

Farmers Markets To Open! Lee Perron, manager for the Englewood Farmers Market, has announced that the Englewood Farmers Market will begin its new season on Thursday, October 1st. Sarasota County has approved the CDC compliant plan that Perron prepared and presented to the county. The Englewood Farmers Market is located at the Dearborn Street Plaza, in the 300 block of W. Dearborn Street and is open every Thursday. 9am to 2pm. The market has been redesigned to allow for social distancing

between vendor tents. Most of

the vendors will be returning although a few have dropped out due to the impact of the pandemic. New vendors include Florida farmers and ranchers Million Acre Farms micro greens, Venice Free Range Chickens, a new Italian olive oil and balsamic vinegar vendor MedEateranneo and a special artisan baker. There will be a cooking demonstration each week. Some tips to be aware of: masks are required, shoppers are asked to maintain social distancing, the flow plan will be for shoppers to move and "shop on the right" and to move in a one-directional way. The inmarket volume will be capped at just over 400 people at one time and attendance will be managed by forming a line and entering as people exit, similar to the way Walmart manages their shopper volume. Sarasota County: If you wish to vote by mail in the upcoming general election, a request for a mail in ballot may be submitted by phone to 861-8618 or online at SarasotaVotes.com/VoteByMail. A ballot may be requested for a specific election or for all available elections through 2022. Voted ballots may be returned by mail or in person but must reach one of the supervisor of elections offices by 7pm on election night. Charlotte County: A voter may request a vote by mail ballot from the Supervisor

To help celebrate its 45th anniversary milestone, the orchid show will honor the Gardens' founder, Marie Selby, and spotlight the accomplishments of many notable women who have built on her legacy and helped make Selby Gardens home to the best scientifically documented collection of orchids in the world. 

Fishing with the One Percent

A few miles down Placida Road, you'll see the turn off to Boca Grande. After crossing the \$6 toll bridge (the return trip is free) and a drive to the southern end of Gasparilla Island, you can see how the local 1% live along the way. Fortunately for the rest of us, Gasparilla Island State Park at the extreme end of the island became a state park in 1983 and provides access to some of the best fishing in the area. Actually, there are several gulf side beach access roads north of the town of Boca Grande, but Gasparilla Island State Park is our favorite because of the tidal flows and the good fishing in Boca Grande Pass. The tides here flow fast and the currents are strong so swimming near the pass is forbidden which opens it up for anglers. Still, be incredibly careful if you wade in these fast waters. There really are big sharks in the pass that will eat you if you drift out with the tide towards Mexico, especially during tarpon season.

Many anglers know Boca Grande Pass for to its reputation as the tarpon capital of the world during May and June. It's worth the drive just to watch the guides maneuver their clients through the raft of other boats in the pass. It gets crazy out there during tarpon season. Tarpon can often be seen just a few feet off the point as they travel through the pass. It's a great show but the savvy anglers in this area know that lots of other gamefish are available year around.

This time of year, whiting, sea trout, snook and pompano hang out north of the pass along the beach. There is a welldefined trough just south of the crumbling pier up that way. On the lower stage of the tide, we wade out just south of this pier and cast into the trough using jigs, or bait bouncing along the bottom. The current here always flows south whether the tide is falling or rising. If there are not too many beach goers around,



The Boca Grande lighthouse and keepers quarters


we cast into this trough and then walk with our bait down the beach. There's also a deep hole between the close end of the pier and the beach. A lot of whiting are caught here using shrimp on the bottom, but a lot of tackle is lost to the rocks on the bottom.

Down by the man-made rocky point or groyne, the current swirls out around this jetty creating turbulence that attracts sheepshead, permit, Spanish mackerel and the other gamefish. The drawbacks here are the slippery rocks and the crowd of anglers that usually gather. The entire shore of the pass to the east is fishable too. Most anglers use big weights to hold bottom in the strong current with their bait rigs. We prefer a medium sliding weight that allows our presentation to drift along the bottom with all the other goodies these fish are sorting through. Be careful to stay clear of the fishing lines that may be unattended and can sweep 100 feet or more along the shore. Also, freelining an unweighted live shrimp drifting with the current can produce nice sized snook. Seagulls love to feast on these shrimp so a watchful eye and a split shot will avoid catching one of these birds.


