

Frank left Lockwood Grader to become assistant comptroller at Southold (Long Island) Savings Bank, and three years later he landed a job as an accountant with Inmont Chemical in his beloved Manhattan. Things were moving pretty fast, and so was Frank. Inmont was acquired by Carrier Corporation in 1971, and Carrier was acquired by United Technologies a few years later. Collins went first to Boston and then to London to figure out what to do with a small British subsidiary that sold synthetic leather sheeting to shoe manufacturers.

What United Technologies ultimately did with it was sell the subsidiary for two bits to two Brits, who agreed to give Collins exclusive distribution rights for North America if he'd set up a company for that purpose. Collins quickly established Marand Marketing International, Inc. and was in a business he would run for the next quarter century. That business led Frank to travel extensively: to Pakistan, India, China, Taiwan and Singapore in the Far East, and to England, France, Germany and Norway in the West. Strictly for pleasure, he also looked in on Dubai and Nepal. Eat your heart out, Mr. Goldsmith.

When he'd been-there-done-that enough, Frank and Marylyn decided to retire to Florida. The year was 2003, and they found the right spot: Boca Royale Country Club. They stayed at the club until five years ago, when they found their current abode across the street in Englewood Isles.

Between them, Frank and Marylyn had three marriages, eight children and 16 grandkids, and it was time to take it easy. "When I first retired, I was jealous of my time. I told myself that I wasn't going to spend it rashly,' he says. "But after about two years, I came to realize that no matter how much time I put into my golf game, it wasn't going to get any better. I decided it was time to pay back for all we'd had over the years, and to pay forward by helping others." It was time to volunteer. A friend and neighbor suggested that Frank contact the volunteer organization at Venice Regional. Frank did so, and started on the ground floor... literally. He was a main entrance escort at the HealthPark, a Venice Regional affiliate, "greeting people at the front door and taking them wherever they had to go.' He quickly became the Man Who Does (Almost) Everything: escort

and wheelchair pusher. Courier. Installer of medical alert systems. Booth attendant at health fairs. Desk jockey in the ICU. Patient representative, listening to any complaints that individual patients had and taking their complaints to somebody who could do something about them.

He was asked to sit on the Finance Committee at the HVV. He became an HVV board member. He helped set up HVV member meetings. He ran orientation seminars for new volunteers. He oversaw the operations of the Elephant's Trunk Thrift Store, Lifeline and the Korner Gift Shoppe, three HVV-owned and operated revenue centers. Thrice president of HVV, he gave speeches at the Rotary Club and other civic organizations, and was often the face of the HVV to the public. Why did he do all this? "When you're retired," he says, "now is the time you can think beyond your own needs and think about other people. And you know, there is enormous satisfaction in helping others. You do a job that you like. You pick the hours and days you want to work. And you get all kinds of thanks and praise for what you do. Our volunteers all tell me they have the best job in the hospital." Says wife Marylyn, "Oh, Frank has the best job. He's the Man Who Does (Almost) Everything." Then she cautions, "But not at home."










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
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
After the Spring Break Party

Every spring, sun starved folks from all over the country flock to Florida beaches to recover from cabin fever. This year this migration was especially intense due to the easing of COVID restrictions here, more than in other states. While some enjoy the fishing here, many never even try it, and instead focus on sun, beer, seafood and partying. But every party has to come to an end and the spring break beach party is winding down.

This opens up the beaches for the enjoyment of the locals again and can be a great time of year to take some light tackle to the beach in search of pompano, whiting, snook and mackerel along the shore. The water temperatures are heading into the upper 70's which signals an influx of gamefish and bait after the chilly water during the winter. Our resident surf fish are once again safe from being crushed by thousands of sunburned feet in shallow water. It is also safer for anglers trying to cast between distracted folks in the water and behind them where a back cast might hook an innocent bystander.

Anglers here don't need a 16' surf rod and a pound of lead to hold bait in the pounding surf like they would encounter on the Atlantic side of the state. Instead, we use light spinning tackle and small hooks to capture the necessary ingredients for a fish fry. A light rod, loaded with 10 lb. braid and attached to a 20 lb. fluorocarbon leader is fine. We like 1/0 or smaller hooks for whiting, but move up to 2/0 hooks for fish with larger mouths.

