



On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther, a Catholic priest and professor of theology, nailed his 95 theses on the door of All Saints' Church in Wittenberg, Germany. At that time, church doors were the equivalent of today's internet. Dr. Luther's theses were grievances against the corrupt practices of the Catholic church, including the selling of indulges – for a price, people could buy their way out of purgatory. Dr. Luther's belief is that people receive salvation only as a gift through their faith in Christ. He also included his belief that, the Bible is the central religious authority, thus the Bible interprets itself. His ideas rapidly gained popularity among the general population and sparked the beginning of the Protestant Reformation.

Great news! On Sunday, October 25 at 9:30 am, at Christ Lutheran Church, 701 N. Indiana Ave., Englewood, Martin Luther will be preaching, and you can hear his side of the story. We've been told that he will be travelling from Germany to

Tampa on Lufthansa Airlines. But Dr. Luther doesn't trust automobiles, so his transportation from Tampa to Englewood will be by ox cart. Go figure!

Following the worship service, meet Pastor Ken Lentz (who bears a remarkable resemblance to Dr. Luther). Pr. Lentz has an impressive curriculum vitae. He attended Trinity Seminary in Columbus, Ohio and earned his doctorate in the field of Reformation and post-Reformation history from the University of Heidelberg, Germany. Pr. Lentz has served churches in several locations including Germany, Ohio, Michigan, California, and Arizona. He served





Things Have Had A Way Of Blossoming For This Guy

At 93 years of age, Richard (Dick) Mayer has had an interesting life, one punctuated from time to time by unusual incidents. You want stories? Dick has many that are worth repeating.

Let's start with his dad, Joseph Mayer. Joe enlisted in America's 213th Aero Squadron to fight in France in World War I, the "war to end all wars" ... and he almost made it. He was aboard the Tuscania, which was bringing the first load of American troops to the front on February 5, 1918 when it was sunk by a German submarine off the coast of Ireland. Over 200 American troops were lost, and Joe was one who survived to tell the tale. The Tuscania joined its sister ship, the Titanic of 1912 and the Lusitania of 1914 as maritime disasters that shocked the American public in that decade.

After the war, Joe returned to his home town of Patchogue, N.Y., on the south shore of Long Island, got married, started a family in 1922 with son Rob, added to the family in 1927 with son Dick, and started a farm in 1929—the year the stock market crashed and the Great Depression began. Great timing. Well, Joe started by growing flowers—mostly roses—and the business

continued to bloom throughout the years.

"I started working for my dad in the field when I was five years old," Dick Mayer remembers. He learned to handle a horse and plow, and he could drive a tractor or a truck before he was old enough to have a license. "During World War II, my dad stopped growing flowers and grew vegetables. Every day before school we'd load up a truck with tomato plants and I'd bring them to the grocery store. I'd have maybe 25 flats left over that I'd sell out in front of the grocery store, and people would take them home to start their own victory gardens." Victory gardens were everywhere in those days-even atop the roof of the White House. Incidentally, Dick never got a ticket for his under-age driving. "Remember," he says with a smile, "I always had a few flats of tomato plants in the back of my truck.'

When he was 14 Dick joined the newly formed Civil Air Patrol. "I loved flying, and I wanted to be an air cadet," he says. "One of the men in the

CAP would take me flying two or three days a week, and he taught me to fly. We'd go out over the ocean looking for German submarines. We didn't find any ourselves, but the CAP did." According to official military records, the coastal patrols sighted a total of 173 U-boats during World War II.

"When I was 17, I went to enlist in the Army Air Force. I was sworn in, and they told me that I'd get a notice to report for training two days after I graduated from Patchogue High School," Dick recalls.

Sure enough, he did. The U.S. was rushing to get as many troops as possible ready for Operation Overlord, the invasion of Normandy, and the follow-up drive into Germany. When Dick's group of recruits arrived at their basic training camp in Biloxi, Mississippi (famous now via the Neil Simon play and movie, "Biloxi Blues"), they were assigned to the infantry, not the air force. "Four of my classmates were among those sent to the Normandy landings after three months' training and died in battle," he remembers sadly.