At the eastern boundary of the public area, the condos with their "No Trespassing" signs take over by the old phosphate docks. The water here is deeper since

it was dredged out years ago to float the big freighters loading phosphate from the inland mines. This combination of deep water and fast current make this a great spot to soak cut bait around the pilings. Sheepshead frequent this spot in the winter, but black drum and grouper make this their home year around.

When it opens again, check out the museum in the historic light house that will interest visitors and locals alike. The history of Boca Grande and tarpon fishing is well documented. Just seeing the primitive tackle folks used to catch tarpon in the 1800's is worth the climb up the stairs. The lighthouse balcony makes a great place to optimistically scan the surf for schools of fish busting bait along the beach. How about just one more cast?

The Emmy Awards

Hollywood went ahead with its first major awards show since the COVID-19 crisis cancelled all large in-person gatherings in March, presenting the 72nd Annual Emmy Awards on ABC this past Sunday. Jimmy Kimmel, who has a late-night talk show on ABC, and has hosted the Emmys twice in the past, proved to be a great choice for this very unusual ceremony.

Kimmel took charge early, never pretending for a minute that this would be a normal evening. He delivered his monologue to a "packed house" of celebrities laughing and nodding (footage from previous years). He then revealed an empty Staples Center with a few cardboard cutouts, one which was actually nominee Jason Bateman who swapped banter with Kimmel

But what Kimmel called the "No People's Choice Awards," had plenty of people. There was an impressive virtual wall of stars appearing alone, with family and even masked with their castmates from all over the world, wearing everything from flannel shirts to designer gowns. And, in a brilliant move, Kimmel introduced essential workers, nurses, teachers, truckers, etc., and had them announce the nominees in several major categories.

Kimmel was also joined by several celebrity presenters including Jennifer Aniston who had to literally put out a fire that got out of control in an early comedy bit, Tracee Ellis Ross and Sterling K. Brown. Seeing the winners accept their awards at home (delivered via interns driving Kias), was fun and the speeches seemed more intimate and yes often political. My daughter Emma and I agreed that despite clocking in at three hours, the show did not seem that long. And when an award show doesn't seem long, that is a good thing.

The Winners:

The fish-out-of-water comedy about the Rose family's adjustment to life without money or power, went from cult newbie on Pop TV (yes Pop) to sweep the comedy awards, winning a record seven Emmys. Show creator and star Daniel Levy, Eugene's son, was thrilled and overwhelmed, and gets points for wearing a kilt. Watching the cast celebrate together, dressed-up and masked-up made the sweep a bit less boring. Did Schitt's Creek deserve all those awards? I'm on season four waiting for my boyfriend to catch up to me, so I can't comment on Season 6, but the show is funny and sweet and worth your time on Netflix.

I guess I need to start watching *Watchmen*, the HBO miniseries based on a graphic novel that tackles the 1921 Tulsa race massacre and other important issues, set in an alternate reality. The critical darling won 11 Emmys, including Outstanding Actress and Miniseries. Happily, the cable TV gods just awarded me free HBO and it's just nine episodes.

The political "dramedy" *Succession* won a handful of awards for its second season, including Outstanding Drama. I'll wait on this until our reallife political "dramedy" ends. Meanwhile it's another HBO

show I didn't see because I didn't have HBO and now I have to see because I do have HBO, which means I'll have less time to watch the stuff I really want to see like reruns of *Parks and Recreation* and *The Floor is Laya*

David Letterman fans like myself won big as the elusive talk show legend showed up to present the Emmy for Outstanding Variety Talk Show Emmy, which went to HBO's Last Week Tonight with John Oliver for the fifth year in a row. Letterman was as funny and dry as ever and since he didn't have to actually step foot in the hall, actually seemed to be having a good time.


