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As a beachgoer or boater along Englewood Beach and Blind Pass (Middle) Beach, you have probably noticed a working barge filled with huge boulders placing those rocks on the water bottom. You are witnessing the last phase of the Manasota Key Beach Nourishment Project that has widened the badly eroded shore portion of Manasota Key beachfront. It was noted in the extensive surveys done prior to the project that the limestone rock shelf offshore was exposed due to the severe sand erosion along the shore and played a role in the continuing erosion of the shoreline. That rock shelf needed to be covered up to help mitigate future erosion after the sand nourishment project. It was determined that 3.9 acres of rock needed to be added to help contain the sand. Two sections of the water bottom were permitted to fulfill the requirement of constructing a rock reef about 1/4 mile offshore and placement as close to the Gulf floor as possible (about 20 to 22 feet below the water surface.) For boaters, this means they will have an anticipated clearance of 17 to 18 feet and in a few years enjoy the byproduct of great fishing. Surveys show the reefs will not interfere with the archaeological site off Manasota Key. The company performing the work is Cayo, LLC out of Texas. Boulders are delivered to the nearest deep-water receiving site which is Tampa Bay and brought down by barge to the work area, a trip that takes the barge about 18 hours. As of September 23rd, the fourth barge load was being placed which brings the rock reef to about 25% completion. The process was started on August 6, 2020 and the anticipated completion date is February 2021. For curious boaters and watercraft passing the barge, please remember that the area around the barge is a construction zone and to stay a safe distance away to minimize wake as this disturbs the construction barge doing its work. #### WHAT TO PLANT

Annuals/Bedding plants: Even though temperatures are still warm, begin planting for the cooler months ahead. Impatiens, alyssum, and dianthus are good plants for the fall/winter garden. Bulbs: Plant agapanthus, rain lily, and Clivia lily now for blooms next spring or summer. Add organic matter to the planting bed for best results. Herbs: A wide range of herbs can be planted from seed or transplants this month. Some to try include dill, fennel, parsley, and cilantro.

Vegetables: Easy crops that can be grown now include beans, broccoli, carrots, collards, lettuce, green onions, peppers, radishes, spinach, and tomatoes.

#### WHAT TO DO

Lawns: Control winter weeds in lawns before they appear. Preemergence herbicides must be applied at the right time to be effective. Apply when nighttime temperatures are 55°F-60°F for 4-5 days. **Ornamental trees and shrubs:** Fertilize plants that are not performing as desired. This is the last month of the year

to fertilize shrubs and trees. Controlled-release fertilizer provides nutrients over a longer period of time. Lawn fertilization: Fertilize lawns if needed.

Strawberries: Prepare beds and set strawberry plants this month. Strawberries also make a colorful and tasty container planting. Either way, water daily until plants are established. Palms: Palms have unique nutritional needs. Select a fertilizer that contains controlled release nitrogen, potassium and magnesium.

Oleanders: Control the oleander caterpillar, which is a year-round resident in South Florida, without harming beneficial insects by pruning off infested leaves or spraying with BT (Bacillus thuringiensis). Twig girdlers: Control twig girdlers by cleaning up and destroying fallen branches that young twig girdlers can use for harborage.

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#### The Real Englewood Area Dish **State Moves on to** Phase 3 and More By Sharyn Lonsdale

n September 26, Governor Ron DeSantis declared that Florida would be moving on to Phase 3 of reopening the state after the COVID-19 crisis. What does that mean for restaurants and their customers?

Restaurants and bars that had been operating at 50% capacity with social distancing guidelines are now allowed to operate at full capacity. Businesses can still require customers to wear masks, but DeSantis said, "all outstanding fines and penalties that have been applied against individuals are suspended."

While many restaurants will take advantage of the ruling, others are hesitating to embrace Phase 3, as are some diners. Some good news, the ruling does allow many restaurants to move part-time employees back to fulltime and hire more staff.

The announcement on Facebook that Lock N'Kev and sister restaurant the SandBar Tiki & Grille would be operating at full-capacity while maintaining strict sanitization policies, was met with plenty of customer love. Staff will continue to wear face coverings at both locations. Fans of the Lock 'N Key are also celebrating the return of its popular happy hour. Both restaurants offer large outdoor seating areas.

Farlow's on the Water promises that the Phase 3 dining experience will be just like Phase 2 except it will allow the reopening of some indoor tables. On its Facebook page, Farlow's vows to continue to maintain social distancing, keeping partitions in place, and to follow CDC recommendations, including keeping disposable menus, and having staff wear masks. The restaurant will also maintain strict sanitization procedures and will continue to take reservations, and also has plenty of outdoor seating.

