



HOUSE POWERWASHING TIPS

Powerwashing, also known as pressure-washing, utilizes a high-velocity water spray to remove dirt and residue from the exterior surfaces of a home. It is frequently used on vinyl siding, concrete and sometimes wood decks to treat mildew and other growth that accumulates over time.

Powerwashing can be a great way to remove grime without having to scrub by hand. But it requires a delicate touch to get it right. Sometimes it is best to leave the job to professionals. But homeowners willing to give it a go can try powerwashing themselves, as various stores rent power washers.

The home improvement website *ImproveNet* says that, until very recently, pressure washers were almost exclusively commercial machines sold to professionals or rented to do-it-yourselfers. Lately manufacturers have targeted homeowners looking to buy with lightweight options. For those who see powerwashing as a routine venture, purchasing a unit may be worth the investment.

It is important to exercise caution when operating a powerwashing machine. The high-velocity spray can tear through skin. It is key to get a feel for the washer, and try less pressure first to get a handle on the magnitude of the tool.

Don safety gear prior to using a pressure washer. Gloves, eye protection and ear protection can be handy. Most units will connect to a standard garden hose. Choose old clothing and expect to get wet. Never point a powerwasher hose at anyone and do not attempt to rinse feet or hands in the spray.

The renovation resource The Family Handyman suggests starting with a wide-degree nozzle to test out the spray on the surface that needs to be cleaned. A 15-or 25-degree nozzle is usually the wand for general cleaning and paint stripping without damaging the surface of the home. Experiment with an optimal distance of the washer wand to get the desired cleaning effects without causing any damage.

Work using a horizontal and slightly downward angle to avoid driving water up under the siding of a home.

Avoid spraying any electric wires or components on the home. Also, try not to spray upward, and angle the spray away from doors, windows and vents.

Some washers have reservoirs that will hold a detergent solution. Choose the right detergent for the job. Keep in mind that cleansers containing bleach can damage surrounding plants, so they may need to be covered while the washing takes place.

Avoid the use of ladders when operating a powerwasher. The push-back from the wand can cause falls. Instead, opt for an extension wand to address the upper reaches of a home.



Moving Forward With Old Englewood Village

The Old Englewood Village Association (OEVA) Board of Directors has gone through some changes over the past year, and that includes many new board members and new leadership within the organization.

The COVID-19 pandemic has forced many events to be canceled for the safety and well-being of residents, visitors, businesses owners, employees, and the OEVA volunteers. While the Englewood Farmers Market, the Dearborn Market, and the Sunday Farmer's Market have returned to Dearborn Street, there are several events that have had to be put on hold. Events like Cruisin' on Dearborn, the Halloween Safe Walk, and the Englewood Fine Art Festival.

The OEVA Board members are taking advantage of this lull by looking at the organization, its structure, and its mission and goals as it pertains to the residents and businesses of Englewood. They are questioning themselves and reflecting on how they can best represent the vision of the

community, and how to make Englewood a place in which residents relish living and where businesses can prosper, without taking away the small town feel that makes Englewood so unique.

The following are some initiatives that the board is either working on or are already in development.

Public Opinion Survey

Plans are in place to develop a survey to send out in January to area residents and businesses to better understand their feelings about the area, their understanding of coming improvements and changes to Old Englewood Village, and to find out what kind of improvements, support, and events they would like to see.

Website and Social Media Presence

In September, the OEVA
Board of Directors launched
a new website. The website is
very mobile friendly and can
be installed as an app on the
user's mobile device utilizing
progressive web app technology.
This website was designed to
bring a stronger online presence to

Englewood with several features that really benefit organizers and businesses in the area and relay relevant information to the residents and visitors of the village.

This website offers better promotion of events in Englewood with an enhanced calendar of events that's easy to maintain, and that member businesses can utilize to submit and promote special events at their business. It also offers member businesses their own complete page with information, links, contact information and a map with directions.

This website also makes it easier to become and stay a member of the organization, automating registrations and membership renewals complete with automatic advance notifications of expiring memberships.

Residential/Commercial Transition Overlay District

Members of the board have been working with Sarasota County Community Redevelopment Area (CRA), rewriting and clarifying the special zoning overlay for Englewood known as the Residential/Commercial Transition Overlay District (RCTOD) to resurrect a zoning district that could bring homebased art galleries and studios to downtown Englewood. The RCTOD has been in effect for a few years, but the way it was written has made it difficult for people wanting to take advantage of it

The RCTOD is "intended to encourage such activities as home-based office, art gallery, artist studio and bed and breakfast establishments as well as lowintensity office, professional and institutional uses." While allowing commercial uses in a residential community, the RCTOD isn't designed to accommodate intense commercial only uses, such as drug stores or shops with no attached residence. The overlay is designed to encourage the "coordinated development of mixed land uses and activities in a concentrated area to attract both residents and visitors," according to the regulations.

Dearborn Area Improvements

Hopefully as early as this spring, the Dearborn Street area will start to see already approved pedestrian-friendly improvements, like new lighting and repairs to the existing sidewalks. There are plans for a new bandshell on a newly designed Dearborn Street Plaza (on the 300 block of West Dearborn) as well as streetlights and sidewalks for Arts District north of West Dearborn Street.