Dick did not go with them. He had applied to be on the camp's boxing team, acquitted himself well, and was held over at Scott Air Force Base in Illinois to participate in a boxing competition when the rest of his basic training class were sent to Europe. Shortly thereafter he was assigned to a small group of airmen who were to serve as airplane mechanics for the European Air Transport Service (EATS). "I didn't know anything about mechanics, but who was I to argue?" he queries.

After landing in LeHavre, Dick's group was sent to Paris and then Wiesbaden, Germany, by which time the war was over. But on the way to Wiesbaden, they stopped at the Dachau concentration camp, which had been converted to a POW camp for German soldiers. "They made us MPs for about three weeks, and we had to help guard the German prisoners. The place was overflowing with them."

In Wiesbaden, Dick was assigned to the motor pool, but he didn't have a lot to do. "I was useless as a mechanic," he swears, but the Air Force officers who had to keep up their flying hours would invite him to come along with them, and they'd let him do some piloting while they were up there. By the time he left Wiesbaden, he had flown to most of the seven EATS bases in Europe and accumulated over 700 hours of flight time. He could pilot a plane, even though he never did get a pilot's license.

Dick also served as an unofficial "procurer" of goods and services for the commanding officer there, negotiating with German nationals for paint or other goods that could be used at the EATS base. On one occasion, he was driving in the countryside and came upon a grave with a



cross on it and a set of American dogtags dangling from the cross. In talking with the townsfolk nearby, he was told that an American pilot had parachuted from his plane and had been shot when found by German soldiers. The townspeople had buried him and put up the cross and dogtags. Dick reported the grave to the military authorities in Wiesbaden, and eventually the victim was identified, his parents notified, and the body exhumed and returned to the United States for a proper military burial.

During the post-war period in 1946, a thriving black market developed in Germany, and madcap buying and trading went on among the locals and GIs alike: lightbulbs, watches, souvenir weapons, food, almost anything could be gotten in the black market if nowhere else. In this milieu, Dick managed to trade a beautiful rifle for an oddity: the license plate of the service vehicle in which General George S. Patton was killed. "It had his four stars on the plate," Dick says, but the authenticity of that plate has never been

officially validated or discredited to this day. After keeping the plate in a place of honor in his office for years, Dick eventually sold it for a price well below its presumed value, something that, in retrospect, he regrets.

Dick was a staff sergeant when he was honorably discharged in November 1946, and he returned to Patchogue to work on his father's flower farm. That business evolved from growing flowers to wholesale marketing and (in 1960) to retail sales. Dick bought out his brother Rob and ran the company known widely as Mayer Greenhouses & Flower Cottage, Ltd. But it was no cottage industry. It became one of the largest flower businesses in Long Island under Dick's leadership, and one local paper deemed him to be a "flower tycoon." The company is still going today, under the guidance of Dick's son Jeffrey and his wife Lynda.

His success in business led Dick to take on outside responsibilities. For over 40 years he served on the board of the Brookhaven Memorial Hospital, holding positions as

treasurer, secretary and finally vice chairman. He was at one time or another president of the Long Island Flower Grower's Association, a board member of the Chamber of Commerce and chairman of the Southern New England Producers Credit Association. He was a busy man, a horticulturist, a banker, a businessman and a philanthropist in

those years.

In 1948 Dick had married his childhood sweetheart, Betty Wilson, and they raised three children (Jeffrey and his sisters, Patricia and Joy) during their 64 years of marriage. "When Betty died, I never thought I'd find another person I wanted to be with," he says. But about eight years ago he met a gal, a former model and a fellow plant lover, whose name was-are you ready for this?-Shirley Flowers. "We met at the country club, and when I asked her what her last name was, she said 'Flowers.' I thought she was putting me on, and I was a little annoyed." Shirley had to make a fuss herself before he finally believed her. Well, love conquers all. They've been inseparable ever since. "She's wonderful," he confesses.