The Losers:

The SCORE website is a leading online resource for entrepreneurs and small business owners. It offers a comprehensive small business library with "how-to" e-guides, downloadable templates, checklists, articles, videos and blogs. The site hosts online workshops and recorded webinars and interactive courses are available on demand. All

online workshops and webinars are free. There is a charge for some seminars and conferences. A virtual trade show is being planned for this December.

From 2017 to 2019, the Port Charlotte chapter of SCORE served 529 new clients, held 1979 mentoring sessions, offered

111 workshops/conferences, for a total of 2384 participants. Women entrepreneurs comprised 50% of their clients. Nationally, SCORE assisted in 29,681 new business start-ups.

Turtle Nesting Season Update

"For a terrible year (COVID-19,) it has been a very good sea turtle nesting season," stated Wilma Katz of the Coastal Wildlife Club, which oversees the sea turtle nesting on Manasota Key and the northern tip of Knight Island. Careful and complex nesting data is collected, tabulated and sent to the state. As of September 11th, the last available date of complied data, on Manasota Key (Sarasota & Charlotte

counties,) 4,630 Loggerhead nests, 154 Green turtle nests and two Kemps Ridley nests have been documented. False crawls (attempts by a sea turtle to nest but nesting is not achieved) number 7,715 for Loggerheads and 143 for Green turtles. Although Englewood has been brushed by two tropical storms this season (Cristobel and Sally,) only a few nests were lost due to wave action. The 2020 season started early with a few nests being found in April, (official



On September 19th, Stump Pass Beach State Park volunteers picked up trash and other debris from areas in the park and the water around the mangroves. The 21 volunteers then sorted the trash and inventoried it by type. The top three items picked up were beverage cans, plastic bottles and food wrappers followed by cigarette butts. Cigarette butts are usually the number one littered item in many cleanups around the globe. You can help to keep the park clean by packing out what you bring in and picking up trash you see around you, even if it isn't yours. While tidying up the park, many of the critters who call the park home such as the Florida box turtle, gopher tortoise and osprey were sighted by the volunteers. nesting season start is May 1st,) and the number of Loggerhead nests is ahead of last year's total making 2020 a very good year, although not a record. Green turtle nest count is lower but that is to be expected as nesting trends suggest that green sea turtles do not nest every year. Wilma applauds the large group of committed volunteers who

patrol the beaches every morning to document sea turtle activity and who deal with the challenges of COVID-19, wearing masks and following other safety protocols. Most of the volunteers return year after year due to their love of sea turtles and desire to see their population grow. New volunteers enthusiastically embraced their duties, joining

veteran volunteers, walking the beaches daily during sea turtle nesting season which runs through October 31st. There are still nests yet to hatch so it is important to shield all lights visible at the beach; even the red turtle safety approved lights should be shielded facing the beach. 



Tropical storms such as Hurricane Sally can bring visitors to the Englewood area in an attempt to escape the storm or they end up here due to being caught up in air currents. Two rarely seen birds found refuge on Englewood Beach recently, much to the delight of area birders. One exhausted visitor was a fairly rare Brown Noddy. It is a dark brown bird, 15 inches long, with a white forehead and fairly long, slightly curved bill. This bird breeds in the Dry Tortugas and is typically found over warm ocean waters and ocean islands. They nest and roost in trees. The Brown Noddy feeds by swooping and dipping to the ocean surface. Birders found it

being chased by an unwelcoming Brown Pelican before finding refuge among gulls and other terns. The Roseate Tern is a medium-sized tern, being 12.5 inches in

length, and has a long, thin bill. It closely resembles a Common Tern, but besides

the bill differences, the Roseate is a paler

shade of gray, with a tail that projects well beyond the wingtips. The feather pattern is also distinctive, with only two or three

NEW GARDEN BEGINNINGS By Jocelyn Hoch

Now is the time to add in the compost manure to prepare the beds for planting. The winds of change have brought forth rain and it is a bit cooler. By now we should be planting new seeds in little pots and nurturing those tender seedlings, getting them ready to plant within the next month out in the big garden.