Redefining the Rules

The group has written a new policies and procedures document that ensures the organization conducts business as its bylaws define and that will allow the organization to have better transparency and communication.



ENGLEWOOD Farmers-Markets-

ith so many events and festivals postponed or canceled, the return of the farmers markets, yes markets, to West Dearborn Street on October 1 was a big deal for the customers and the vendors.

While the *Englewood Farmer's Market* at 300 W. Dearborn is the main market, actually the second largest in the area after Sarasota, the markets that have popped up around it provide shoppers with a cornucopia, if you will, of produce, prepared foods, hand-crafted items and much more. All are open from 9 am to about 2 pm every Thursday, except holidays. The variety of markets also provide vendors with more opportunities to get back to business after COVID-19 shut everything down in March.

The Englewood Farmer's Market 300 W. Dearborn Street

When you walk into the Englewood Farmer's Market on West Dearborn Street you are greeted by a large yellow sign with the "Customer Code of Conduct." The lengthy list of reminders includes everything from making a shopping list to using hand sanitizer, shopping with your eyes and not your hands, and wearing a mask "if you have one available." On a recent Thursday all the vendors were wearing masks, as were nearly all the shoppers.

Launched in 2011, the big daddy of markets almost always has a waiting list for vendors. The market is a non-profit organization that leases land from Sarasota County and partners with several non-profits to provide support. The market also accepts SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) benefits and has given more than \$100,000 back to community organizations. Manager Lee Perron is credited with much of the success of the market and has since taken on the *Venice Farmer's Market* on Saturdays and the new Wednesday *Braves Farmer's Market* at CoolToday Park.

"Each week things get better and better," said Pam "Winkey" Stallons, who has been turning lemons into

lemonade at the market for three years at Winkey's Watering Hole. Stallons said she has tried out other markets, but she does best in Englewood. "It's my favorite."

Mattheis Gelner prefers the mass market approach. He sells his gourmet pretzels in six markets on the Southwest Florida circuit. Gelner is one of many vendors who, without a brick and mortar location, rely on the markets for income. Then there's Louise Coble. Her daughter Christine Nordstrom owns Five-0 Donut Co., with two locations in Sarasota. "I used to do a market every day," said Coble, who now only brings her doughnuts and popular breakfast cookies to Sarasota and Englewood.

If you want to visit Chris Lumpkin at the market, better get there early. Lumpkin almost always sells out of his pasture-raised eggs by 11 am or earlier, running back to his Englewood farm to replenish his booth. Lumpkin left his career as a car salesman to start Chris & Victoria's Tiny Ranch and is in three markets. Like many other vendors, he recommends customers avoid disappointment by ordering in advance online, by phone or text. For more information, visit englewoodfarmersmarket.org.

Englewood Farmer's Market 353 W. Dearborn Street

Down the road at Sea Star Cove you'll find more vendors at Englewood Farmers Market 353. Rosibel Malheiro, a vendor and promoter, said the market, which features art and homemade goods, along with honey and guacamole, started just about one year after the main market. Pre-Covid there were about 20 vendors, but with social distancing Malheiro said there about 10.

"This is a lifesaver," said Hana Tiskiewic, peering out from behind her mask, surrounded by a sea of bobbing wooden marionettes. Tiskiewic sells the hooded towels she sews and Bouncies from Bohemia, handmade wooden marionettes on springs, at three markets. "People smile when they walk by, that's the best thing," said Tiskiewic. She's right. Just watching a zebra, mouse, biker, alien and even Albert Einstein, bob up and down, can turn your day around. Dearborn Street Market 348 W. Dearborn Street

Across the street from the main market is the *Dearborn Street Market*, a for-profit venture started by Joyce Colmar, owner of Vino Loco, about seven years ago. While her market and the Englewood Farmer's Market, engaged in a bit of unfriendly competition years ago, today, customers nonchalantly cross the street from one to another. Colmar says that her vendors are also adhering to strict health and safety regulations, all samples must be individually packaged and masks are available for customers. "Business has been quite nice," she said.

Here you'll find Phil Bauman sharing the love for his product, Eileen's English Toffee,. "Nobody has more fun than I do," claims Bauman who entices customers to his booth with the promise of free samples, and "the chance of a lifetime" to indulge in sweets made from his British mother's homemade recipe. "It will crumble in your mouth and not stick to your teeth," declares Bauman as he unveils the toffee surrounded by dry ice, which gets packed with the toffee so it doesn't melt. Bauman's wife Lisa bakes the cookies and leaves the showmanship to her husband. Another couple, Betty Jo Baca and Ron Katz, sell their homemade challah and rolls at Baca Bread. The couple get to work together on Thursday, but in order to hit more markets, split up on Saturdays.