A critical factor is the proper amount and placement of the weight. The goal with weight is to use enough to get the bait down to the bottom but not so much that it holds fast to the bottom. When this happens, the currents from wave action and



The most common "fish finder" rig uses a sliding weight on the main line above a swivel that attaches to the leader. In theory, the line will slide through the leader when a fish swims away with the bait. Whiting don't often swim away; they usually just pin the bait to the bottom and peck it off the hook. Another popular method is to have the weight on the end of the line and the hook above it on a dropper. This rig is very sensitive and useful for detecting subtle strikes. We prefer to use a split shot because the placement and size of the weight can be quickly changed.

While sand fleas (mole crabs) can sometimes be captured on site, the most popular bait is shrimp. Live shrimp are cumbersome to transport while frozen shrimp pack small and a small cooler will keep them usable all day. We freeze our left over live shrimp and find them preferable to the previously dead shrimp frozen at the bait stores. Try to avoid shrimp that are turning red at the head end.

They just don't smell or taste right to the fish. An alternative is the frozen shrimp from a grocery store. They are frozen alive for human consumption.

Frozen shrimp are best tail hooked. Simply break off the tail fins and thread the shrimp on the hook with the point exiting between the legs. If you pinch off the carapace or head shell of the shrimp, the wiggling legs and additional scent dispersed creates a treat that is hard for a beach fish to turn down

So now that the beaches are getting less crowded, take your light gear and a bag of fresh frozen shrimp and go catch a whiting or three. Remember though, that snook, trout and redfish are strictly catch and release while their populations recover from recent red tide events

SIGNS YOUR GUTTERS ARE IN NEED OF REPAIR

Spring time in Florida is a great time to tackle projects around the house. The weather each spring allows homeowners to make improvements to their homes' exteriors without worrying about extreme heat of summer, while interior projects like painting can be completed in the air conditioning.

Spring also marks a great time to prepare for upcoming projects that can make summer work that much easier. For example, spring is a great time to take stock of your gutters so you can address any issues before summer rains and after the oak trees have lost their leaves. Compromised gutters can contribute to water issues around the foundation, thus adversely affecting a home's foundation if not addressed immediately. It behooves homeowners to learn the signs that gutters are in need of repair or replacement.

- Gutters hanging off the home: Gutters were once installed predominantly with spikes. However, many industry professionals now install gutters with hanger brackets. Why the change? Spikes loosen over time, leading to the gutters hanging off the home. That can contribute to serious issues if left untreated. Gutters hanging off the home need not necessarily be replaced, but rather secured to the home, ideally with hanger brackets instead of spikes. Brackets hook into the front of the gutter and are then screwed into the fascia of a home. A professional who specializes in gutter repair can perform this task relatively quickly, and it's an inexpensive yet highly effective solution.
- Gutter separation: Gutters that are no longer fastened together can leak and
- contribute to issues that affect the home's foundation, siding and appearance. Clogs and the accumulation of debris can cause gutters to separate because they are not designed to hold too much weight. Replacement of separated gutters may or may not be necessary depending on how big the problem is and the condition of the existing gutters. If replacement is not necessary, separated gutters may be remedied by securing the joints, another relatively simple and inexpensive fix.
- Peeling exterior paint: Paint that appears to be peeling off of your home may indicate that water is seeping over the edge of the gutter closest to your home. When that happens, water is coming down the side of the house, causing the paint to peel. In such instances,



replacing the gutters is often necessary.

• Flooding around the foundation: Many a homeowner has been flummoxed by flooding around their foundation, and such flooding can be caused by aging, ineffective gutters.

That's because deteriorating gutters sometimes allow water to pool around the foundation of a home.

Spring is an ideal time to inspect gutters and have any issues fixed before summer rains and torpical storms arrive.






- 1. Start with a tray. If you don't have a bed tray, you still have time to buy one by Mother's Day. Don't make mom or grandma balance plates on their laps. You can pick up a bed tray for less than \$20 at Walmart, Wayfair, Home Depot or Amazon and you'll use it more than one day a year. Just be careful. Sue R. recalled, "Years ago my daughter brought me a tray for breakfast and sat it at the foot of the bed while she woke me up. I was so startled I knocked the whole thing on the floor."
- 2. Adult supervision is mandatory. There are a lot of moving parts when it comes to breakfast and even experienced cooks burn the toast and overcook the bacon. And, of course, children should not be using kitchen appliances unattended. Younger children can plate fruit and eggs and add the all-important decorations and flower/weeds. Hint: Keep them away from the maple syrup.
- 3. Make what Mom likes. If your mom has never made or ordered quiche at a restaurant, there's probably a reason, so don't try to impress her and make it on Mother's Day. My friend Mary told me her daughter decided Ramen noodles were the ideal breakfast option. Would she

have preferred something more traditional? Maybe, but she said. "I love it, because she made it for me."

