
#### **Boating Safety Class Offered**


#### Men are Dogs!

#### **What Amanda's Watching**

I watch literally zero crime series on TV, maybe the occasional episode of Columbo at midnight on Sunday. I'm not a big fan of murders and autopsies and murders of people who know someone who was murdered. But I am a big fan of actress/singer Queen Latifiah who stars in The Equalizer on CBS. She's Robyn McCall, a former CIA operative who now dedicates her time and Liam Neeson-level skill set to helping people with nowhere else to turn. McCall lives with her feisty mother and smart and sassy teenage daughter. The always-reliable Adam Goldberg provides comic relief as an underground tech genius named Harry and Tory Kittles is McCall's ubiquitous detective friend/foe on the force.

OK, so I'm actually watching two crime shows right now. Kate Winslet was the draw for me to tune into *Mare of Easttown*, an HBO limited series about a small-town Pennsylvania detective investigating a murder while dealing with extensive personal issues. By episode two,



Saturday Night Live parodied the show and its characters' "very specific accent." And while that accent is occasionally distracting, the exceptional acting and writing more than make up for it. I'm all caught up on episode three and totally hooked.

When I realized I had caught my daughter's 48-hour flu thing, I knew I had to choose my TV viewing wisely. I had to pick a lighter offering so if I drifted off I wouldn't miss much, and something I could complete in 10 hours or less, allowing five hours of viewing per sick day. I chose Firefly Lane, a 10-episode hour-long drama starring Katherine Heigl as tough-girl/ troublemaker Tully and Scrubs' Sarah Chalke as good girl Kate. The series is based on the book of the same name by Kristin Hannah and follows the BFFs and their various jobs and men from the 1970s to the 2000s. It's above average Hallmarkish fare with an endearing performance by Chalke, fun period music and wardrobe and comfortably predictable plots.

Because I don't have enough TV channels and streaming options, I sprung for Paramount+, primarily so I could watch the seventh and final season of my guilty pleasure *Younger*. The comedy follows Liza (Sutton Foster), who we meet in the first season, recently divorced and desperate for a job. Frustrated by her prospects she



Once she is forced to come clean, *Younger* became more believable but it has definitely run its course as this final season is the weakest.

In Supernova, Sam (Colin Firth) and Tusker (Stanley Tucci) are a couple traveling together in the English countryside. Sam is doing all the driving and we soon learn that Tusker, a novelist, is suffering from early onset dementia. From the first scene, I was invested in Sam and Tusker as they visit friends and face their future. Supernova is a masterclass in acting and a moving portrayal of a loving long-term relationship. Don't wait to fly to see it.

#### What Amanda's Rewatching

With its eighth and final season due to premiere sometime later this year, I began rewatching the NBC (formerly FOX) sitcom *Brooklyn Nine-Nine* on Netflix. This consistently funny cop show stars Andy Samberg and Andre Braugher and a stellar supporting cast. It's smart and dumb and fun and I'm enjoying rewatching from the beginning. Give it a try.

When Jessica Walter passed away in April, it reminded me how much I enjoyed watching her as the deeply flawed Lucille Bluth on Arrested Development. The irreverent comedy about the dysfunctional Bluth family aired from 2003 to 2006 on Fox and then for two more seasons on Netflix in 2018-19. As much as I enjoyed the first three seasons, I could never get motivated to finish the series after its decadeplus hiatus. Apparently neither could my boyfriend. We are thoroughly enjoying the laughout-loud early seasons and preparing for the less criticallyacclaimed finale.

## **HOME OFFICE MUST-HAVES**

Remote work has been around for many years, though it certainly picked up steam in 2020. In an effort to prevent the spread of the novel coronavirus COVID-19, in March 2020 government officials implemented stay-athome measures that mandated many working professionals to begin working from home. Soundproofing walls may not be necessary, but look for areas of the home that don't get much foot traffic. Kitchens are very popular rooms in many homes, so try to locate your home office away from the kitchen. A spare bedroom upstairs may make for the most ideal home office setting if the home does not have a traditional den. Spare bedrooms come with doors, which can instantly create a sense of quiet when closed. A converted garage also can make for a useful home office, but make sure the room already has cooling and heating and, ideally, windows.



#### **ELECTRICAL OUTLETS**

Recently built homes tend to be equipped with enough outlets to accommodate our increasingly connected lifestyles. But older homes may need some electrical updates before they can capably accommodate home offices. When updating your electrical, replace existing outlets and fixtures with energy-efficient LED fixtures, which save money and benefit the environment. Before updating the electrical, decide on how you want the office to be laid out so you can have outlets, some with USB ports, installed where your computer, devices and other items, like a printer and television, will be. This makes it easy to hide cords and give the office a clean, professional look.

#### **Annuals/Bedding plants:**

Plants that can take summer heat include coleus, salvia, torenia, wax begonia, and ornamental pepper.

**Bulbs:** Some lilies do better when their roots are crowded. Try planting Amazon, Aztec, and Clivia lilies in containers to increase blooming.

**Herbs:** Plant heat-loving herbs, including basil, Mexican tarragon, ginger, cumin, summer savory, and rosemary.

Vegetables: Sweet potatoes, boniato, hot peppers, and tropical "spinach" such as Sisso, Malabar, and New Zealand can be planted now.

#### **WHAT TO DO**

Pests: Watch for thrips, scale, and mites on ornamental plants because they become more active in warm weather.

#### Gardenias and ixora:

Distinguish between the normal yellowing of older leaves and the yellowing of new growth, which usually indicates a micronutrient deficiency.