2020 should have been the most epic Halloween ever, with October 31 happening on a Saturday under a full moon. Instead, because of COVID-19, it will be a holiday of lowkey, creative and alternative celebrations.

McCune said 4600 children and adults jammed the street last year and that in addition to the obvious logistical issue, there's liability, as no insurance companies cover viral outbreaks

She says that the goal is for everyone to have fun and credits OEVA's new webmaster Eric Peterson for making the contest possible. 
MAINTAIN INDOOR AIR QUALITY ALL YEAR

Millions of Floridians anxiously anticipate the arrival of fall. Months spent cooped up indoors as temperatures soar can take their toll, and those first cool days of fall can be just what people need to kick the summer blues.

 Chemical cleaning products may be

great at disinfecting dishes, countertops and other areas in the home, but such items may be toxic and adversely affect indoor air quality. For example, chemicals such as bleach and ammonia, which are used in many commercial cleaning products, can linger in the air, irritating the eyes, nose, throat, and lungs. Homeowners concerned about the quality of air in their homes also can avoid scented products, such as air fresheners and scented detergents, which the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health notes may release volatile organic compounds into the air.

Inspect bathrooms for mold growth. Mold can grow on surfaces that are routinely wet, and that makes poorly ventilated bathrooms common sources for home mold infestations. Mold can adversely affect indoor air quality when mold spores are released, potentially triggering allergic reactions, asthma attacks and respiratory conditions. After bathing in bathrooms without vents, men and women can open windows so the room dries before mold can grow. In bathrooms with vents, make sure vents are running during baths and showers and afterward until ceilings, walls and floors appear dry.

These are tough times for a movie fan and reviewer and her mega-film-fan daughter. The B&B Theatres in Venice, which was in the midst of an impressive renovation, remains closed with no set opening date. On October 9, CineWorld temporarily closed all its Regal cinemas across the United States in order to protect the company from going bankrupt. That means that if you live in Englewood, even if you wanted to go to the movies, you'd either have to drive to Sarasota or Fort Myers.

Regal had actually been open for two months before the closure, and according to the company, due to the safety precautions, not one case of COVID could be traced back to the theaters.

The main reason theaters are closed or like B&B and AMC in danger of bankruptcy, is because there are almost no films available for distribution. Hollywood is holding back its big movies until theaters in Los Angeles and New York are allowed to open. This past week, New York theaters were allowed to open at 25% capacity, but that did not include New York City.

While there are many smaller films destined for the big and small screen this year, most potential blockbusters, including Dune, Black Widow, and the latest 007 movie, No Time to Die, have been pushed back to 2021. Paramount just announced that it was selling Eddie Murphy's star vehicle, Coming 2 America to Amazon Studios. Right now, the only major live-action films headed for the cinema in a normally very crowded December, are Wonder Woman 1984, Death on the Nile, and Free Guy, starring Ryan Reynolds.

Film companies usually call the shots in these situations, unless you are writer/director/ critical darling Christopher Nolan. Imagine seeing Nolan's 2017 Oscar-nominee Dunkirk on the small screen. When his



latest mind-bender Tenet was scheduled for release during the COVID crisis, Nolan nixed any streaming option and the film was pushed to September only in theaters. To quote Nolan from an article on Deadline.com, "This is a film whose image and sound really needs to be enjoyed in your theaters on the big screen." That film is still on the big screen and this past week hit \$50 million in domestic ticket sales and nearly \$300 million overseas.

In happier times, Tenet would likely have been chased from the cineplex by now, but with competition like Kid Detective and The War with Grandpa, it was the only movie that Emma and I wanted to see. I was hesitant because Nolan's movies are a tad complicated. I'm still confused from seeing Memento 20 years ago.