You might not expect to find fine jewelry at a place where people normally pick up produce and barbecue, but Forrest Shafer says that the market has been "very successful" for Jocelyn Hoch and Forrest Fine Jewelry. Corin Bay Market 30 S. Mango Street

Tucked behind Mango Bistro, you'll find *Corin Bay Market*, started six years ago by Chris Phelps, owner of Corin Bay Realty. Phelps said that these days "People feel more comfortable in an open environment and want to support local businesses." This market is the home to Stan the Shrimp Man and Chocolate Lovers homemade chocolates whose proceeds benefit veterans.

Phelps also sells chicken coops built by her husband, and has some good news for locals who want even more market options. She already has 50 vendor applications for a new *Cape Haze Farmer's Market* scheduled to open Tuesday, November 24, just in time for Thanksgiving. 



New Butterfly House

A new experience has taken flight at Marie Selby Botanical Gardens' Historic Spanish Point



Conservation Foundation of the Gulf Coast announces the permanent protection of 363 acres at the headwaters of the Myakka River in Myakka City. Seven creeks converge into one river, the Myakka, at the newly named Myakka Headwaters Preserve. The clear-flowing water allows the creek bottoms to support submerged aquatic vegetation, which are unable to grow in sunlight-blocked blackwaters found elsewhere on the Myakka. The preserve is next to the 2,300-acre Flatford Swamp, which is the river's largest forested wetland. This is an exceptional part of the Myakka River and the greater coastal Florida ecosystem, containing numerous diverse habitats. The Preserve's floodplain forests contain tupelo and red maple, uncommon on the lower Myakka, and support threatened orchids and airplants, including the Myakka River airplant (tillandsia simulata). The marshland forms a seasonally dry meadow with sandy ridges supporting lowland loosestrife, a Florida-endangered flower found in twelve counties and no place else in the world. The Preserve also contains more than a mile of uplands and oak hammocks buffering both sides of Flatford Swamp and the Myakka River. The Myakka River Land Fund of Manatee Community Foundation awarded \$1.3 million for the permanent protection of the Myakka Headwaters Preserve. Learn more at www.conservationfoundation.com.

campus, where the Butterfly House opened to the public on October 31. The region's only butterfly house will reside beside the outdoor Native Butterfly Garden at the Historic Spanish Point campus located at 337 N. Tamiami Trail, Osprey. Visitors will be surrounded by colorful Florida butterflies and their favorite flowers. "Guests who experienced the Butterfly House at our Downtown Sarasota campus as part of our Salvador Dali: Gardens of the Mind exhibition asked repeatedly if we could permanently keep it," said Jennifer Rominiecki, president and CEO of Selby Gardens. More than 160 butterfly species breed in Florida, and about 200 species migrate through the state. Many butterflies in Florida aren't found anywhere else in North America. Species that might be spotted in the Butterfly House and the Sunshine State include the cloudless sulfur, giant swallowtail, Gulf fritillary, monarch, orange-barred sulphur, and the zebra longwing

(the Florida state butterfly).

Butterflies play an important role in pollination and the Butterfly House will both educate and delight families throughout this region. Historic Spanish Point is open daily 10am to 5pm. Learn more at www.selby.org.







Pet First-Aid

Pet owners love their pets and want to keep them healthy and happy. Like humans, pets can experience a situation where they require first aid. Do you know what to do if your pet has one of these misfortunes? Amy Flowers, DVM, reviewer for Fetch by WebMD, shares advice on the following pet emergencies.

- Hit by a Vehicle If your pet is injured by a vehicle and is in pain, first muzzle it with a scarf, belt or towel to prevent it from biting you out of pain. However, if the pet is vomiting, skip this step. Get the animal off the road by gently sliding it onto a towel or blanket. Don't lift the animal; if it seems to have any broken bones, do your best not to move it too much.
- Poisoned Many common household items can be poisonous to dogs and cats. Call the Animal Poison Control hotline at 888•426•4423 or the Pet Poison Helpline at 800•213•6680 immediately. They probably can help you even before you get to a vet. Caveat there may be a charge for the advice.
- Choking If your pet is unconscious, open its mouth and try to clear the object out with your fingers. If the animal is conscious, do a modified Heimlich Maneuver. Place the pet on its side, applying pressure right behind the ribs and pressing your hands forward.

- **Dog Bites** If another dog bites your pet, get to a vet or clinic ASAP. Dog bites can pull debris into the wound and if not cleaned out soon, the wound can become infected.
- Bee & Wasp Stings Bee and wasp stings usually cause just minor swelling and itching. If you can see a stinger, use a credit card to scrape it out or pull it out with tweezers. An antihistamine like Benadryl will relieve some of the symptoms but contact your vet for the dosage. If you notice any swelling on face or neck, or hives all over the body, get the animal to a vet right away as it could be a severe anaphylactic reaction.
- Heatstroke If your pet is panting heavily, drooling, having trouble breathing or showing other symptoms of heatstroke, move it to a shady area immediately. Put a cool, wet cloth around its neck and head (not its face.) You can also gently hose it down with cool water, especially the belly, before transporting it to the vet. Do not cool your pet down too quickly as this can be dangerous.
- Seizures A seizure will generally pass on its own in less than three minutes. Your job is to make sure the animal is safe while it's happening. Get any moveable furniture away. Don't pull its tongue out of the mouth. Contact your vet when the seizure is over.