Over at Prime Time, the restaurant is back open at 100%, however, one area will remain available for diners who want to social distance. Diners who prefer that room will need to ask to sit there. Staff will continue to wear masks and guests are requested to also wear face coverings in common areas in the restaurant. Parties of five or more can reserve regular or socially-distanced dining in advance. Outdoor dining is also available.

Marie Laforge said even though it would mean more revenue, she's passing on moving Mango Bistro on to Phase 3. The Dearborn Street eatery will remain at 50% capacity with social distancing and continue to offer take-out and delivery. The restaurant expanded its outdoor dining area, added Laforge, "We also are all wearing masks and are asking our customers to do the same. We feel obliged to keep our employees and their families safe."

That's good news for patrons like Diana Legg who said she plans to stay with restaurants who are "still following safety measures" and Kama Strombeck who when not eating at home, prefers take-out or dining at off-hours to avoid crowds. "We love all the area restaurants and want them to do well, but not at the risk of getting sick," said Strombeck.

They may want to join Tammy McShane's new Facebook group "COVID Responsible Restaurants and Businesses in Englewood and Surroundings." McShane, who lives in North Port, started the group to offer one page with current information on restaurants and businesses from Sarasota to Punta Gorda. "Not that one choice is better than another, but there are a lot of people who aren't ready to jump into a restaurant that is

wall-to-wall people where you don't have to wear masks," said McShane." She is requesting that group members share their experiences but keep politics off the page. She also encourages restaurant owners to share what they are doing to offer customers a safe environment, even if they are moving on to Phase 3.

Only you know how comfortable you are when dining out. For the most up-to-date information, call the restaurant to see your options and if possible, reserve your preferred seating area.

#### **Zeke's Reopens**

After a six-month COVID-19 shutdown, Zeke's Uptown Bar & Grill on West Dearborn Street, finally reopened on September 23 for breakfast and lunch, Wednesday through Monday, with expanded outdoor seating, indoor dining improvement and most of its original staff. At press time Zeke's was planning to open for dinner again soon. The new menu features old favorites and new items, including "immunity-boosting COVID-19 Cocktails spiked with quinine and zinc."

#### Let's Eat! Englewood is a great success!

Englewood's annual restaurant promotion event, Let's Eat! Englewood, just concluded on October 1, although many participating restaurants continued to offer the special \$13 lunch and \$26 dinner menus beyond that date. "This year the campaign was needed more than ever," said Kim Parks, Interim Director of the Englewood Florida Chamber of Commerce. "The fact that most offered carry-out, curbside and/ or delivery added to the "Let's Eat" experience." Parks said that while the final numbers weren't in yet, she expected Let's Eat-Englewood to generate more than \$100,000 in added business.

The Paul A. and Veronica H. Gross Wildlife Center of Southwest Florida, located in Venice, wants to remind everyone that with COVID-19, it is easy to overlook the ongoing threats posed to wildlife by Red Tide and other forms of toxicity that exist, such as cyanobacteria (bluegreen) algae. With a focus on avian and mammalian victims that the Wildlife Center receives calls about or are brought to the organization, here are some symptoms of mild to severe toxicity



that are fairly easy for the public to spot. They include "staggering" – a "drunken gait;" tremors; depression; an inability to stand; and a loss of fear of people. In birds and mammals, these are generally due to eating fish or other sea creatures that are weakened or killed by the toxin, which then enters the system of the secondary victim. There is no medication available, so treatment consists of "supportive" actions – flushing of the system by oral or subcutaneous fluid hydration, nutritional support and keeping the patient as warm and as unstressed as possible. If you see a bird or animal with any of the symptoms listed, please call **484**•**9657** or bring it to the Center for attention at 925 N. Jackson Road, Venice. Visit www.wildlifecenterofvenice.org or their Facebook page to learn more. If you were one of the beachgoers and boaters who frequented the southern end of Stump Pass Beach State Park during this year's bird nesting season, you may be interested in the bird nesting season report results from the Bird Stewarding Program. Audubon, Charlotte County and Friends of Stump Pass (FOSP) trained 33 people to be bird stewards and monitor the nesting site on Stump Pass. Because of the closure of the state park due to COVID-19, it was nearly impossible for the bird stewards to carry out their daily walks for site monitoring and answering questions, so the program was put on hold. Bird steward program chairs Mary Lundeberg and Carol McCoy continued to monitor the nesting area. In July there were about 150 least terns on the site. At one point, 18 fledged chicks were counted, as well as several downy and feathered chicks. Because of a tropical storm which wiped out several eggs early in the season, some terns renested. Another seven or more chicks

became flight capable later in August. A conservative estimate is that the terns at Stump Pass Beach State Park fledged about 25 least tern chicks this summer, as well as two Wilson's plover chicks. A highlight of the summer was the female American oystercatcher that rested around Marker 10, and also near the edge of the terns' territory from March until late August. A grant request by Lundeberg and McCoy to CHNEP (Coastal & Heartland National Estuary Partnership) was funded and used to create materials for the public and bird stewards. Lundeberg and McCoy wrote a 44-page book to be distributed to families on the beach next season, A Tale of a Tern, and a ten-page field guide to be used by bird stewards for species identification. The book will be available soon to the public and details will be announced when it is ready. #### Kelly's: The Oldest Remaining Bar in Englewood