Tenet makes Memento look like, well Kid Detective. All I can really tell you is that it takes place in the present, past and the future in more than one country. Kenneth Branagh plays a really bad guy with an Eastern European accent who has come to do really bad things at the request of the future. John David Washington is The Protagonist (yes that's his name) who somehow becomes inverted and gets to time travel and still look incredibly stylish. And speaking of stylish, very tall and welldressed Kat (Elizabeth Debicki),

for some reason, married evil Branagh who blackmails her, beats her and keeps her son from her while saying, and I kid you not, "If I can't have you, nobody will." Oh, and Robert Pattison of the Twilight movies, plays a spy or a scientist, or both, who is very handsome and also wears a mean suit.

At about the two-hour mark I got completely lost about who was who as everyone was wearing helmets, if it was the past or future, why the future was so mad at the present, and what exactly were those round metal things that could destroy the world. Don't

even ask me what a Tenet is and you better not get me started on the "algorithm."

I will say one thing, Nolan is right, Tenet (PG-13), is a movie for the big screen. When you have car chases, thankfully bloodless battles and opera sieges in at least two dimensions, you need a big screen. The sound is big, if occasionally muffled on purpose (again, don't ask me why), and the cinematography and special effects are extraordinary. Emma and I agreed that if we were watching Tenet on Netflix, we probably would have given up 40 minutes in. However, at home we'd have the option to rewind, which might have helped us understand what was going on.

Finally, I once again credit AMC with a seamless check-in and concessions experience. I felt very safe my entire time at the theater. My only complaint, please update your previews and don't subject me to movies "coming in September."

Ready or Not

As the governor opened up Florida, there are those of us who have been isolating for a long time and still remain cautious about the risks involved. For those of us who are paying attention to recent information that filters down through the piles of other stuff out there, it can be frightening. On the optimistic side, it is still possible to get out for some fresh air to go fishing without taking unnecessary risks. There are still risks including the sharp spines and teeth of our favorite gamefish, but we understand these issues and can deal with them.

First, a shore angler has to find uncrowded spots along the beach or other shorelines around here. When the season begins, that can be problematic as we welcome millions of visitors. As locals, we have a few advantages we can use. Avoiding weekends is a big one right now. Plan your trip during the week if possible to have the best selection of places to go. As the season progresses, week days and weekends are hard to tell apart by looking at the crowds. Weather also works to our advantage. If a visitor comes to Southwest Florida for three days, they must fish or beach even if it's raining and cold. We can wait it out.

This time of year our gamefish are on the move as waters cool ahead of the winter months. Fish move, along with bait, to warmer waters back in the bays and up the creeks and canals. By the time the Gulf temperatures sink into the lower 60's, most have left the beaches and passes for warmer water and a better menu on the flats. Some species like bluefish, mackerel, flounder and of course sheepshead are not affected as much by colder water and will remain on the beaches for the entire winter. Snook are the most sensitive to temperature





drop and some will even die if the water sinks into the lower 50's. To avoid the cold, snook will migrate miles up our creeks and rivers into freshwater where spring flows and sunshine on this tannic water help to keep the water warmer.

Speckled sea trout and redfish can't handle this freshwater refuge so they stay back in the bays seeking shallow dark bottom that warms the water on sunny days. A protective stand of mangroves as a windbreak can also help these areas stay warmer. So, an angler's obvious choice is to wade or kayak these warm, protected bays on a higher tide in the middle of the day to find these fish. Kayak anglers have the advantage fishing these shallow bays since many of them have bottoms that are too soft to wade. Always check the firmness of the bottom before wading away from shore or your kayak. It can take an awfully long time to wade 100 yards if you're sinking up to your knees with every step. Floating over a soft mud bottom in a kayak works a lot better. And, an observant angler can use this muddy bottom to find fish. Mullet generally swim in the upper part of the water column

on the flats. If you spook fish off the bottom that throws up a mud cloud, it's probably not a mullet. Redfish generally won't go too far before calming down, so note the direction of the mud trail and head that way making a few long casts ahead of yourself as you go.

This winter, as the temperatures cool, think like a fish. For kayak anglers, find secluded bays with protective mangroves and for wading anglers, adding a shallow firm bottom should get you on some fish. Get out on the water; it's good for the soul. Remember, snook, redfish and trout are catch and release until May 2021.






