

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

Summer Fertilizer Ban

Just a reminder! Sarasota and Charlotte Counties now have their seasonal fertilizer bans in effect until September 30. This means any fertilizer containing nitrogen or phosphorous may not be used on residential or commercial turf or landscape plants. During the rainy season, unnecessary fertilizing and improper fertilizer application can result in runoff that sends nutrients into waterways where they feed harmful aquatic algae. Green up with iron. Iron products with micro-nutrients keep lawns green through the summer. Leave grass clippings on your lawn and mow high for lawn health. Mowing short stresses grass and makes it vulnerable to disease,

Recreational Burn Ban

Sarasota County is now under a countywide recreational burn ban due to the dry weather conditions and an increased chance of wildfires. In accordance with Sarasota County's open burning ordinance, the mandatory burn ban will remain in effect until weather conditions change and the chance of wildfire decreases. Recreational fires in Sarasota County are defined as any noncommercial burning of approved fuel for pleasure, religious, or ceremonial reasons. This includes campfires, bonfires and any open fires not specifically permitted by Florida Forest Service. The only exception to the ban is cooking fires used on outdoor grills. Should a wildfire erupt, nearby residents are urged to follow the directions from authorities, which may include evacuations in localized areas. FWC Catch & Release Update The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) made changes to snook,

redfish and spotted seatrout management in southwest Florida where they are currently catch-and-release only. Effective June 1, following changes took place: Sarasota Bay through Gordon Pass in Collier County: Snook and redfish will remain catch-and-release through May 31, 2022. Pasco County and Tampa Bay: Normal regulations will resume for snook, redfish and spotted seatrout in all state waters in Pasco County, Pinellas County and Tampa Bay. These regulations are for all state waters north of State Road 64 in Manatee County plus the Braden River but not including Palma Sola Bay. Spotted seatrout harvest will resume with a sixfish recreational vessel limit. Commercial harvesters can visit the FWC website for current regulations. As a reminder, snook, redfish and spotted seatrout were temporarily made catch-and-release only in this area after these fisheries were impacted by a 2017-2019 severe red tide. 

This summer is unlike any our area has seen before. In most years, summer is when year-round residents "take back" their favorite restaurants. 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
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Amanda's Summer Movie Preview Extravaganza

One of those opportunities is back. Englewood's Community Redevelopment Area Advisory Board (CRA) is resuming their monthly meetings at the Lemon Bay Park on the second Monday of each month at 1:00 pm.

Another is The Old Englewood Village Association (OEVA), which continues to host their Town Hall meetings every third Monday at 3:30 pm at The Open Studio (TOS), 380 Old Englewood Road. During those meetings OEVA does its best to listen and learn about the



concerns and the goals of the community.

To bring you up to speed, Robert Reil, a business system analyst for a major bank, is now the President of OEVA. Evelyn Dales, the owner of the TOS properties, is our Vice President. Todd Tracy, despite his/my reluctance, is the Secretary, John Watson, manager of the Joe Max coffee shop on Dearborn Street, is the Treasurer, and Les Bernstein, the owner of the Rehab on Dearborn, rounds out the five active board members two seats remain open.

The topic of our recent Town Hall meetings has been the Residential Commercial Transition Overlay district, known as the RCTOD, which consists of several specific blocks of homes directly north of Dearborn Street. The discussions have included re-branding the zoning district with a name that is fun, distinctive, and definitive. fitting of the opportunities the RCTOD offers.

Evelyn Dales and her RCTOD committee, which consists primarily of property owners within the zoning district, with the help of Marie Laforge, the owner of Mango Bistro, came up with some fun names for the district.

After a lengthy debate, "Englewood Arts District" (EAD) was chosen. Englewood is clearly a place, so that worked. The word "arts," is the focus of the RCTOD zoning, so that worked as well. Finally, the word "district" tied it all together. Per Marie, people are drawn to districts because they imply that there is a wide variety of goods and services to enjoy.