If you have placed cardboard down and prepped a garden following previous instructions, now is time to think about getting some good soil and pulling the mulch aside, creating planting holes within the mulched areas. Pull back the mulch 1 foot wide x 1 foot deep, place good garden soil in that hole and this is where you will plant your tender garden sprouts or perhaps seeds. Green beans love direct seeding, so does spring mix lettuce. But the local tortoise and rabbits like those tender seedlings too, so you may want to put chicken wire around the outside border of the holes. Don't forget to mix in good fertilizer in these holes before planting. We use 1/2 cup of Super Plus Fertrell Fertilizer from MRT. Then when you are ready to plant each seedling, put 1 big pinch of bone meal in each hole. This will make that seedling super strong for its initial growth cycle. Then lightly water them in. If you are using city water, think about the chemicals in that water. What you put on your plant, the plant will uptake into the roots and fruits. I recommend an inline RV filter that you can attach to the spigot and hose, this will filter chlorine and fluoride from the water. Those chemicals will weaken the plant, making it more vulnerable to disease and fungus.

Lately I have noticed new bugs attacking my plants. You can spray with diluted Dr. Bronners peppermint soap (1 squirt in large spray bottle), add a few drops of lemongrass oil and neem if you like, to the water and lightly spray the



leaves. Also diatomaceous earth will work but you must tie it inside a net cheesecloth and dust with it. Be careful not to breathe it. It's non toxic yet the diatoms are harsh on the lungs. This mix can also be sprayed on fire ants killing them and putting diatomaceous earth around the cracks of your foundations will prevent them from entering the house.

What to plant now? This is the beginning of the summer cycle of vegetables so it's time to start squash, peppers, tomatoes, cucumbers, kale, collards, etc. Sow outside: lettuce, arugula, & beans. You can go to the Sarasota AG extension and they have planting guides for our area.

There are so many wonderful perennial vegetables you can plant here and incorporate them into your lovely landscaping. Longevity spinach, a fresh edible green, makes a great ground cover and super healthy, its name says it all. Chaya, a cooking green, instantly gives you beautiful bushes for borders of your

property and attracts butterflies and bees like I have never seen. Perennial peanut makes a beautiful cover around your fruit trees and pollinators love that too. Cassava grows a massive root vegetables which can feed 2 big families once you skin the

root and boil it. The amazing variety of rare fruits you can grow in this zone is mind boggling. We now have over 90 different kinds of fruits, medicinal herbs and edible plants on our permaculture farm we started 3 years ago. We also just harvested 2 large jackfruit trees I grew from seeds from a fruit I bought at Detwillers 3.5 years ago. Explore your local farmers market to learn, ask questions at the landscape companies and seek out edible landscape tours that we hold around town.

This is my last article. I have enjoyed writing for the Englewood Review for the past year and now I am moving on. If you need any planting tips please follow me on my face pages, Ebb & Flow Farm, or visit my booth Ebb & Flow Creations, at the Thursday farmers market where I sell my handmade nature inspired jewelry that pays for my family's farm. I will be teaching classes through my chapter Englewood Center For Sustainability at local parks, and doing local installations for bio filtration, conservation of water and teaching edible landscaping. Please stop by and say hello. I never know who has read or even followed any of these articles, I would love to know it reached someone out there and helped even one person make a beautiful long lasting garden. Wishing you all the best gardens and happy healthy lives for your whole family and all your friends. May everyone have a peaceful place to heal & grow.



Englewood's Doctor Doolittle

Most people are familiar with the amazing Doctor Doolittle who talked with the animals. Suncoast Humane Society (SHS) has its own exceptional animal communicator and behaviorist in Senior Animal Behaviorist Jeff Joyce. SHS's goal is to re-home every animal that arrives at their shelter to a forever home and Jeff is an essential component of the SHS intake and adoption team.

Jeff has honed his animal communication and trainer skills over a lifetime of interacting with animals starting when he was boy growing up with relatives who were farmers and raised cattle. His grandfather taught him to watch the animal's behavior for clues as to what it was communicating. At age 13, he landed the opportunity to work with horses on the farm that was adjacent to his backyard. The stable manager was a famous retired British jockey, Art Thompson, who taught him to ride in exchange for stable work. Art opened his eyes to how to "listen" to a horse and form a mutual relationship and partnership with the animal. He experienced a "Eureka!" moment when he realized how important communicating with an animal really is.