**Oleanders:** Inspect chewed or ragged leaves for oleander



**Trees:** Prepare for hurricane season by checking trees for damaged or weak branches and prune if needed. Hire an ISA-



### Just Who Is Amanda Glam?

Amanda Glam could even be the nom de plume of a male writer. After all, the Nancy Drew books for young girls were all written by male ghostwriters under the pseudonym Carolyn Keene.

Glam's photo above her (or his?) column gives nothing away. It shows a classy blonde wearing dark glasses, who could be any glamour-puss. All that's lacking

is an N-95 antivirus mask to make the disguise complete. But take heart: I had the pleasure of corralling Amanda for an interview recently, and I intend to (spoiler alert) spill the beans.

One clue to the person behind the persona is Amanda's column itself. It's informative, entertaining and showcases the writer's sense of humor and way with words. Who else would toss around terms like "lollapalooza" and "cinephile"?

Amanda was born in Boston, Massachusetts and grew up in Randolph, a few miles south of the city. She admits to being a natural comedienne (okay, she's a female). "I was very funny as a kid. I liked to make people laugh. I loved to make my Nana laugh, and she liked me to do that." Amanda was a very good student all through school. "Except for math," she confesses. "I liked writing, and I put my hand up for anything. The other kids thought I was kind of nerdy, I guess."

Amanda at first thought she wanted to be a teacher, and later she thought, maybe a social worker.

After graduating from Randolph High School she put two years in at UMass Amherst taking communications courses and then switched to Simmons, a private college (now a university) in Boston, where in 1983 she earned a bachelor's degree in human services and English—a nice fit for her later life choices.

Her first job after graduating from Simmons was in a stateoperated mental health clinic in the projects in South Boston, one of the roughest neighborhoods in the city. Over a period of two years she served first as a receptionist and then as a group therapy leader. The patients loved her. "Every job I've ever had, I've been able to do well, and I've liked almost all my jobs. I did whatever they asked me to do. I was the girl who always raised her hand, you know." But sometimes it reached a stage when it wasn't challenging or wasn't fun anymore, and that's when she'd look for something

Amanda found that something else in 1986, when she moved to Washington, DC, working as a temp before landing a position with the National Health Lawyers Association as a receptionist. Over the next five or six years she worked her way up to executive assistant to the membership director, a well-paid position in the nation's most exciting city. "I loved DC," she says. "I'm a city girl, and DC is my kind of city." It was there that she met and married Nigel Lonsdale, now deceased, who remained her partner for 26

"My writing of humorous material really began when I started writing a holiday newsletter," she says. "I put in lots of stuff about the kids, hamsters and bad family vacations, and it was actually very funny. My Aunt Esther called me the Jewish Erma Bombeck."

When she came to
Englewood in 1994 to be near
her parents, Howard and Carol
Finkel, she became a charter
member of the local chapter of
Toastmasters International and
found good use for the materials
and techniques she had honed in
her holiday newsletter. Before

long everyone knew her as (ta da!) Sharyn Lonsdale.

She tried her hand at standup comedy at McCurdy's Comedy Theatre in Sarasota, and she had some success. "I was fourth in line to do my stuff, and we each had four minutes to perform.

The three guys ahead of me were pretty disgusting. If I were a woman in the audience, I would have felt very uncomfortable. When I came on, the audience gave a sigh of relief. My set was clean, about the vicissitudes of raising a teenage daughter, and the audience liked it. The people at McCurdy's asked me to come back." But she didn't. "I found standup to be very stressful, and that's why I don't do it anymore. But all my jobs involve public speaking, and I still make people laugh all the time," she says.

In the last 27 years-22 of them in Englewood and the last five in Venice-Sharyn says, "I volunteered for everything." She's a volunteer for Chabad of Venice and North Port as well as the Venice Area Chamber of Commerce, and she's Communications Chair for the Venice-Nokomis Woman's Club. In the past she served on the school advisory council and PTO of the Englewood schools her daughters Abby and Jenna attended, and she was a member of the Business and Professional Women of Englewood and Venice. She acknowledges that "a million years ago" she was named Woman of the Year. And oh, yes-right now she's President of her condominium association. "Nobody else wanted to do it, so I raised my hand," she says apologetically.

While volunteering for all of these organizations, Sharyn also held full-time jobs as a staff writer for the *Sarasota Herald-Tribune* from 1998 to 2006, Campus Administrator for the Hermitage Artist Retreat from 2008 to 2016, and Director of Marketing for The Venice Symphony since October of 2016. Impressive roles, all of them, for this talented lady. She still finds time to write this

newspaper's columns entitled "Real Englewood Area Dish" and "Amanda Glam," and to top it all off, she runs a trivia game, "Team Trivia with Sharyn," in the area. Whew!

"You know," she says, "Englewood is the kindest community. I love Venice, but I miss Englewood. People go out of their way to help you. Tom and Pat Newton, the Englewood Review's owners, gave me my first writing job shortly after I moved here, and that led to my getting hired by the Herald-Tribune. I'm thankful that my parents are nearby. My friends and family are very important to me. I've got a good partner, Daniel. I've got good kids, grown up now, in Abby and Jenna, and a perfect granddaughter, Makaira." She also has three feisty cats: Jasmine, George and Mitzi. In short, life is not only busy but good for Sharyn Lonsdale, aka Amanda Glam.

- Seek professional treatment for addiction to opioids, including prescription pain medicine, heroin, or fentanyl.
- Get support from family, friends, and doctors.
- Keep naloxone handy for others who may be at risk, or yourself in case of relapse.
- Avoid medicines that contain opioids or similar compounds.