- 4. Maximize success by having all the basics on hand and let your mom "order" breakfast. Grab a notepad and ask "And how would you like your eggs?" "Wheat toast or an English muffin?" "Coffee or tea?" She won't be surprised, but she'll definitely be happy.
- 5. You cooked it. You clean it. There is nothing worse than handing over your breakfast dishes and then seeing them in the sink. Just ask my friend Donna who enjoyed eggs and pancakes one Mother's Day and then faced carnage in the kitchen. Fortunately, her daughters responded to her shocked scream and cleaned up. I imagine most women would agree with my friend Nancy, who said, "My happiest Mothers' Day would be a cleaned house; I'll get my own breakfast."

Nothing fancy or complicated here, just easy, yummy eggs that any mom or grandma would love. Always make your eggs last because they cook fast and cool off

Scrambled Eggs with Cream Cheese and Scallions

Ingredients (for two servings) 1½ tbsps. butter

4 large eggs

faster.

- 2 oz. cream cheese (full-fat is best), softened and cut into
- 4 Scallions thinly sliced, saving some for garnish Salt and pepper

Whisk together eggs and cream cheese. Set aside. Melt butter in frying pan and add scallions, cook over medium heat until soft. Pour egg mixture into the skillet and cook at medium/low heat. Add salt and pepper to taste. Put on plate and sprinkle with the reserved scallions.



Sea Turtle Nesting Season

The area's off-season visitors are now here, and human beachgoers are asked to respect and be considerate of these marine visitors. Sea Turtle Nesting season is underway on the Gulf beaches and these endangered species need your help to survive and reproduce successfully. According to Sarasota County's data, sea turtle nests average over 200 nests per mile along the Sarasota County's coastline. So, what's the problem, you may ask. The odds are stacked very high against hatchlings surviving to maturity. Only one out of every 1,000 hatchlings make it to adulthood! Predators dig up the nests (including dogs loose on the beach,) and some eggs never hatch, or the hatchlings are too weak to make it to the surface from the egg clutch buried deeply in the sand. Most hatchlings die from predators such as birds or sea predators, and the exhaustion and starvation caused by disorienting bright, artificial lights.

There are three sea turtle species that nest on Florida's beaches. Locally, the loggerhead turtle is the predominant nester. Green turtle nests are increasing and there is a small number of Kemp's ridley turtles. A female sea turtle does not nest every year (average 3-4 years,) but when she does, she nests multiple times in a season about two weeks apart. In 2020, there were 4,630 loggerhead nests, 154 green turtle nests and two Kemp's ridley nests reported by the Coastal Wildlife Club which is responsible for collecting the data on Manasota Key and the north part of Knight Island.

For questions or assistance with adjusting the lighting on your property, contact Sarasota County's Sea Turtle Protection Program at **861•5000** or visit segov.net (keywords sea turtle lighting guide.) To report an injured or dead sea turtle, contact the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission at 888-404-3922.

Here are some ways to help sea turtles beat the odds, from the Coastal Wildlife Club and Sarasota County government websites:

- · Each night, remove all furnithe beach and store them in an area landward of the beach and lanterns, flash photography or dunes. This includes canopies, chairs, toys, and boats that can obstruct sea turtle females and their hatchlings.
- Properly dispose of trash each day. Sea turtles ingest plastic bags, and garbage attracts predators that eat turtle
- Enjoy building sandcastles and ponds but knock down sand sculptures and fill in holes before you leave the beach, so turtles have direct access into and out of the water. A turtle that falls into a hole cannot get
- · Reduce use of flashlights on

the beach at night. Do not use ture and recreational items from flashlights (including the one on windows. Interior lights visible your phone,) tiki torches, fishing from the beach also pose a

- Property owners must either extinguish all white lights visible harass turtles, dig up nests or from the beach or replace them harm hatchlings (and shorebird with amber or red light-emitting diodes (LED) or low-pressure sodium vapor (LPS) bulbs and pair them with shielded fixtures. Hatchlings use the glow from the water to direct them to the sea. Artificial lighting disorients them so they head towards that source and die from exhaus-
- · Enjoy the sand and the beach with a safe distance away from marked nesting areas.
- Remember to close draperies

and also move lamps back from danger.

- Do not allow pets on the beach. Pets running loose may chicks.)
- · If you are fortunate enough to encounter a nesting turtle on the beach, remain quiet, at a distance, and in the dark. Allow her to return undisturbed to the