As a teenager, he started volunteering at local animal shelters, dog-walking and experimenting with dog and cat communication and relationship building. Jeff also had a neighbor who always owned Dobermans and she gave him training tips. He was developing a passion for animal training and began self-educating himself through all the resources he could find.

Jeff also loved motorcycles and took classes to become an instructor in Motorcycle Safety. He was hired by the State of Illinois to teach adults from novice to professional as well as teach motorcycle instructors. He viewed this as a gift he could give to others when he found out that more military personnel were killed on motorcycles due to feelings of invincibility after returning from the Middle East than are killed in combat. One transferable skill he learned from this job is how to teach adults as he had realized

that "you have to teach people, not the dog" to succeed in training an animal.

In 2013 Jeff was cer-

tified as a dog trainer through Petco and two years later earned his national certification through the Counsel for Professional Dog Trainers. When he and his wife, Jeannie, relocated to Florida, he worked as a dog trainer at the Venice Petco and also began volunteering at Suncoast Humane Society. He became certified with A Sound Beginning, a national dog training organization that reflected his values and beliefs based on a science-based curriculum of developing communication skills, mutual respect and creating a relationship with the pet that enriches its life through interaction with the owner. He was a leader trainer and program manager for the state of Florida. He also earned his certification to work with shelter animals. Jeff says that having the opportunity to mentor with other professional dog trainers through A Sound Beginning and taking advantage of everything he learned from Art Thompson and others has enriched his knowledge far beyond what just a dog training course would teach him.

In 2018 Jeff joined the staff full time becoming an integral team member in the shelter's mission to find homes for the multitude of pets that end up needing re-homing or just someone to love them. As Senior Animal Behaviorist, Jeff assesses the psychological needs of the animal by its body language and behaviors and starts to establish a mutual trust relationship based on communication between animal and human. He then develops a behavior enhancement module (if needed) that is reinforced by the staff and shelter volunteers to build trust and develop predictability in the animal's daily routine. Everything that is needed to ready the pet for its new home. You may find him introducing a dog to

treadmill-walking to drain excess energy and/or help get back to a healthy weight, one-on-one behavior modification, offering dog puzzles and even playing soothing music to calm an animal. Sometimes just a change to a better-quality pet food can make a big behavioral difference. The pet may be experiencing stomach and intestinal system upset or pain, resulting in less than desirable behavior. Jeff bases his approach on the five pillars of life

enrichment system to take care of the animals' physical, emotional and social needs. These pillars are problem-solving, nutrition, social interaction, environmental enrichment and sensory stimulation.

After the pet is adopted, Jeff and an adoption specialist provide follow up advice if any problems are experienced. There are virtual consultations as well as webinars on the SHS website to teach you about canine behavior and establishing that essential mutual trust relationship between human and animal. These "Essential Behaviors" lesson webinars consist of four science-based lessons to learn to communicate

with your pet so both of you feel enriched by the relationship. If you have webinar questions, contact Jeff at jjoyce@humane.org or call SHS at 474•7884.

Suncoast Humane Society stresses that their ultimate goal is to keep a pet in its established home so when they are contacted about surrendering a family pet due to behavioral issues or the owner being unable to provide food and medical care, Jeff will consult with the owner about behavioral issues and SHS offers free pet food and limited medical care. If an animal is surrendered, a foster home is sought immediately once it undergoes medical and psychological evaluations so the pet can experience life in a home environment until it is adopted. SHS does everything possible to work with a new pet owner to solve any problems that might lead to it being returned for a resolvable issue.

Cheryl Casey, SHS Director of Operations, says that since Jeff joined the team as Animal Behaviorist, he has changed the dynamics of staff, volunteer and animal relationships and made procedures more understandable. He creates a protocol for helping a pet make the transition from its former home to become a beloved member of a new family "pack." She also wants potential adopters to know that follow-up care is available to work out any issues that may arise. For those thinking about surrendering their pets, Suncoast Humane Society is here to help you in any way they can to keep your pet in your family from the Community Pet Food Bank to some medical care. 