Paraphrasing the committee, the name Englewood Arts District presents a more "wholistic" understanding of the zoning, bringing everything together. With some creative branding, the EAD could quickly be understood by the public as the valuable art destination that it is. Nothing changes legally, the naming idea is simply a marketing tool that OEVA will use in the future promotions of the RCTOD arts district.

The second idea crafted by Marie was a logo, a cluster of four multi-colored hands. "... hands represent the connection to all the arts. Along with fun and playful, it has meaning in that way. We can also utilize the colors and different hands to further delineate the (sub) arts on maps or signage..." Marie described her logo idea as "...dynamic, colorful, unique, fun and easily recognizable once on signs and T-shirts".

The OEVA Town Hall discussions are a great way to share and be heard. Summers are also a good season to kick around community ideas like this and many more because we all tend to have a little more time on our hands. How to remove mildew from your home's exterior

Homeowners want their residences to look inviting inside and out. Part of keeping an attractive property involves addressing issues that can compromise not only the appearance of a home, but even its integrity.

People who live in regions with high humidity may find their homes are vulnerable to exterior mildew growth. Mildew is a kind of mold. Molds include all species of microscopic fungi that grow in the form of hyphae, which are multicellular filaments, according to the Environmental Protection Agency. Mold thrives on any organic matter and surfaces with moisture management problems. Mildew, in particular, lives on shower walls, windowsills and

other places where moisture levels are high. Mildew also can grow on home siding, as well as fences and other exterior structures. While typically gray or white, mildew can be various colors.

Experts recommend various cleansers to help combat the issue of mildew on a home. One of the first products that homeowners tend to reach for is sodium hypochlorite, which is a standard bleach used in laundry and pool sanitation. While sodium hypochlorite seems to make mildew vanish, those at This Old House say that chlorine evaporates too quickly to get to mildew's roots on porous surfaces, such as wood or vinyl siding. Bleach also can stain clothing and damage foliage

around the house. Hydrogen peroxide, or oxygen bleach, is less volatile, will not affect foliage and can clean mildew, algae and dirt on and below the surface.

Trisodium phosphate is another effective cleanser. Commonly known as TSP, it often succeeds where other solutions fail in regard to stubborn stains and mildew. TSP also works well on various exterior surfaces. TSP needs to be used with extreme caution. When using TSP, wear long sleeves, gloves, goggles, and a respiratory mask, says Today's Homeowner. The product also requires adequate ventilation. There also are some environmental concerns, as TSP can damage foliage. In addition,

ends up in lakes and streams, it can trigger an overgrowth of algae that results in the depletion of oxygen levels in the water. Eco-conscious homeowners may want to try oxy cleansers before TSP.



shies away from bright sunlight, so it tends to grow on the north side of homes. Removing trees or other foliage that can further block sunlight to areas of the house can help eradicate mildew growth and stop it before it starts. Another tactic is to clean out gutters regularly and thoroughly to reduce moisture and to prevent decomposing

debris from running over the edge of the gutters. This runoff can drip down the home's siding and spread the mildew to other areas.

Who Are You Going to Call?

Who are you going to call? Not when you need a ghostbuster, but when a person is missing. Peace River K9 Search and Rescue (PRSAR) are here to assist law enforcement and other agencies when someone goes missing. This entirely volunteer, self-funded non-profit organization is headquartered here in Englewood, but they are available to assist in search and rescue missions in SW Florida and beyond.

PRSAR is a highly trained & certified volunteer organization that can assist in live and cadaver searches, using human odor trained dogs (K9s) as well as mounted horse teams, water search boats, drone, and a Polaris. K9s can also detect buried bodies, as human body odor gases rise to the surface over time. Archaeologists request them to locate human remains within a dig area and the team has assisted with locating 6,000-year-old Paleoindian bones here in Florida.

PRSAR offers live-find (living person), cadaver, scent specific, urban tracking (in cities,) and electronics device searches on both land and water. If a person is missing in a body of water, a boat with sonar and a K9 team will search the water. The dogs can detect human odor arising from gas bubbles released from an underwater body, narrowing the search grid to a specific area. Sonar can then be used to detect the exact location.