Englewood has some pretty exciting bars, you probably never heard about the live alligator sitting on the counter, or the man tearing down the chandelier at the old Kellys bar on Dearborn Street. While driving to the antique shop last week I noticed a handwritten sign in the front of Kellys proclaiming it, "The Oldest Bar in Englewood." Always looking for original story ideas, I stopped in and set up an interview with Vickie Cole, the current owner.

On the day of the interview, Vickie had invited local legend Bernie Reading to share his early memories of the bar. Bernie said local pioneer Don Platt had told him that the bar building was built in 1920 and was originally used as a stable. According to Don, Ollie and Emma Tate bought the building in the early thirties, and then turned it into a grocery store. Even though this was during prohibition, the Tate's also sold beer and wine. There were only two places to get alcohol in Englewood at this time: Tate's Grocery, and Whiskey Corners, a bar near present day Merchant's Crossing. Bernie said that prohibition laws had little effect on Englewood since it was so isolated. Bernie's first experience with the Kelly building was in the mid-thirties. As a young boy he

would walk past the store on his way to get the mail at the old hardware store.

> Bernie enlisted in the Coast Guard at the age of 15 (with his mother's permission), and returned to Englewood in 1945. When Bernie came back, he visited the Tate store and found out that the building was now called Weide's Bar, owned by Frank and Jess Weide who were former carnie people. Even though

Bernie wasn't 21, Jess served him anyway. She said, "If you volunteered to go out and get shot at, you're old enough to come to this bar." As time passed, Bernie opened up a sign painting business and also did a lot of traveling. He said that Weide's was always his favorite place to go when he was in town.

As he recalled his days at Weide's, Bernie began to tell a few interesting stories about his favorite hangout. He said Frank's wife, Jess, was 6 feet tall and didn't take 'stuff' from anyone. One night one of the patrons was terribly drunk and refused to leave the bar. He even said, "Whose going to make me?" Jess grabbed the man and put him in an arm lock. She then pushed him out the door and said, "Come

back when you behave!"

Bernie also recalled the time that after a day of futile fishing, the only thing he and a friend caught was a three foot long alligator. Bernie came up with the idea of taking the gator to the bar and showing it to the tourists. Jess saw the gator and told Bernie to watch it. A man down the bar bragged that he knew everything about alligators. Bernie thought the man was acting like the "great white hunter" and proceeded to take the tape off the gator's mouth. Bernie left the creature right near the braggart, and left the bar. Bernie later found out that the man had numerous teeth marks on his arm. Bernie washed Jess's car and was permitted to

come back one month later. Another ad-

venture took place when one of the customers after drinking all day pulled up to the bar on his Harley and saw the new chandelier that the owner had installed to upgrade the atmosphere. The man took a flying leap and proceeded to pull

the fixture from the ceiling. Bernie said the owner had

to be prevented from shooting the fool on the spot.

The Weide's owned the bar until the early 70's when new ownership took over. For the next few years the bar was called Pete's. This owner sold the bar in the late 70's to a Mr Kell Kell was Polish, but somehow the name of the bar became "Kellys." Karen Goll was the next owner during the late 80's and 90's. In 1997 the bar closed for six months and reopened as "The Old Town Tap". Finally in 1999, the bar was purchased by current owner, Vickie

Cole. Vickie, who originally came from Indiana, was a patron of the bar, and liked it because of its' friendly atmosphere. "It's always been my dream to own a bar," she said

Vickie currently lives in the apartment above the bar and has tried to keep the atmosphere of the place the way it has always been. Bartender Kathleen Stringham said, "When the bar is running well, you don't change a thing." One of the only things that Vickie has done is to change the name to "Kellys II." Meeting new people all the time is the nicest part of owning this bar," said Vickie. Bernie and his wife, Phyllis, who are regular patrons, agree Vickie is a "wonderful, wonderful person." As far as the type of clientele that frequent the bar, Vickie said, "There is a mixture of wild and quiet ones. Some of the wild ones know when to have a good time and when to back off." When asked when she would sell the bar, Vickie answered, "When it stops being fun!" We hope that Vickie and Kellys II will be around for a long time.