Michael Hadsell, PRSAR president, founded this search

and rescue team. He had been part of a search and rescue organization in California and, after moving to this area, found that there was a shortage of qualified searchers. He started PRSAR with a five-member team, incorporated as a nonprofit organization in 2010, and it grew to 66 members in 2017. There are currently twenty-two highly trained and certified members who volunteer their time to participate in these missions that may last one day or more – all at their own expense. The team has been called on missions throughout Florida, other states, and some international missions Their mission is to assist local, state, military, federal, private agencies, and families as a force multiplier in the recovery of lost, missing, and abducted persons. Their community outreach includes community talks, team demonstrations, and a school age presentation called "Hug a Tree." When children get lost, they often wander in circles. "Hug a Tree" teaches them to hug a tree and stay put, making it easier for searchers to locate them.

Some examples of their missions include narrowing a search for a missing person by tracking the scent from their home to a bus stop, then picking up the scent at a bus stop at a shopping center known to the person, to an ATM, and then to the stores. The person was later found naturally deceased in that area. They helped search for a missing boater in Charlotte Harbor and located the deceased boater in his life jacket. Most searches, however, do end in

finding the missing individual alive and the team is certified in first aid to render care before medical personnel arrive. The team is used by the Forestry Service to locate anyone in the area of a prescribed burn before setting the fires.

Volunteers devote a huge amount of time to training and perfecting reading canine body language, creating a handler/dog relationship and communication. Canines are trained to respond to human odors and will display behavior such as changing their gait or standing/sitting by a find. There are monthly meetings as well as practice sessions two times a month to keep their tracking skills sharp. Volunteers keep a "to-go" bag filled with gear so they can leave immediately when asked for their assistance. Besides the handlers, other volunteers will set up a base camp to maintain radio contact with the searchers, and some are "flankers," which means they follow behind a team to handle radio contact, watch for dangers in wilderness areas and

in other ways, provide the search team's support. All volunteers are first aid/CPR trained for both humans and pets. Both humans and canines must be trained to meet FEMA 508 type 1 standards and pass an exhaustive in-house evaluation. If you want to be impressed by the skill level maintained by both handler &

canine, as well as the rest of the organization's members, go to www.prsar.org and look at volunteer accreditations.

I was able to witness three different search methods. An archaeologist team had sent five bags of soil samples from a possible dig site, and Beamer sniffed the bags to detect any human odor. When the dog detected a human odor from a bag, he laid on the bag. All samples are double checked by another canine. A live person search was also demonstrated when I ran across a field zigzagging to hide behind a tree and brush. When Apollo was released, I was quickly located. An area search was demonstrated by having me walk a distance away and hide behind a palmetto scrub area. Again, I was quickly located by Damma, proving her competence in locating a missing person in a large area. The dog's reward may be treats, playing with a special toy or just the search mission itself.

Being a member of PRSAR is an emotional rollercoaster. Searchers feel elation when a missing person is located alive, sadness and gratitude on being able to give loved ones a definite answer when that person is found deceased, and if there are no hits in an area, that area can at least be ruled out of the search. Their mission is to give loved ones "answers."

As mentioned earlier, PRSAR receives no government or agency funding. These dedicated volunteers rely on donations from the public to help fund the numerous expenses necessary to operate. Handlers pay for their travel expenses, food & lodging, equipment, canine-related expenses, and time missed from a job. 








ASPCA announces new online tool



Have you found a stray kitten outside? To coincide with the start of kitten season, the AS-PCA® (The American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals®) announced the launch of a new online tool accessible on desktop and mobile devices to help the public choose the next steps to take if they find stray kittens outdoors. Newborn and young kittens, both among the most vulnerable animal populations, are often removed from their environment and unintentionally orphaned by well-meaning community members; but this might not always be the right course of action. For example, some stray kittens may appear to be alone, but the mother catwho knows exactly what her new litter needs-may be hiding nearby or out getting food. Not all kittens require the same kind of assistance, and the public can now easily determine the appropriate lifesaving approach, tailored to the individual situation of each kitten, by answering a series of simple questions about how the animals were found and other observations. 


